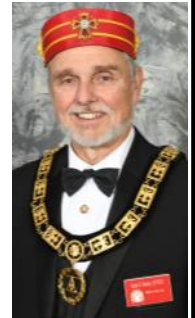

From the Venerable Master

The House of the Temple is the headquarters of the Scottish Rite for the Southern Jurisdiction. It has been open to the public for tours since it opened in 1915. It contains a number of museums, exhibits, and collections, including the Masonic collection of Illustrious Brother Burl Ives, the Albert Pike Museum, the Hall of Scottish Rite Regalia, and the Americanism Museum.



The library in the House of the Temple is the oldest in the District of Columbia that is open to the public, and houses more than 250,000 books, manuscripts, and other publications. Among the contents are an impressively large Masonic collection, an Abraham Lincoln collection, and a Robert Burns collection. Here also is the repository of Scottish Rite records, artifacts, and history, contained in the Archives.

The building was first proposed at the Supreme Council sessions in 1909, and the project was begun under the direction of Grand Commander James D. Richardson, who was given complete control of the building process. After reviewing several submissions, he selected John Russell Pope, who also created the Jefferson Memorial, as the architect. The ground-breaking ceremony took place on May 31, 1911, the 110th anniversary of the founding of the Southern Jurisdiction, in Charleston, South Carolina. The cornerstone was set on October 18, 1911, and the building was completed in October, 1915. It was patterned after the tomb of King Mausolus of Turkey

The House of the Temple stands 130 feet high. It bears many attributes and dimensions of symbolic significance to Masons, including the 33 columns – each 33 feet high, and the steps leading to the front doors, in groups of three, five, seven, and nine, in reference to Euclidian geometry.

The Supreme Council is sponsoring the “Rebuilding the Temple” campaign, to help restore the House of the Temple to the glorious state in which it should remain. 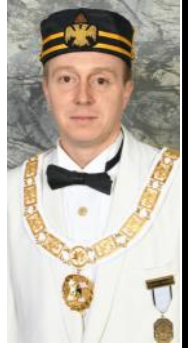
We should consider how lucky we are to have such a wonderful headquarters building.

Greetings,



We have a few special days in this month. One of which started with the name Decoration Day, and began after the Civil War in 1868. This holiday was started by the Grand Army of the Republic which was a union group from Illinois. They would decorate the graves of the fallen soldiers of war with flowers. Due to rivaling dates between the Union and Confederates on when this day should fall, there was a date finally set which we know as Memorial Day (the last Monday in May). This day united the Union and the Confederates in honoring both side's fallen soldiers. This day is not to be confused with Veterans Day which celebrates the U.S. Military Veterans.

We will notice the flag of the United States moving several times this day. In the morning Old Glory will be quickly hoisted to full mast, then ceremoniously lowered to half mast until noon when it will be raised back to full mast for the remainder of the day. When the flag is raised at noon it symbolizes the soldiers memory being raised by the living, acknowledging that their efforts were not in vein, allowing us to rise up and to fight for liberty, and justice for all. Other important days that fall on this month are the Kentucky Derby, Mothers Day, and Armed Forces Day.

From the Master of Kadosh

Fraternal greetings! Just a reminder, we are planning a joint Scottish Rite Consistory, Knights of St. Andrew, Sciots, and Grotto social event at the Sunnyvale Art & Wine Fest on the 2nd of June starting at noon. So, mark your calendars and plan to attend this fun and relaxing event!

A Discussion of the Letters I-A-O in Relation to Deity, the Gnostics, and the Knight Templars

In my recent studies, I have come across the reference to the letters I, A, and O, as the three primary vowels that represent Deity in some traditions. Below you will find the original Knight Templar Abraxas seal, in which, amount other interesting details, the letters I, A, and w are found. The “w” is the lower case Greek letter for “omega”, or the English letter “O”.

In Bro. Timothy Hogan’s book, Entering the Chain of Union, he explains that the name “John”, as in “John the Baptist” and “John the Evangelist”, i.e. “the Holy Saint’s John”, was revered by Freemasons, Templars, Martinists, and early Gnostics.

