Last month's article introduced Worshipful Jordan Yelinek's talk on the Chamber of Reflection. If you still have your July issue, re-read that portion before you proceed. If not, this will stand alone starting with the origins of the chamber.

> The Chamber of Reflection (Continued)

The origins of the Chamber of Reflection draw themselves from the Pythagorean mystery schools, and even from the Cult of Mithras (perhaps another progenitor of our Craft). Here, novitiates were secreted away in a cave previous to the initiatory observances of these orders. To us, the Chamber is also reflective of this cave, as seen most closely in the arcane Chamber, which is painted black and small in size, to mirror this experi-

The arcane chamber also commonly possesses the skull, crossbones, scythe, or other emblems of mortality, familiar to us through our third degree. A small plate of bread and glass of water, intended for the candidate to eat and drink, are present, and are simple food for the work ahead. Alchemical elements, most commonly sulfur, salt and mercury, are drawn upon the walls. To the alchemist, these were the Tria Prima, and believed that all substances were, figuratively, formed of these three elements. Again, to the alchemist sulfur is a masculine element, and represents strength; salt is considered neutral, and represents wisdom; and mercury, a feminine element, represents beauty. An hourglass is also present, to mark the time and also for the familiar elements from our third degree. Phrases are sometimes written upon the wall, such as Perseverance and Vigilance. A mirror is occasionally present for the physical reflection of the candidate, together with the spiritual.

In all types of chambers, arcane, modern, or plain, a philosophical testament is written, or the candidate answers questions prepared for him in advance. Examples of such questions, used by Prometheus Lodge No. 851 in San Francisco are:

In the modern world, in which we live, what drew you to seek mem-

bership in the fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons?

It has often been stated that, simply, the goal of Freemasonry is to make good men better. What is it, in yourself that you are seeking to better, through your experience of the fraternity?

One of the principle tenets of Freemasonry is Brotherly Love. How, through the exercise of brotherly love, will you support and enable those around you in seeking to better themselves through the Fraternity?

These questions are then sealed in an envelope, with the candidate's signature across the seal, and presented to the Brother who retrieves him from the Chamber. Some Lodges hold these questions, and return them to the candidate, unopened, on his raising to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason, while others read them in open Lodge before the initiation, to better know their candidate, and best match his experience to his needs and desires. Both are common throughout the fraternity.

Ultimately, the Chamber of Reflection provides an opportunity for the candidate to separate from the profane world as he begins his journey in Masonry. It provides reflection on who he is as a man, what he wishes to accomplish in his life, and how the Craft fits into that path. The symbolism of the arcane chamber, while most common throughout the world, may not be immediately clear in its purpose to the candidate, and perhaps either a chamber filled with modern art, or a unadorned chamber with a candle, pen or pencil and paper for the candidate to answer his questions upon may provide the optimum experience for the growth of the newest Entered Apprentice. Though, through the use of the Chamber of Reflection, or not, it is our duty as Brethren, to ensure the due and true preparation of our candidates, both physically and mentally, for the good of our

DID YOU KNOW?

What are the "Old Charges?"

The first book of Freemasonry, printed in 1723, is known as *Anderson's Constitutions*. In it appear six "Old Charges" which are a statement of the old laws of operative Freemasonry concerning a Mason and his conduct. These six Old Charges are titled: Of God and Religion; Of the Civil Magistrate Supreme and Subordinate; Of Lodges; Of Masters, Wardens, Fellows and Apprentices; Of the Management of the Craft in Working; Of Behavior. The last, sixth Old Charge is concerned with behavior: "in the Lodge while constituted; after Lodge is over and the Brethren not gone; when Brethren meet without Strangers, but not in a Lodge; in presence of Strangers not Masons; at Home and in the Neighborhood; towards a strange Brother.

An excerpt from our Scottish Rite Ritual Monitor and Guide:

STRUCTURE of the SCOTTISH RITE

The Scottish Rite is an Appendant organization which administers a series of thirty-three degrees and bestows certain "Honours." It is active in every American state and enjoys a cooperative relationship with the American Grand Lodges from whom it solicits members. In terms of membership, the Scottish Rite is the most successful Masonic system in the world.



