From the Personal Representative:

or the past couple of months we have offered to any brother the chance to purchase and participate in "The Master Craftsman" a correspondence course sponsored by the Supreme Council, AASR that offers "Further Light in Masonry". Many have gotten into the course and some of us plan to study in groups, sharing the information and philosophy.

Obviously, one of the reasons many of our brethren subscribed to this course of study was to find out more about Masonry. This idea, to some may seem absurd, because those of our members who have subscribed are brothers who have labored in the vineyards of the Lodge, Scottish Rite, York Rite, Shrine, Eastern Star, and the countless other Masonic organizations we belong to, and in all of these we learn volumes about Masonry and its appendant bodies.

Some of the lessons are repetitive and redundant, imparting the need for morality, truthfulness, tolerance, charity, temperance, etc., etc., etc. but all teach a basic lesson of Self Improvement and Enlightenment.

What, then do we need with a new course of study that will simply offer a chance to learn lessons that we have already had explained to us in countless different ways? The detailed philosophy dramatized in the various degrees is certainly interesting and engaging, but couldn't we have absorbed these same lessons by sitting in or participating in the degrees without reading further?

Ill. Brother Albert Pike writes of the fascination of Masonry as the "... advancement toward the light on all the lines of progress, moral, intellectual, and spiritual ...," again the old theme of Self Improvement; Enlightenment, Moral Enrichment

However, in all my reading and re-reading so far, I came across an item that, to me, really stands out, It is the comment attributed to Albert Mackey's *The Symbolism of Freemasonry* (1882) quoted on page xii, which reads, "Now, this doctrine, that *labor is worship*, is the very doctrine that has

been advanced and maintained from time immemorial, as a leading dogma of the Order of Freemasonry."

That, it seems to me, as Mackey says, sums up the reasons most of us are committed to the Craft. Labor, itself, the actual effort we put forth in advancing the interests of Freemasonry, is one of the most fulfilling and inspiring aspects of who we are and what we do.

We recently lost a brother, Illustrious Bill Roberts 33^o, who exemplified this philosophy. Bill, a 47 year Mason was one who never rested. His work, whether it was in his Craft Lodge, Research Lodge, Scottish Rite, Shrine, Eastern Star Chapter, church, or at home, never flagged. He labored constantly simply for the joy and fulfillment it brought him.

As I visit lodges, chapters, and clubs around the valley, I see other members, too numerous to mention who reflect that same attitude. There are so many examples of this philosophy among members of the craft that I'm embarrassed to tell you that it took me so long to realize this great truth about our fraternal family.

Look around you, and if you aren't impressed by these realities, if you aren't inspired by the contributions these brothers and sisters make to Freemasonry and their communities, you'd better look again.

Finally, when you do see these examples of diligence and dedication, let the person who displays these qualities know of your observations. It never hurts to pass along the feeling that you care about your brothers and sisters and that you do, indeed, appreciate their work.

Also, for those brothers that are interested, we still have a number of spaces available at the study table. The course is enlightening and the company congenial. Give me a call.

It grew out of a celebration and parade in honor of the working class by the Knights of Labor in 1882 in <u>New York</u>. In 1884, the Knights held a large parade in New York City celebrating the working class. The parade was held on the first Monday in September. The Knights passed a resolution to hold all future parades on the same day, designated by them as Labor Day.

R eading Brother Benjamin Franklin again and came across a quotation worthy of sharing:


"Masonic labor is purely a labor of love. He who seeks to draw wages in gold or silver will be disappointed. The wages of a Mason are earned and paid in their dealings with one another: sympathy that begets sympathy, kindness begets kindness, helpfulness begets helpful-

ness, and these are the wages of a Mason."

How prophetic, the knowledge and character of Brother Franklin and how universal the tenants of our craft. Daily, I find myself examining the labors of Brother Masons and their earnings within our fraternity. Think about it!

If you want any "Masonic Treasures" you can certainly find them evident in their dealings with one another. Conversely, you can also find Brothers who seek to draw wages in gold or silver.

We have, this month, experienced the calling of several Brothers, whom the Great Architect needed. They all truly exemplified the purest exercise of Masonic Labor. The passing of Brothers Bill Roberts, Richard Fulton, and Jim Hutson created a void in each of us that can only be re-filled by our own continuing commitment to our ancient Craft. Soft and safe to each of you, my brethren because I know you are at my side as I prepare this message to your Brothers.



As the <u>Industrial Revolution</u> took hold of the nation, the average American in the late 1800s worked 12-hour days, seven days a week in order to make a basic living. Children were also working, as they provided cheap labor to employers and laws against child labor were not strongly enforced.

With the long hours and terrible working conditions,

American unions became more prominent and voiced their demands for a better way of life. On Tuesday September 5, 1882, 10,000 workers marched from city hall to Union Square in New York City, holding the first-ever Labor Day parade. Participants took an unpaid day-off to honor the workers of America, as well as vocalize issues they had with employers. As years passed, more states began to hold these parades, but Congress would not legalize the holiday until 12 years later.

