From the Personal Representative:

December 2009

Brethren and friends,

N ovember has been an active and exciting month for San Jose Scottish Rite. We began the month with our bi-annual session of Inspector General Honorary and Knight Commander Court of Honor conferrals at Oakland Scottish Rite Center. Oakland has a perfect layout for such an event, and the degrees went smoothly. You will find the names

of those so honored in the message of our General Secretary.

At our stated Meeting on the following Tuesday, we honored Asiya Shriners, with Illustrious Potentate Wayne Heimsoth and several of his officers in attendance. At the Stated Meeting we also welcomed some of our newly initiated 32° Scottish Rite Masons into our midst, and, as usual, enjoyed a sumptuous feast, courtesy of our intrepid caterer Greg Donnellan. Our attendance is increasing, and we'd love to have all the members who are able be with us for our meetings and the dinners that follow.

As I noted in our November issue of the Rite Word, I was concerned that the contributions of our members that are sent to the California Scottish Rite Foundation are not available to the charitable activities of our San Jose Children's Language Clinic. On Saturday, November 14, I addressed this problem at a meeting of the Board of Directors for the California Foundation and was informed that it will be necessary for us to appeal directly to our members to inform you how to make your contributions to the benefit of the San Jose Scottish Rite Foundation. So . . . with mixed emotions, I have authored a letter to our members outlining this problem and asking for your assistance. In the Valley of San Jose, owing to the good management policies of my predecessors, we have been able to function without turning directly to our members for assistance. With today's economy, however, our investment portfolio has been drawn down dangerously and we have had to reduce salaries, cut our administrative staff, and restrict the hours of clinicians as well as scale back wherever possible. We must now reach out to our members for help. Our clinic does great work, but it can't survive without monetary support.

Please remember the great work of our clinic in your yearend charitable giving. It is a good way to reduce your income tax obligation, and aid in the good work of our clinic.

Our e-waste program on Saturday, November 21 was a great success, owing to the generosity of our members and the hard work of our administrative staff, there were three truckloads of worn-out computers, phones, televisions, and other electronic junk hauled away. Thank you all for your help.

Then, on November 27th, several members of our valley including our Grand Master Ken Nagel, were guests at the annual Northern California DeMolay Convention and were treated royally. M. Wor. Ken delivered an inspiring address. It was typical DeMolay. Enthusiasm abounded, and continued (so I am told) into the wee small hours of the morning. The accomplishments of these young men are astounding, and it is encouraging to see the future of the craft in such good hands.

And ... rounding out the month, on Monday, November 30, we had a number of volunteers, including Herb and Lillian Dallas, Bob Laws, Ed Clarke, Hazel Winter, and Earlene LaRue, under the leadership of Sue Ramsey, in the center for putting up Christmas decorations. 

Page 4 Recently, my sister sent me this story and I could not resist sharing it with you for the Christmas Season. Please do not make the mistake of assuming that I wrote the article. I am not a mother of three. - RR **Breakfast at McDonald's** I am a mother of three (ages 14, 12, 3) and have recently completed my college degree. The last class I had to take was Sociology. The teacher was absolutely inspiring with the qualities that I wish every human being had and her last project of the term was called, "Smile." The class was asked to go out and smile at three people and document their reactions. Since I am a very friendly person, and always smile at everyone and say hello anyway, I thought this would be a piece of cake, literally. Soon after we were assigned the project, my husband, youngest son, and I went out to McDonald's one crisp March morning which was just our way of sharing special playtime with our son. We were standing in line, waiting to be served, when all of a sudden everyone around us began to back away, and then even my husband did. I did not move an inch and an overwhelming feeling of panic welled up inside of me as I turned to see why they had moved. Standing behind me, smelling that "dirty body smell" were two poor homeless men. As I looked down at the short gentleman, close to me, he was "smiling". His beautiful sky blue eyes were full of God's Light as he searched for acceptance. He said, "Good day" as he counted the few coins he had been clutching. The second man fumbled with his hands as he stood behind his friend. I realized the second man was mentally challenged and the blue-eyed gentleman was his salvation. I held my tears as I stood there with them as the young lady at the counter asked him what they wanted. He said, "Coffee is all Miss" because that was all they could afford. (If they wanted to sit in the restaurant and warm up, they had to buy something. He just wanted to be warm). Then I really felt it - the compulsion was so great I almost reached out and embraced the little man with the blue eyes. That is when I noticed all eyes in the restaurant were set on me, judging my every action. I smiled and asked the young lady behind the counter to give me two more breakfast meals on a separate tray. Then I walked around the corner to the table that the men had chosen as a resting spot. I put the tray on the table and laid my hand on the blue-eved gentleman's cold hand. He looked up at me, with tears in his eyes, and said, "Thank you." I leaned over, began to pat his hand and said, "I did not do this for you. God is here working through me to give you hope." I started to cry as I walked away to join my husband and son. When I sat down my husband smiled at me and said, "That is why God gave you to me, Honey, to give me hope." We held hands for a moment and at that time, we knew that only because of the Grace that we had been given were we able to give. We are not church goers, but we are believers. On my last evening of class, I returned with this story in hand and my instructor read it. Then she looked up at me and said, "Can I share this?" I slowly nodded as she got the attention of the class. She began to read and that is when I knew that we as human beings and being part of God, share this need to heal people and to be healed. In my own way I had touched the people at McDonald's, my son, instructor, and every soul that shared the classroom on the last night I spent as a college student. From the Clinic!!!

