From the Personal Representative:

May 2010

Having just returned from a very informative and inspiring conference for Scottish Rite leaders and speech professionals, I am compelled to share with our members some of the ideas and information we received there. Also, I need to share some of my own thoughts on the progress and future of our own Valley, its activities, and the San Jose Scottish Rite Foundation.

As I've mentioned in past months, the Valley of San Jose is unique in the Scottish Rite world, in that we are a discreet foundation, not reliant on nor supportive of, the California Scottish Rite Foundation. This means that all of our past successes are our own and we owe nothing to a state or national organization. The wisdom and diligence of our predecessors in building a strong financial base for the support of our charities has provided us with a great facility and sound financial base to carry on the work we are committed to. It also means that we have to be extremely careful in our care and use of those resources and guard against any abuse, so that we can continue into the future and guarantee our successors the same advantages we now enjoy. But we, in the Valley of San Jose, have nowhere to turn for help in keeping that flame alive. We survive or fail alone in the Scottish Rite universe, with a shrinking membership, a plant that requires constant maintenance, and growing need for services.

This is what the Scottish Rite Leadership Conference was all about. It was almost as though the Supreme Council looked over the whole Southern Jurisdiction and chose the Valley of San Jose as an example to address the problems and potentials of making a good plan better and making it work for the good of our members and the ultimate recipients of our efforts, our Language Clinic clients.

To begin with we have to create a long range plan and the plan must necessarily include a monitoring process whereby we can evaluate our progress. Some call this a five-year plan, a rolling five-year plan, or some other title to give it identity. Too often, in Masonry, we assume that the only plan we need is to confer degrees, adhere to our constitution and by-laws, and support each other fraternally and personally. In Scottish Rite, however, we have a mission of service, and we need to look to the future to see

that our abilities to improve our services do not die or even diminish. Where do we hope to be in three years, in five years or longer? This is something we all need to give our attention to or we will, at best, only survive.

Next, and this must be included in the overall program, we must realize that no plan, however grand or small, can be achieved overnight. While keeping the grand design in mind, we must be prepared to take those initial

small steps toward success that will first; move us, even incrementally, toward our goal, but also will, secondly; give us that sense of success necessary to maintain the spirit of achievement that will keep us moving and on the right track.

As I sat for three days in the Leadership Conference, I could not help but compare our mission with that of our principle charity; the Childhood Language Clinic. When a new client comes through the door to interview with our clinicians, there is but one goal, or mission, in the minds of the staff; that of turning a verbally challenged child into a world-class orator. So, do they give that child the Gettysburg Address to memorize and come back next week to recite? No, they start by sitting down with him or her and working deliberately toward the first, easiest, most pronounceable word that they next need to master. It may be "Daddy", or "dog", or some other simple set of sounds, but it is a start on the long, long road to success.

So must it be with us. While we have come a long way toward "success", we won't really know where we are or where we are going until we set some goals.

In the next few weeks, I will be working with our advisory board to evaluate our mission and set some objectives for future performance. As I've mentioned before, anyone who feels compelled is welcome to sit in on our "Kitchen Kabinet" meetings, Tuesdays at 10:00 AM, and get involved in the process of making San Jose Scottish Rite a great place to come to enjoy a sense of participation and be a part of a plan designed to help children learn to communicate, right here in our own back yard.

Public Schools and a Great Day

It was heartening to open Public Schools Month on April 1, 2010 at Backrodt Academy in San Jose. Our Grand Master Ken Nagel along with Scottish Rite General Secretary



Robert Rowan and many other Masons celebrated public schools and the book program. The book program provides books for students to carry books home and read with their families. Many homes do not hold a single book. The Grand Master provided the schools with a \$25,000 check from the Masons of California for the project. Half of the funds were donated by the San Jose Scottish Rite Foundation.

The Grand Master mingled with the students, teachers and administrators. Our student guides led us to Kindergarten, First, Third, Fourth and Fifth Grade Classes. Some students were sitting on carpets, some at their desks; and all were interacting with their teachers. A tour of the computer lab found the computers, monitors, computer keyboards and something unexpected. Each computer also had a piano keyboard. The computers have a piano software program. Starting with the Kindergartners all the students either do play or will learn to play the piano. Look out Liberace here come the Backrodt Academy kindergartners

Backrodt Academy students speak English or know that they will learn English. They know that they are expected to graduate not only from elementary school but college. The school has programs and mentors in place to support these goals.

This was a day a wonderful day for public schools and Freemasonry.





