OURFLAG

The American flag is the symbol of our nation's strength, unity and freedom. Today the flag consists of thirteen horizontal stripes, seven red alternating with 6 white. These stripes represent he original 13 colonies and the stars in the union represent the 50 states. The red stripes symbolize valor

and bravery; white stripes symbolize purity and innocence; and the blue symbolizes vigilance, perseverance and justice.

The purpose of our government is to protect the rights of the individual: freedom of speech, press and religion; the right to keep and bear arms; freedom to assemble; the right to a just trial by a jury; and the right to vote. All of these rights seek to assure that no innocent individual is forced against his will. Our flag carries American ideal, history and feelings. Every Color in the flag means liberty – "divine right of liberty in man". The American flag symbolizes a government of, for and by the people.

The display and honor of our flag express our gratitude for those who fought and died for this country and acknowledge our obligation to preserve the freedom for future generations.

The American flag is also known as "Old Glory". As Captain William Driver, a shipmaster of Salem, Ma. was departing on a voyage, some friends presented him with a beautiful flag of twenty four stars. When the flag was hoisted into the ocean breeze, he explained "OLD GLORY". Captain Driver later moved to Nashville and after Tennessee seceded from the Union, he hid the flag in a bedcover. After Union forces captured Nashville, people began to ask him if "OLD GLORY" still existed. He took the flag out and with the Sixth Ohio Regiment raised the flag over the capitol. The Regiment cheered and saluted and adopted the nickname of "Old Glory" as their own. The Regiment spread the word and "OLD GLORY was adopted! Captain Driver's grave is located in Nashville and is one of three places authorized by an act of Congress where the Flag of The United States may be flown 24 hours a day.

Lord help us live every day as we will wish we had when we come to die. Amen.



Scottish Rite of Freemasonry ROTC Award

The Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, through scholarship grants, Rite Care Clinics helping children to communicate, and patriotic programs, benefits communities across the nation in direct and dynamic ways

every day of the year.

The purpose of the ROTC award is to recognize an outstanding cadet in the second year or third year of a 4-year program. The award consists of a medal, ribbon, and certificate. The medal depicts the heraldic double-headed eagle logo of the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry.

Ty is an energetic, fun-loving four year old boy who began receiving services at the San Jose Scottish Rite Childhood Language Disorders Clinic because his parents were concerned about his intelligibility. Ty's parents noticed that his decreased intelligibility was affecting his self-confidence and that he was getting frustrated or would shut down when people did not under-

stand him. Ty was tested at our clinic and was found to have a mild articulation disorder. His receptive and expressive language skills were also tested and were found to be within normal limits. Ty had lots of things to say, he was just having a hard time making himself understood.

Given Ty's age at the time of testing, some of his speech errors were normal for a child his age, but other error patterns were not. His speech errors could be classified as phonological in nature, meaning he had groups of sounds that were being misarticulated based on a particular pattern. For example, Ty was using pre-vocalic voicing in which all of the initial sounds of words were voiced when they were not supposed to be. Thus, he would say "bop" for "pop" or "dop" for "top". In addition, Ty used the phonological process of velar fronting so that "cup" was pronounced as "dup" and "frog" was pronounced as "fod". Tyler used many other phonological processes, but in therapy we focused treatment on these two patterns to help increase intelligibility as quickly as possible.

Since treatment was initiated, Ty has made exceptional gains. He has stopped using the phonological process of pre-vocalic voicing and has almost discontinued using velar fronting. Recently he used velar sounds correctly in his spontaneous speech with nearly 80% accuracy! Once he achieves at least 85% to 90% accuracy in his spontaneous speech for at least 3 to 4 consecutive weeks, Ty will have mastered his velar sounds too.

His parents have noticed an improvement with Ty's speech as well. They commented that "being able to clearly understand what he is saying has been very rewarding....Ms. Rachel has been an excellent speech therapist for our son. He is learning so much every week and enjoys going to see her."

June 2011 Clinic Director's Message

I am happy to report that the clinic has received and installed a new desktop computer and monitor, purchased by the San Jose Scottish Rite Foundation for use by both the clinicians and the children whom we serve. Thank you!

During the month of April, we completed 239 patient treatment hours, including four (4) screenings. 53 children received speech and language services in April. We have served a total of 91 children year-to-date. We now have 114 children on our waiting list.

The Foundation Board continues to explore avenues by which we may be able to increase our clinic staff on a part-time basis and reduce the number of children on the waiting list.



Fathers' Day

Father's Day in the United States is on the third Sunday of June. It celebrates the contribution that fathers and father figures make for their children's lives. Its origins may lie in a memorial service held for a large group of men, many of them fathers, who were killed in a mining accident in Monongah, West Virginia in 1907.

What do people do?

Father's Day is an occasion to mark and celebrate the contribution that your own father has made to your life. Many people send or give cards or gifts to their fathers. Common Father's Day gifts include sports items or clothing, electronic gadgets, outdoor cooking supplies and tools for household maintenance. Father's Day is a relatively modern holiday so different families have a range of traditions. These can range from a simple phone call or greetings card to large parties honoring all of the 'father' figures in a particular extended family. Father figures can include fathers, step-fathers, fathers-in-law, grandfathers and great-grandfathers and even other male relatives. In the days and weeks before Father's Day, many schools and Sunday schools help their pupils to prepare a hand-made card or small gift for their fathers.

Public Life

Father's Day is not a federal holiday. Organizations, businesses and stores are open or closed, just as they are on any other Sunday in the year. Public transit systems run to their normal Sunday schedules. Restaurants may be busier than usual, as some people take their fathers out for a treat. The first time Father's Day was held in June was in 1910. Father's Day was officially recognized as a holiday in 1972 by President Nixon.

Brethren,

June 14, the date of our June stated meeting is Flag Day. On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress meeting at Philadelphia adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved that the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

The resolution gave no instruction as to how many points the stars should have, nor how the stars should be arranged on the union. Consequently, some flags had stars scattered on the blue field without any specific design, some arranged the stars in rows, and some in a circle. The first Navy Stars and Stripes had the stars arranged in staggered formation in alternate rows of threes and twos on a

blue field. Other Stars and Stripes flags had stars arranged in alternate rows of four, five and four. Some stars had six points while others had eight.

Tradition has it that Betsy Ross is responsible for the original flag with thirteen five-pointed stars in a circle, but there is no proof that she was the first. Mrs. Ross, a patriot continued to make flags for fifty years, but the "Betsy Ross Flag" did not appear until the 1790's.