A inur is a playful and endearing 5 year old girl who has been seen at the San Jose Scottish Rite Childhood Language Disorders Clinic twice a week for the past year. Ainur's parents first noticed delays her with speech and oral motor skills at 11 months of age. She was evaluated through her healthcare provider, however they did not cover speech and language services. Ainur's preschool encouraged her mother to seek services at this clinic.

When treatment began, Ainur appeared to understand language well, however she displayed a severe oral motor disorder and decreased sound production. This drastically limited her ability to communicate with words and be understood by others. Ainur has a very playful and gregarious personality. She is full of life and loves to interact with people. At nearly 4 years old, she was definitely showing signs that she was embarrassed and frustrated when not understood. Ainur's mother stated, "She use to scream loudly to get her needs met. This was a source of stress in our household. She rarely screams now, which makes our home a more relaxing place to be."

Ainur has made amazing progress over the last year. Her therapy has been very intensive and requires a lot of time and commitment from her parents to carryover her treatment to the home setting. When treatment was initiated, Ainur needed intensive oral motor exercises to work on the strength and control of her jaw, lips, cheeks and tongue. She used approximately 10 words and most of her underlying speech and language weaknesses had not yet been identified. Her oral motor and speech patterns were similar to that of a much younger child. Ainur had difficulty closing her lips, controlling the movement of her jaw, protruding and retracting her lips, moving her tongue and controlling her secretions. She had difficulty producing and coordinating the muscle movements necessary to make earlier developing sounds such as /p/, /b/, /m/, /d/ and /t/.

Ainur is now speaking in sentences up to 5-6 words long. She has made great progress with her speech sound development. Her mother stated, "Ainur's speech has significantly improved. She can now speak in full sentences and can communicate her needs." Ainur is also using many sound "approximations" which means she may not be making the sound perfectly but it is close enough that she can be understood by others. Her expressive language has grown considerably, with some of her favorites including "oh right" and "no way Jose." Ainur's oral motor control has continued to improve. She is gaining control of her jaw movements and has improved her lip closure enough to blow a variety of whistles.

Ainur's mother stated that, "The high quality of services and level of professionalism at this clinic are very rewarding. Our family feels fortunate to be receiving services here. We adopted Ainur from Kazakhstan, which was a significant financial endeavor. We don't know what we would have done without these services. It is difficult to get along in this world without being able to speak."

From the Master of Kadosh

Brethren,

Why are there 12 days of Christmas and when are they?

Christmastide is a 12-day liturgical period that runs from Christmas day

through January 5. The following day is Epiphany, which celebrates the visit of the Magi to the infant Jesus, described in the Bible, Matthew 2:1-12.

The Magi, or Wise Men, were a trio of high-powered Zoroastrian Priest/Astrologers from Persia, who brought carefully chosen gifts:

* Gold, the perennial precious metal, as a symbol of kingship on earth.

* Frankincense, an aromatic resin from the Boswellia tree, as a symbol of priesthood.

* Myrrh, a dark resin often used for embalming, as a symbol of death.

The role of the Magi in the story is to validate the royal status of the infant Jesus, as well as to foreshadow the events of his life. If the Bible account is in any way historical, it would sug-

gest a dramatic cross-cultural, interfaith event.

Historically, the Epiphany was the more significant feast day for centuries. Christmas began to emerge as a significant feast day during the High Middle Ages, 1000 to 1300 CE.

Christmas was actually banned by the Puritans in England in 1647, during the days of the Commonwealth. When Charles II became king in 1660, he restored the holiday and its celebrations. The Puritans did the same thing in Boston for 22 years.

When King George III married Charlotte of Mecklenburg -Strelitz, in the early 1800s, she introduced him to the German custom of the "Christmas tree." The Germans used to decorate their trees with apples, nuts, dates, pretzels, and paper flowers.

The practice of gift giving is not related to the Biblical story of the Magi. Nor did it begin with the original Santa

Claus persona.

This tradition centers around a character originally known as "Father Christmas." Originally Father Christmas was a mysterious fellow who came from somewhere in the far north, such as Lapland. He brought the spirit of good cheer during the Christmas season, in contrast to the Puritan ideal of avoiding celebrations. However, Father Christmas did not bring or distribute gifts, not was he children-oriented.

That all changed. Eventually, Father Christmas metamorphosed into Santa Claus, Saint Nicolas, Papa Noël, Weihnachtsmann, Julemanden, Babbo Natale, or one of many other names. And this guy is busy. So are his little elves, in their covert form as parents and grandparents, uncles and aunts.

Christmas has become one big economic stimulus package. Is all this gift giving activity a bad thing? A lot of

> people think it misses the point. It makes Christmas a big commercial exercise. That's like the Puritans, who, in their day, felt Christmas had become too much of a party.

When I watch people shopping for their loved ones, I see individuals planning for a big moment: when the recipient opens the gift. They want that moment

to be one of excitement, surprise, and joy. Sometimes it even works that way. It's hard to find something wrong with bringing a little joy to somebody you care about.

Another way to give is anonymously, by contributing to your favorite charity. Well-known and respected outfits like Second Harvest, The American Cancer Society, and Disabled American Veterans receive support from the general public. But Masonic charities, such as the Scottish Rite Children's Clinic, are supported almost entirely from members of the Masonic Fraternity, their families and estates.

Our Clinic is the first, last, and only source of treatment for an increasing number of children in the community. With California mired in financial problems, school services for problem students have been cut. As a result, Clinic enrollment is higher and the waiting list is longer than ever in history. So consider adding the Clinic to your Christmas list.
