This does not mean that you should relinquish your own opinions or passions, but that you respect the opinions of others, and not let a difference separate you from your brothers. And never suffer your passions or your prejudices to the masters of your judgement.

All of us have it within ourselves to be better people. It should be a lifelong process of self-improvement. The goal, as a Scottish Rite Mason is to become better, and then work to improve our craft, to strengthen our fraternity, to bring more Masons into the fold, to shed more light in Masonry, and to increase the fellowship for all concerned. We should, each one us, strive to be remembered as someone who made a difference – but not for self-aggrandizement. Do it to improve the craft, and to inspire others to do the same. What will your legacy be? What will you leave for the craft, and for those brothers who come after you?

I look forward to seeing you at our next Scottish Rite meeting and dinner.



From their Statement of Purposes, we learn that since 2001, the MRF has been looking into the many issues facing Ma-



This month we are celebrating the Feast of Tishri. The origin of the Feast of Tishri, also called the Feast of the Tabernacle, is described in the Old Testament where it states that the Lord spoke unto Moses saying when "ye [shall] have gathered in the fruit of the land, ye shall keep a feast unto the LORD seven days:... [and] Ye shall dwell in booths seven days.... That your generations may know that I made of Israel to dwell in booths, when I brought them out of the land of Egypt" (Leviticus 23:39,42-43). Additionally, after 450 years of the celebration of the exodus out of Egypt, the Feast of Tishri was celebrated for the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple (2 Chronicles 7:8-10).

The Fest of Tishri is also related to the Fourteenth degree, where the symbolic descriptions of King Solomon's temple's position, design, construction, furnishings, and decorations represent special meaning to Scottish Rite Freemasons in building their spiritual temple. As King Solomon was a king of peace and wisdom, by observing the Feast of Tishri we reaffirm our commitment to ensuring brotherly love, peace, truth, justice, and concord to all people in the world through the establishment and dedication of our spiritual temple.

Thus, the Feast of Tishri is one of the most significant Scottish Rite festivals, as it symbolizes Freedom from oppression, as was the case in the exodus of the Jews out of Egypt, and Peace and Wisdom through it's connection with King Solomon and the building of the Temple.

Fourth Degree

During the Fourth Degree, Secret Master, we hear about the Kabbalah, the ancient Jewish tradition of mystical interpretation of the Hebrew Bible. Many people are attracted to Kabbalah because of its many complex symbols, including the Tree of Life, Sephiroth, Olamim, magical words, and other fascinating ideas.

The ideas and concepts of mysticism found in the Kabbalah trace back to Pythagorian Mysticism of the 6th Century Before the Common Era (BCE). Some scholars say that the Kabbalah is the Jewish reinerpretation of Pythagorian Mysticism. Others insist that Pythagorian Mysticism is a pagan reinerpretation of the Kabbalah. When scholars disagree, it's a good bet that nobody really knows the answer.

Many texts form the body of knowledge called the Kabbalah. The two best known texts are the *Zohar* and the *Sefer Yetzirah*. The Zohar or Book of Splendor is the foundational work in the literature of Jewish mystical thought. It first appeared in 13th Century Spain but is ascribed to a 2nd Century rabbi, Shimon bar Yochai. The Sefer Yetzirah or Book of Formation, is the earliest extant book on Jewish esotericism. It first appeared in the 10th Century but is ascribed to the patriarch Abraham (archaeologically, the 7th Century BCE; traditionally, the 20th Century BCE).

Because these seminal works first appeared during the European Middle Ages, many people suppose that the Kabbalah dates to that period. From a historical point-of-view, that is what the physical evidence shows. However, Kabbalistic ideas appear in earlier documents, including the Holy Bible. One scholar suggested that the only reason the Kabbalah appeared in writing was because of the pograms in Europe at that time. They killed so many Jewish people that some feared the teaching of Kabbalah might be lost. The only way to preserve it was to write it down.

The Kabbalah is Jewish. Therefore, in order to effectively study it, you have to understand Jewish history,

values, concepts, beliefs, and the Hebrew alphabet and numbering system, which uses letters as numbers. And you need a copy of the *Tenakh*, or Jewish Bible. The books in the Tenach match those of the Christian Old Testament. But the books are arranged differently, into three categories: Torah (Law of God revealed to Moses), Nevi'im (Prophets), Ketuvim (Holy Writings). Perhaps you will recall a lecture from the Blue Lodge: "We read in the Holy Writings that it was decreed in the wisdom and counsels of Diety aforetime..."

Kabbalah is about mysticism, spirituality, magic, sound, and meditation. Not to be critical, but for the most part, those concepts are not practiced in mainsteam religious traditions. So you will have to stretch your mind a little. Quite a lot, actually.

Study of the Kabbalah is not for everybody. From Jewish tradition, we read a story of four prominent 1st Century rabbis who entered Pardes, the mystical garden in Kabbalistic thought. "Four men entered Pardes: Ben Azzai, Ben Zoma, Acher, and Akiba. Ben Azzai looked and died; Ben Zoma looked and went mad; Acher destroyed the plants; Akiba entered in peace and departed in peace." So there you go, a one-in-four chance of success.

Are there any good books about Kabbalah? Yes. But you have to understand, studying about Kabbalah is not the same as practicing Kabbalah. Kabbalah is a "mouth-to-ear" tradition. That means the tradition is transmitted from teacher to student, personally and individually. Something like the way candidates in the Blue Lodge learn their proficiencies with a coach. If you are really serious about practicing Kabbalah, you must find a Kabbalistic master who is willing to help you. Here's a hint: "When the student is ready, the teacher will appear."

From my own studies, I can suggest two books:

Thank you for sending me to my first RiteCare Conference! I attended the conference in Los Angeles, CA on August 8-10, 2018, hosted by the California Scottish Rite Foundation. I had the oppor-



tunity to meet many different speech-language pathologists and reading specialists serving clients at RiteCare clinics and affiliated clinics from across the United States.

This conference had a track focusing on speech and language topics as well as literacy topics such as dyslexia. It was a wonderful experience having the opportunity to attend a conference with fellow RiteCare clinicians. Additionally, it was very helpful that the conference was small enough to allow some time to speak to the presenters one-on-one in order to obtain further clarification regarding specific questions that came up during the courses. I felt so fortunate to be able to learn about a wide variety of topics that hit home for me. For example, a team of speech-language pathologists from the Orange County RiteCare Childhood Language Center gave a presentation about how to better conduct speech and language assessments with children from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, which is very important to us because we have children who come from households who primarily speak Spanish, Vietnamese, Cantonese, Mandarin, Tagalog, Hindi, as well as many other languages. It is very important that our speech-language assessments

reflect the fact that our clients may be exposed to multiple languages and may be learning English as a second language. The team from the Orange County RiteCare Childhood Language Center gave a list of useful resources that we will be able to use in our future assessments.

I also learned about identifying dyslexia in a clinical setting, parent training for young children who are minimally verbal, repeated interactive read-alouds to target vocabulary-building and language skills, and about supervision for training the professionals of the future. The course on supervision was particularly important and special to me because I am supervising a graduate student clinician for the first time. I am excited to bring the new information that I learned to the table and share with my fellow clinicians at our clinic. We are looking forward to implementing the new strategies discussed during the conference!
