From the Commander

The Fourth of July—also known as Independence Day or July 4th—has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution. On July 2nd, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later delegates from the 13 colonies adopted the Declaration of Independ-



ence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson. George Washington issued double rations of rum to all his soldiers to mark the anniversary of independence in 1778, and in 1781, several months before the key American victory at the Battle of Yorktown, Massachusetts became the first state to make July 4th an official state holiday.

After the Revolutionary War, Americans continued to commemorate Independence Day every year, in celebrations that allowed the new nation's emerging political leaders to address citizens and create a feeling of unity. By the last decade of the 18th century, the two major political parties—the Federalist Party and Democratic-Republicans—that had arisen began holding separate Fourth of July celebrations in many large cities.

Festivities including concerts, bonfires, parades and the firing of cannons and muskets usually accompanied the first public readings of the Declaration of Independence, beginning immediately after its adoption. Philadelphia held the first annual commemoration of independence on July 4, 1777, while Congress was still occupied with the ongoing war. July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues. The Fourth of July 2023 is on Tuesday, July 4.

The tradition of patriotic celebration became even more widespread after the War of 1812, in which the United States again faced Great Britain. In 1870, the U.S. Congress made July 4th a federal holiday; in 1941, the provision was expanded to grant a paid holiday to all federal employees.

Over the years, the political importance of the holiday would decline, but Independence Day remained an important national holiday and a symbol of patriotism.

Falling in mid-summer, the Fourth of July has since the late 19th century become a major focus of leisure activities and a common occasion for family get-togethers, often involving fireworks and outdoor barbecues. The most common symbol of the holiday is the American flag, and a common musical accompaniment is "The Star-Spangled Banner," the national anthem of the United States.

From the Master of Kadosh

First, a belated happy Father's Day to all! The idea for this day to honor fathers, the third Sunday in June, started in 1909 when Sonora Smart Dodd heard a sermon on Mother's Day. She was the daughter of a Civil War veteran who raised six children after his wife died in childbirth and first celebrated in 1910. Legislation establishing it as a national holiday was signed by President Nixon in 1972.



In May we observed Mother's Day, conceived by Anna Jarvis following her mother's passing in 1905. With financial support from a local department store she organized the first event in 1908 because she felt American holidays were biased towards male achievements. President Wilson, in 1914, officially established the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day, however in 1920 Ms. Jarvis became disgusted with the commercialization of the day and urged people to stop buying flowers, candy and cards for their mothers. Fortunately, that did not take hold.

Observances for other relations have come into being such as: July 23, Parent's Day; July 26, National Aunt and Uncle Day; and (my favorite) September 10, Grandparent's Day.

Here at the Scottish Rite we have a special day that is doubly important, Saturday, October 7. First, that is the day of the Consistory sponsored Family BBQ Day. It also happens to be National Frappe Day.

World War One resulted in the creation of two very different days. The first and most important was Armistice Day. It got its start in 1921 with the burial of an unknown WWI soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. This gave rise to Armistice Day, November 11, by Congressional resolution and twelve years later it became a national holiday. In 1947, after WWII a National Veteran's Day was started on November 11 with parades and other ceremonies. President Eisenhower proclaimed it Veteran's Day in 1954. Later, for about ten years the date was changed to the fourth Monday in October, but it returned to November 11 in 1978.

The other National Day WWI gave rise to was National Donut Day. During WWI, the Salvation Army sent over 250 ladies to deliver food to the soldiers on the front lines in France. The ladies found that a soldier's helmet could be used to cook donuts, up to seven at a time. June 2 was selected, in 1938, by the Salvation Army, as the day to honor those women who delivered donuts to the troops.

There are actually two American Thanksgiving Days. We all know the fourth Thursday in November which dates to the Civil War. There is a much older one, Schwenkfelder Thanksgiving, observed on September 22. It dates to 1734 when the second group of Schwenkfelder followers arrived in Pennsylvania. This Thanksgiving was originally celebrated by feasting on butter, apple butter, bread and water.

From the Chief Knight

Meditating on the Tree of Life, Part 2

In last month's article, we had an introduction to meditation for those readers who have not yet given it a try. This month, we will describe a simple meditation on the Tree of Life, focusing on the Sephirah, Malkuth.

Malkuth is the Sephirah at the bottom of the Tree of Life, and is the 10th of the 32 paths of wisdom. It is the only Sephirah that exists in Olam ha Asiya, the World of Action. And it is the Sephirah that contains physical reality. So Malkuth is a logical place to start.

Malkuth is shown divided into four quarters. Each quarter has its own color:

citrine, olive, russet, and black. Citrine, olive, and russet are created by mixing the colors of other Sephiroth. Just as each Sephirah denotes a certain Divine quality, those qualities find their way down to Malkuth, where we live in the Kabbalistic sense.

Black comes from the qlippoth. Thinking back, you may recall that the qlippoth were the shells that encased and isolated the Sephiorth when they first emanated. The qlippoth shattered, enabling the Sephiroth to create pathways among themselves.

The shards of qlippoth apparently fell to the bottom where their color and influence was picked up by part of Malkuth. Remember that the qlippoth represent a lack of communication and the evil or negative aspect of existence. We encounter those influences every day of our earthly existence. Thus the Kabbalists mapped it all out.

