From the Personal Representative:

This month's message is going to be something of a continuation of "The Four T's of Masonry" and will be another of the explicit qualities we are taught to practice in our daily lives; that of Temperance.

This is another of the many personal characteristics taught in the first degree, and I have included it in this series for several reasons. First that I might get the readers thinking in the direction this subject leads us, and secondly, if we are discussing personal qualities, temperance should be high on everyone's list.

In the First Degree, we are told that Temperance is that due restraint on the affections and passions that renders the body tame and governable and frees the mind from the allurement of vice. This quality alone is one of the pre-eminent characteristics of a judicious, well disciplined life. We can be cheerful, out-going, and possessed of a lively sense of humor and still exercise Temperance.

A temperate person is sensitive to the concerns of others and courteous to all, without becoming unnecessarily subservient. A temperate person considers consequences before rushing into ill advised or hastily conceived situations. A temperate person controls his or her anger when confronted with difficult situations or with difficult people. Temperate people are pleasant to be with, because they exercise self control and are slow to wrath, as we are instructed in the Holy Writings.

Another word for temperance might be moderation. We seek moderation in all that we do and say because it reflects good taste and self restraint. The architectural instrument that best represents temperance, of course, is the compass. It reminds us to contain our desires and keep our passions under control toward all mankind. It teaches us self restraint.

Have you ever encountered an inconsiderate driver and, after he or she has passed you, you look down and see a bumper sticker or other emblem that identifies that person as a member of a religious group or other organization that preaches the Golden Rule? How do his hasty or inconsiderate actions affect your thinking with regard to that person's representation of that organization?

We, as identified with the family of Masonry, dwell in glass houses. Our actions are being scrutinized continually, and because we are Masons, we are held to a higher standard than the general public. Our families, our co-workers, the members of our church, and even our friends tend to hold us to answer for our actions on a little higher plane than they do of the rest of society, and that is the way we have chosen to live. When we accepted the mantle of Masonry, we committed to a set of principles by which we agreed to govern our lives and that set of principles says that we are to be temperate in our every act and word.

When I hear a brother Mason use foul, inconsiderate, or abusive language, I mentally cringe, because that type of language is intemperate. It hurts him more than it hurts the person for whom it is intended, but it also hurts the fraternity. When I see a brother act inconsiderately or intolerantly toward another, I want to look for a place to hide, because I am embarrassed for the sake of our principles.

It is one of the four cardinal virtues, I know, but moreover, it is our obligation to ourselves and our fraternity to exercise temperance in all we do in this life.

International History of the Scottish Rite

The Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, as we know it today, had its origins on the continent of Europe. Its immediate predecessor, known as The Order of the Royal Secret, consisted of 25 Degrees under the Constitutions of 1762. Masonic tradition maintains that Lodges of this Rite, transmitted from Bordeaux in France through the West Indies to the American mainland, were established at New Orleans, Louisiana, in 1763; at Albany, New York, in 1767; at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in 1781–82; and at Charleston, South Carolina, in 1783. The Grand Constitutions of 1786 provided for an extension of the Rite to thirty-three Degrees, governed in each country under a Supreme Council of the Thirty-third and Last Degree. Its provisions were cited in a Manifesto at Charleston that confirmed the first Supreme Council ever opened under these Grand Constitutions, on May 31, 1801, "by Brothers John Mitchell and Frederick Dalcho." All regular and recognized Supreme Councils and their Subordinate Bodies today are descended directly or collaterally from this Mother Supreme Council of the World.

The Name

In announcing its establishment to the Masonic world in that Manifesto, dated December 4, 1802, the name was given as The Supreme Council of the Thirty-third Degree for the United States of America. The word Scotch appeared in connection with one of the early Supreme Council Degrees, and Scotish (sic) was included in the name of one of the detached Degrees conferred by The Supreme Council. The name Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite first appeared in an 1804 agreement between the Supreme Council of France and the Grand Orient of France. Beginning with the administration of Grand Commander Albert Pike in 1859, it came into general use in the Southern Jurisdiction and elsewhere. Many Scottish Masons fled to France during political upheavals in the 17th and 18th centuries, at a time when the Degrees of the Rite were evolving in French Freemasonry. This has caused some to think mistakenly that the Rite originated in Scotland. Actually, however, a Supreme Council for Scotland was not established until 1846.



From the Commander



The degrees of the Council of Kadosh are chivalric and philosophical, but also contain mystical material. The word "Kadosh" is a Hebrew word meaning "Holy". The complexity of these degrees

cannot be overstated and is exemplified by the number of pages attributed to them in *Morals and Dogma*. The twenty-eighth degree alone is over a quarter of the 1000+ page tome.