Timothy goes on to state that the emphasis on the name John in Gnostic traditions is related to earlier Babylonian myths of Oannis, whose feast day, coincidentally, was June 24th. In this myth Oannis, like John the Baptist, was known to anoint Priest Kings who were don in aprons and taught them the liberal arts and sciences required for building civilization. Also, according to this theory, Oannis became the Greek Ioannes, which became the Latin Iohannis, and finally was abbreviated to John. The name John became important to the Gnostics, as it contains the three vowels I, O, and A. As such Gnostics considered the name of Deity to be IOA, or IAO. Hence, the possible portrayal of I, A, and w in the Templar seal. Timothy explains further:



“The Latin letters IOA were significant from a Gnostic and sacred geometry standpoint, as “I” represented a point extending itself, and therefore the “word” of creation. “O” represented the word extended through space to the point that it comes back in contact with itself, and it therefore represented the extension of the word in creation, or the Christos. “A” represented a triangle that forms as two dualities come in contact with themselves and therefore form a third point of manifestation, and it symbolized the Sophia, or reflection of the word in matter.”

In my meditation on the letters I, A, and O, I’ve found some interesting possible relationships. In Revelation 22:13, in the Holy Bible, it states that the Lord God said, “I am the Alpha and Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End.” Therefore I believe I, A, and O, could represent “I” am the “A”lpha and “O”mega. After further reflection, I believe that if you were to arrange I, A, and O in the following manner, I-A-O-O-I-A, these letters could also represent the name of God as revealed to Moses by the burning bush in Exodus 3:14, “I Am that I Am”. The “I” and “A” are obvious, but the double “O” is not as apparent. However, if you consider the O’s forming a symbol representing infinity, ∞, one might see that the “that” in the phrase “I am that I am”, might be related, as God is in everything, God is “that”, and God is infinity, omnipotent, and omnipresent. Finally, if the letters IA OO IA are written vertically, the two O’s could form the number 8. In numerology the number 8, can represent the balance between the material and immaterial worlds, the world of form, and the formless, which could also be the “that” in the phrase.

From the Wise Master

This month I will share a part of my Maundy Thursday talk presented in March. For those of you that were present I hope this can serve as a re dux.

Part One

Welcome to our Maundy Thursday celebration of Renewal and Remembrance. I begin with a reminder of the meaning of Maundy. It is derived from the Latin word mandatum which means commandment and refers to the new commandment to “love one another”. Here is a description of Maundy Thursday from the April 1924 issue of the “Builder Magazine” which was known as the magazine for the Masonic student. It states that Maundy Thursday “is a time, then, for each of us to search our souls and see if we truly and devotedly are living the life of love – not just in mere similitude. But rather in our innermost, personal, private lives. Are we – in business, at home, in our pastimes – living the life of the New Commandment? If we weigh ourselves in its light and find ourselves wanting, then it is time for us to do something sincerely and devotedly about it”.

So, as we gather to celebrate this time of remembrance and renewal I think it is appropriate to share a few thoughts about harmony and a harmonious world and life.

During the opening and closing of every tiled Blue Lodge meeting the Senior Warden reminds us that harmony is the strength and support of all societies, especially of ours. In the Scottish Rite 18th Degree the candidate is instructed that the constellation shines brightly on the word Faith. The Expert informs the candidate that it, in great part, means Faith in God under whose direction all the Universe is one harmonious whole, governed by one great law of harmony. Throughout the lectures of the Blue Degrees or symbolic Masonry the idea of harmony is often emphasized; sometimes referred to or inferred as love, temperance, balance or peace.

Most mystic schools or philosophies view and teach the concept of harmony as a perfect balance of our material needs and spiritual aspirations and can be approached through the study and application of laws that unite humans to the Creator. That is, harmony with oneself, with others and with Nature.

Harmony with oneself involves the body, the mind and our emotions. If we observe natural laws, we can promote and help maintain good health. We should treat our body with respect and care. Watch the diet, rest the body and take exercise on a regular basis. If not, it is widely accepted this will disturb the body's equilibrium. We are reminded in the First Degree that we must take time in our day for refreshment and repose.