Sets of Four

What else comes in a set of four? A set of tires for your car. Four Aristotelian elements: earth, air, fire, and water. Four cardinal directions: east, west, north, and south. Four seasons: spring, summer, fall, and winter. The Tetragrammaton, the name of God, written with four Hebrew letters: yod, hay, vav, hay. The number four has many qualities and meanings to meditate upon.

The four colors of Malkuth relate to the four elements. Citrine is air, olive is water, russet is fire, and black is earth. We do not normally associate these colors with those elements. Although I admit that, when I was growing up in the East Los Angeles area in the 1960s, the smoggy air somtimes had a citrine color. I have seen plenty of dark green, slimy water, and many places on earth have black sand or black soil. So we also have these things to meditate upon.

More Qualities Attributed to Malkuth

Malkuth, located at the bottom of the middle pillar in the

Tree of Liefe, and existing in Olam ha Asiya (World of Action), has acquired many attributions.

According to Rebbe (a Hasidic spiritual leader) Nachman of Breslov, "Earth is equivalent to the Sephirah of Malkuth, which is associated with the earth. Therefore earth – like Malkuth – represents the Oral Law (statutes and legal interpretations that were not recorded in the Five Books of Moses). And the Oral Law is the source of the spirit of every living being, as the verse states: 'Let the earth bring forth living creatures, each according to its own kind' (see Genesis 1:24)."

Although Malkuth is seen as the "lowest" sephirah on the Tree of Life, it also contains within it the potential to reach the highest sephirah, Kether or Crown. This is exemplified in the Hermetic maxim "As above so below" and "Kether is in Malkuth, and Malkuth is in Kether".

From a Christian viewpoint, Malkuth is important since Jesus of Nazareth preached that people should "seek first the Kingdom of God". In some systems, the Kingdom of God is equated with Da'ath, the invisible Sephirah representing Knowledge. Here we refer to knowledge in the sense of Gnosis, which is information or understanding of the divine accessed through mystical study and practice.

In comparison with Eastern systems, Malkuth is a very similar archetypal idea to that of the Muladhara (root) chakra. Chakras ("wheels" in Sanskrit) are energy points in the body. The human body is said to have seven major chakras and up to 114 in total. We might look into chakras in a future article.

In Shakta Tantra, which is also associated with the Earth, this is the plane in which karma is expressed. Karma is a concept of action, work or deed, and its effect or consequences. in Western terms, we might say, "You reap what you sow" or "To get one's just deserts".

A tantra ("loom" in Sanskrit) is one of a multitude of esoteric rites practiced by some Hindu, Buddhist, and Jain sects. Shaktism is the worship of the mother goddess Shakti, the active power of the godhead conceived in feminine terms. The Shakti tradition came from 5th century India.

Each Sephirah has an avatar or manifestation of God who goes by a specific name. Malkuth has "Adonai ha Eretz", literally "Lord of the land" who rules over over the Kingdom of the visible universe. It might include some invisible components of the universe, such as dark matter.

Malkuth also has its assigned archangel, Metatron and Sandalphon, depending on the source you consult. And an angelic host (army or choir), the "Ishim", meaning the "firery ones". Its Astrological correspondence it the Elements. Its body part (thinking of the Adam Kadmon, the prototypical human whose form is mapped to the Tree) is the feet. Its Consciousness is Guf, the Hebrew word for the physical body. Its mystical image is a young woman sitting on a throne. And its symbol is an altar or temple. Perhaps the altar in the lodgeroom or a Masonic temple?

Brothers with a background in science might be interested to learn that the Tree of Life and each Sephirah have a specific frequency. Malkuth is 532 Hz. If you have a frequency generator application on your computer or smartphone, you can play that sound softly in the background while you meditate on Malkuth. Look for more on frequencies in a later article.

Examples of Topics for Meditation

What is Malkuth: The planet earth? The physical universe? Malkuth means Kingdom: Whose kingdom? Who belongs to the kingdom?

Four colors and four elements: The number four Citrine and Air Olive and Water Russet and Fire Black and Earth

What is Olam ha Asiya (World of Action)?

How do you "seek first the Kingdom of God"?

Dealing with Human Minds

A quality that sets humans above other species is the ability to think in the abstract. That is, we can imagine something that does not actually exist. And, in many cases, the ability to bring that something into existence. That requires an active mind, one which is always looking for something to do.

If you new to meditation, the major challenge will be keeping your mind from wandering. Meditation focuses your mind's attention on a specific thing, be it an object, symbol, idea, or feeling. Sometimes you just have to think forcefully to yourself, "Mind! Be Still!"

Meditation can take you to a quiet, safe place, where you can take a break from the noisy and chaotic world around us. Do-

ing nothing more than achieving a focused mental separation from the world, for even a moment, may benefit your mental and physical wellbeing.

While in a meditative state, we often receive insights into life's problems and challenges, or answers deep and mysterious questions. Your memory is good for recalling how something felt but it is not reliable at recalling information correctly or completely. So keep a pad and pencil handy to record any thoughts and ideas you experience.