Spring 2010 Reunion







hristian is an energetic, ✓ fun-loving seven-year-old boy who started speech and language treatment at the San Jose Childhood Language Disorders Clinic because his parents were concerned that he was not speaking clearly. Christian was diagnosed with having a severe phonological disorder. A phonological process disorder occurs when there are consistent sound error patterns that persist beyond what we would expect for a child's age. For example, substituting all



sounds made in the back of the mouth such as "k" and "g" for sounds made with the front of the mouth like "t" and "d", is a phonological process that we expect to diminish by three years of age. Christian had difficulty with multiple sounds and had a very limited consonant repertoire. Before treatment began Christian's sound inventory included only sounds that were made with his lips, such as "m, b, p" and sounds that were made with the tip of his tongue, such as "n, d, t". He could also make the early developing sounds "j, w, h" and sometimes the more difficult "r". In addition to limited consonants, Christian dropped syllables and omitted the ends of his words. He was about 20% intelligible to an unfamiliar listener. He often became very frustrated and would shut down if you could not understand what he was saying.

Since treatment began at our clinic Christian's parents and grandparents have reported that "He has improved so much. Conversations with him are much easier to understand and communication with him is much better." Christian has made steady progress toward his speech and language goals. He is always a hard worker during his sessions. A reward system was implemented to motivate Christian to complete his homework. He made a speech journal which helps his family keep track of his daily homework assignments. If he completes his speech homework each day during the month he gets to pick a prize from a special prize box. Christian has done his homework without fail for the past four months!

Christian is now intelligible more than 60% of the time. He has increased his sound repertoire to include the sounds "k, g, l, f, v, s, z, th" and "sh". He is even starting to use "k" and "g" sounds in his spontaneous speech intermittently and can include all syllables and the ending sounds of words in structured treatment tasks. Christian is a pleasure to work with and we are so proud of his hard work.

Clinic Director's Message – May 2010

As you may know, I recently attended the 2010 RiteCare® Conference on Speech, Language, and Literacy in New Orleans, Louisiana, where I had the opportunity to meet with and discuss the needs of our children in order to try to improve our services. Some topics of interest included grant writing, ethical decision-making and how other clinics have been working to expand their presence and fundraising activities in the non-Masonic community.

The San Jose Clinic is currently helping 53 children and completed over 238 treatment hours in March. Three children are on hold for services at this time. Our screening waiting list continues to be on hold due to the length of our clinic waiting list: 98 children.

We continue to enjoy the help of Jenna Mendonca, a San Jose State University graduate student, who has been completing her externship at our clinic. She will be with us until mid-June, when she will graduate. I would also like to thank Sharon Lewis for continuing to assist the clinicians in the smooth transfer of her caseload to them.

Thanks very much to the Monterey Scottish Rite Club for their most generous donation of \$1000 to the Children's Language Disorders Clinic during their March Installation of Officers. Thank you!

We can always use help in maintaining our Clinic and improve the appearance of the area. Please feel free to visit your clinic and if you or your lady would like to volunteer to help, please contact me to make arrangements.

Venerable Master

From the Wise Master In searching for a topic for this month's column, I asked our General Secretary for 👤 a suggestion. He suggested Cinco de Mayo.

OK, I admit I never thought of that as a Masonic topic. It turns out that it's quite relevant though.

In 1861, Benito Juarez stopped making interest payments to countries that Mexico owed money to. In response, France attacked Mexico to force payment of this debt. France was successful at first in its invasion; however, on May 5, 1862, at the city of Puebla, Mexican forces were able to defeat an attack by the larger French army. Although the Mexican army was victorious over the French at Puebla, the victory only delayed the French advance on Mexico City. A year later, the French occupied Mexico. The French occupying forces placed Maximilian I, Em-

peror of Mexico on the throne of Mexico in 1864. The French, under pressure from the United States, eventually withdrew in 1866-1867. Maximilian was deposed by President Benito Juarez and executed, five years after the Battle of Puebla.

Benito Pablo Juárez Garcia was a Zapotec Amerindian who served five terms as president of Mexico (1858-1872.) The presence of Juarez in Freemasonry is unarguable, though historical data varies. History suggests that he was initiated in either the city of Mexico or Oaxaca. In either case, he probably was initiated under the jurisdiction of The National Mexican Rite. Those who believe that he was initiated in the city of Mexico set the date at January 15, 1847 in Independence Lodge Number 2. Those who believe the location was Oaxaca set the date as somewhere during 1833 or 1834 and postulate that it was in a Lodge of the York Rite known as Mirror of Virtues, one of the many lodges instituted by the Grand National Lodge of Mexico in 1824.

The Mexican Masonic Historian/Scholar Don Rafael Zayas Enriquez, asserts that indeed the event took place in Mexico city, and to that effect he states: Juarez was a Francmason that belonged to the Mexican National Rite, and in which he attained the Ninth Degree, equivalent to the 33rd of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. He was so fervently devoted to his Masonic Practices and Principles that his name is now used with much veneration in all the rituals, and many lodges and philosophical bodies have adopted it as a sacred symbol.

So even if you're not Mexican, feel free to celebrate on Cinco de Mayo and share yet another accomplishment of our fraternity.