19th degree - Grand Pontiff: The lessons of this degree are learned from the past and how it affects the present and the way we live in the future. We always strive to endure, produce and improve the world as it surrounds us. *There is no apron*, but the jewel is a gold "parallelogram" (rectangle) with a

Greek Alpha on one side and an Omega on the other.

20th degree - Master of the Symbolic Lodge:

This degree shows us Liberty, Fraternity and Equality. These teach moral, religious and philosophical understanding. This degree helps one to comprehend Deity, forces of nature, good and evil. *The apron* is yellow, bordered in blue, with three concentric point-down triangles, with the Tetragrammaton (horizontal) and "Fiat Lux" (vertical) at the center, forming a cross. Its triangular shape relates to the "fourth great light, which reminds us of the Deity and his attributes." *The jewel* is gold, with the same three concentric triangles.

From the Clinic!!!

Nils is a 6 year old boy who has been seen at the Scottish Rite Childhood Language Disorders Clinic twice per week. He starts each day at our clinic with a smile and has been a tremendous pleasure to work with during his time here.

Nils has had to overcome many health and developmental obstacles to reach where he is today. He is a hard worker with a great disposition and wonderfully supportive parents. Nils was born weighing only 4 pounds and very ill. He had respiratory distress syndrome with pleural effusions, a significant heart murmur and pulmonary stenosis. Nils was in the neonatal intensive care unit for the first month of his life and required oxygen treatments to treat his slow lung maturity. He also had severe gastroesophageal reflux as well as feeding difficulties, which



required him to eat via a feeding tube for the first 3 months of his life. Nils was given a medical diagnosis of Noonan's Syndrome, which is a genetic disorder with features that can include congenital heart malformation, short stature, learning problems, indentation of the chest, impaired blood clotting, and a characteristic configuration of facial features.

Noonan's Syndrome can vary widely from person to person and Nils has made great gains over the course of his many treatments. Nils began early intervention services at six months of age, which by the time he was 3 years old had included special education teachers as well as physical, occupational, speech and specialized feeding therapies. At about 1 year of age, Nils had a gastronomy feeding tube placed for feedings to supplement what he was eating orally.

When treatment began at this clinic, Nils had many oral motor delays. These delays were a result of a lack of strength and coordination as well as sensory issues. Nils was "orally sensitive" meaning that he didn't like to be touched around or in his mouth. Nils drooled consistently and lacked the oral control and sensory awareness to keep his mouth closed and swallow, as well as the strength and control to produce many speech sounds. Nils was verbal, however he was hard to understand. Nils also lacked control in his body and strength in his respiratory system to produce the pressure and volume needed to carry on intelligible conversation consistently. At the same time, Nils' language, academic and social skills were developing nicely.

Nils' treatment focused on a mix of oral motor, articulation and language goals, all centered on helping him become a better, more clear communicator. As time passed, Nils gained increased control and strength in both his oral musculature as well as his respiratory support for speech. His sounds became easier to understand, he began using much longer sentences to express himself and many of his oral sensitivities decreased. Nils is now working on more complex sounds such as /s/ blends like spoon and sweater and /l/ words like love and lollipop.

Nils' mother was referred to our clinic by a parent in his Early Start program. She stated, "Since beginning speech and language services here, Nils' speech is very much improved. He is talking in complete sentences and can communicate all his ideas by speech." She said, "The sessions work well with our schedule and Angela has a wonderful relationship with Nils. She is able to work with him in a way that he thinks he is still playing." She stated, "It is very rewarding for our family to hear Nils communicate and try to speak clearly."

Nils continues to receive speech and language as well as occupational therapies. He continues to make great progress and is a very talkative young man. Nils LOVES to play! He often states, "Let's play all day long!" He enjoys trains, books, cars, dinosaurs, Scooby Doo and loves to talk about Star Wars. He says his favorite food is sushi and loves to tell jokes and be silly. Nils and his family are a true delight.

31st degree - Inspector Inquisitor:

This degree teaches prayerful selfexamination. The mistakes today should not be committed tomorrow.

Simply, the daily look at ones self to learn to live with the future. *No apron* is worn in the Supreme Tribunal, but in inferior bodies, a white sheep-skin apron with a silver Teutonic cross may be worn. The jewel is a silver Teutonic cross. *The jewel* may be suspended from a white collar, with a gold triangle with a "31" inside it. But in inferior bodies it may be suspended from a golden chain, the links of which form the eight fundamental degrees of Masonry: The 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 14th, 16th, 18th, and 30th.