The governing body of the Scottish Rite is the Supreme Council, an autonomous self-perpetuating body consisting of thirty-three officers, known as Sovereign Grand Inspectors General who possess administrative and voting powers not held by other members. Acting as a board of directors, the Supreme Council elects its own members, amends its own statutes and laws, and writes its own rituals. Supreme Councils do not interfere with or meddle in the private affairs or business matters of other Masonic organizations. It is important to bear in mind that although Supreme Councils throughout the world are similiar to each other, they may differ in minor aspects, dependant upon their adopted statutes.



Ty is a sweet, five year old boy who has been coming to the San Jose Scottish Rite Childhood Language Disorders Clinic for the last year secondary to a diagnosis of Childhood Apraxia of Speech or CAS. CAS is a motor-speech disorder that occurs when there is difficulty coordinating oral movements necessary to

produce sounds to make words. Children with CAS may be able to make a sound in isolation, but cannot coordinate movement from one sound to the next to make simple or more complex word structures. As a result, children with CAS have very few intelligible words and have a difficult time making their needs and wants known. Specialized therapy techniques which utilize auditory, visual and tactile cueing systems across motor and sensory-motor domains are helpful when working with kids with CAS. One of these therapy techniques is called PROMPT (Prompts for Restructuring Oral Muscular Phonetic Targets), which requires intense specialized training for the speech-language pathologist to learn how to use the program.



Ty has responded well to PROMPT and has shown significant improvements in his speech and language skills since treatment started a year ago. Ty's treatment began with working on simple, early developing sounds such as bilabials or sounds that we make with our lips like /p, b, m/. He worked on using these sounds in simple consonant-vowel (CV) and CVC word structures. Once this was mastered he worked on using these sounds in more difficult consonant-vowel structures that contained varying vowels or consonants and longer syllables per word. Ty has mastered the early developing sounds and is now working on later developing sounds, such as /l/, /s/-blends and /sh/.

His mom boasted that "Ty has made such great progress. He has really come a long way and he is able to communicate well with his friends now. As a family, we are all able to understand what Ty is saying. Ty is less frustrated because we understand. The most rewarding thing is that even Ty's Dad understands him. He had the hardest time deciphering Ty's language. We are thrilled with Ty's progress." Recently, Ty's mother shared that family members who had not seen Ty for a number of months could tell a significant difference in Ty's language and could understand him when he spoke! Ty's family is very appreciative of all the work we have done to help him, "Our experience at the clinic has been a real blessing for Ty and our family. This speech clinic is wonderful. The speech [and language] therapists are great and hard working. Rachel has really helped Ty to sit at the desk and work hard through his speech session and he enjoys his time here."

Clinic Director's Message August 2012

The San Jose Scottish Rite Foundation has the clear-cut mission to operate a clinic in Santa Clara County that provides evaluations and therapy - free of charge - to children with speech, language, and reading disorders.

Treatment of these communications disorders improves children's academic and social skills so that they may lead productive, independent, and fulfilling lives. We serve children regardless of race, religion, economic status or Masonic affiliation. We are a member-supported 501(c)3 non-profit whose extraordinary and unique service is made possible through the generosity of Scottish Rite Masons, their families, friends and associates in our community. We also rely on public contributions and other organizations for funding.

During the month of June, we completed 169 treatment hours. A total of 50 children received speech and language services. We also carried out 15 screening evaluations. We discharged two children from our services and increased one child to twice-per-week secondary to severity. A total of 123 children remain on the waiting list.

Thanks again to each of you for your help for and support of our Clinic.



The ceremonies of the 18th Degree are interpreted by each individual according to his own faith for in no other way can Masonry retain its universal character. To all antiquity, Light was the type of Good while Darkness was Evil. Evil was a principle represented in demons and fallen angels, who first having fallen themselves, tempted others to do so, thus bringing sin into the world. With her traditions reaching back to the earliest times, and her symbols dating further back than even the monumental history of Egypt extends, she invites all men of all religions to enlist under her banners and to war against evil, ignorance and wrong.