The same applies to our mind. Reason is one of the most important of our faculties because our daily lives are conditioned by our proper judgements. The 18th Degree, Knight Rose Croix, instructs that reason comes to our assistance, both in expounding the mysterious meanings of nature and in showing that love is one of the great attributes of God. The more we apply ourselves to healthy and useful reflections the more we aid the mind to best express the best in ourselves. So, it is believed that reading worthy writings, observing the great works of art and studying the great issues of our past, present and future are some of the activities which help us maintain harmony within our mindful brain. As for emotions, realize that feelings of anger, pride, jealousy and spitefulness are quite harmful to emotional well-being and then harms our physical well-being. So, it behooves us to do all we can to harmonize ourselves with the rhythm of pure and constructive emotions.

Mahatma Gandhi tells us “Happiness is when what you think, what you say and what you do are in Harmony”.

I will present Part 2 and the last part of my talk in the June Rite Word. Stay tuned.

June promises some interesting activities for our Valley. On June 19th, we will have our first Scottish Rite Night of Instruction and Agape Dinner. Worshipful Mark Scoggins, Past Master of San Jose 10, will present a paper drawing upon his study of the Masonic and Rosicrucian mystic philosophies. All the details can be found elsewhere in this issue of the Rite Word. And just a reminder of the statewide Scottish Rite Reunion which starts on June 30th and continues July 1 and 2. This month we celebrate all her accomplishments and hard work of meeting 21 of her speech therapy goals! Great job McKenzie!! Although her smile will be missed around the clinic due to her 18 month time limit for services being over, we hope to see her again very soon as she has been put back at the end of our wait list to be seen in the future to work more on her articulation and sentence structure.



Her Mother Samantha wanted to describe her experiences at the clinic and what our services have meant to her and her family.

“I heard about the San Jose Scottish Rite Children’s Clinic from a previous clinician, friend and neighbor Mrs. Angela, who has since moved out of state. McKenzie’s speech prior to receiving the Scottish Rite Clinic services was very limited. She had minimal words for her age and struggled to get basic sounds out. Our pediatrician and ENT recommended speech therapy for her. McKenzie’s speech sounds and vocabulary is night and day since she started speech therapy here with her Speech-Language Pathologist, Ms. Jenna. She is so much happier, and she is a different child since starting and beginning working with Ms. Jenna. She used to get very upset and frustrated that she couldn’t say specific words or that others couldn’t understand her. But that rarely happens anymore! The most rewarding part of the speech services I received for my daughter is her confidence. She likes to participate at school and makes friends on the playground since she feels more confident in talking. Our family is so thankful for the opportunity to have McKenzie receive speech therapy services at the Scottish Rite Clinic. All of the employees, especially Ms. Jenna are so kind. We really could not have asked for better. I tell other parents about the Children’s clinic, because you guys are truly an asset to the Bay Area! Without the San Jose Scottish Rite Clinic my daughter wouldn’t be conquering her speech disorder at the level she has over the last 18 months. I truly can’t tell Ms. Jenna enough, all that she has done for McKenzie! From day one McKenzie gravitated to Ms. Jenna because of her calming and caring personality. McKenzie never liked to leave my side. But when she met Ms. Jenna, something just clicked right away. McKenzie would beg to see her speech clinician ever week. Although I knew that she worked hard when she was with her, she never complained or didn’t want to go see her. Ms. Jenna genuinely cares about her students. She works hard to learn their personalities and what will make the children want to come back. Ms. Jenna really cares about your family as a whole and wants your child to succeed. McKenzie wouldn’t be where she is today without the Scottish Rite Clinic and Ms. Jenna. We are going to miss Ms. Jenna so much but are truly thankful for the amazing foundation she has given to McKenzie.”

Take care McKenzie and family! I know you will continue to think about all your speech sounds that we worked on while you take a little break from the clinic. Thank you for all your hard work! I will miss you all! –Ms. Jenna

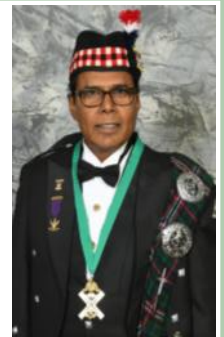