On May 11, 1894, workers of the Pullman Palace Car Company in Chicago struck to protest wage cuts and the firing of union representatives. They sought support from their union led by <u>Eugene V. Debs</u> and on June 26 the American Railroad Union called a boycott of all Pullman railway cars. Within days, 50,000 rail workers complied and railroad traffic out of Chicago came to a halt. On July 4, President <u>Grover Cleveland</u> dispatched troops to Chicago. Much rioting and bloodshed ensued, but the government's actions broke the strike and the boycott soon collapsed. <u>Debs</u> and three other union officials were jailed for disobeying the injunction. The strike brought worker's rights to the public eye and Congress declared, in 1894, that the first Monday in September would be the holiday for workers, known as Labor Day.

The founder of Labor Day remains unclear, but some credit either Peter McGuire, co-founder of the <u>American</u> <u>Federation of Labor</u>, or Matthew Maguire, a secretary of the Central Labor Union, for proposing the holiday.

Although Labor Day is meant as a celebration of the labor movement and its achievements, it has come to be celebrated as the last, long summer weekend before Autumn.

From the Clinic!!!

Katie is a delightful seven-year-old girl who recently finished speech and language services at the San Jose Scottish Rite Language Disorders Clinic. Katie and her family worked diligently and put a lot of time and commitment into her speech program.

Katie was diagnosed with childhood apraxia of speech before coming to the clinic. Another therapist had told her mother there wasn't much hope for improving Katie's speech. Apraxia creates a difficulty producing, sequencing and coordinating oral movements. Children with apraxia have a difficult time producing and combining sounds to create words. As a result their speech can be difficult to understand, as was the case for Katie. Katie's mother stated, "It was hard for Katie's teachers and friends to understand what she was saying. My husband and I could usually understand her but it was so hard for all of us when we couldn't. She would get frustrated

and end up crying." In other aspects such as language development and academic skills Katie was excelling. However, at her age she was becoming more and more aware that people couldn't understand her. This was causing frustration at home and school.

After being enrolled in therapy Katie quickly showed progress, however she had a long course of treatment ahead of her. She came twice per week for 45 minutes and also participated in a home program mirroring what was being done in therapy. Katie worked on a mixture of oral motor exercises and speech sounds that followed a hierarchy of difficulty. Katie's mother stated, "Her treatment impacted our family tremendously. Conversations flow so much more smoothly, she is much more confident. Katie had a new friend over yesterday and I asked if the new friend understood her. Katie replied, "Oh yes, she understood everything Mommy, my speech is so good now."

In July of this year, Katie met all of her goals and was discharged from therapy. Thanks in large part to her supportive family she is truly a success story. While we are so proud of Katie's hard work, she and her family are a missed presence in our clinic. Katie's mother stated numerous times how grateful she was for the services provided by the Scottish Rite. She stated, "Katie and her therapist worked so well together. Katie went from not being understood by others and being teased to now being understood and having complete confidence. She finds it much easier to make friends now. We would not have been able to afford private treatments, so receiving services with Scottish Rite has been a true blessing for our family."

When asked to describe her experience at the clinic Katie's mother said, "Our experience could not have been more comfortable. Katie loved going to speech every week. I have already told so many people about you service. My friends have been just as happy as I have been. It is hard to know where to begin when your child has a language disorder but Scottish Rite guided us with each step. It is a very professionally run organization."Katie and her family were a joy to work with. She is a perfect example of how therapy services mixed with great family support can yield wonderful progress. Katie's mother commented, "I just can't thank Katie's therapist and the Scottish Rite Clinic enough for helping our daughter overcome her apraxia. You have given our family a wonderful gift."

The Constitution

S eptember 17 marks the 221st anniversary of the United States Constitution. Our Constitution is truly a remarkable document. No other country has had a



living document that has survived for more than two hundred years! That remarkably short document has been amended from time to time but its basic structure has remained unchanged. This stability is a tribute to our founding Fathers – the drafters of our Constitution.

The drafter of the Constitution saw fit to provide a framework that would allow no branch of Government to obtain too much power. In fact, The Fathers consciously built into our governmental structure a delicate balance of power. Over the course of the past months we have seen that balance of power in operation. The confirmation hearings of the President's nominees to various offices constitutes a living example of the "advise and consent" of the Senate which is a vital part of the delicate balance of power.

When our founding Fathers began to draft the constitution, they did not do so in a vacuum. They looked at all of the excesses and faults of other governmental systems and sought to establish a system that would remedy those problems. Government by constitution sometimes seems to be government by trail and error. The United States Constitution, on the other hand, has truly stood the test of time. The principles embodied in the Constitution are basic ones. They are principles that ensure a vibrant and lasting democracy!

It is instructive to know a little bit about who the drafters of the Constitution were. Nine signers of the Constitution were Masons. Evidence of membership or affiliation for thirteen other signers does exist. Six additional signers later became Masons making 28 of 40 signers of the Constitution Freemasons!

Past history gives Freemasons much to be proud of because this Nation's Government was structured by the tenets of Freemasonry!




