From the Personal Representative:

Brethren and Ladies,

Recently the San Luis Obispo County Scottish Rite Club held their annual installation of officers. I was privileged to be the installing Officer and several other members of the "Northern" reaches of the Valley of San Jose were also in attendance. Brother Jerry Boxer 32° KCCH was installed as President of the club. The following is his acceptance speech. I was impressed by his talk, and think you too, will be. Here it is.

Brethren, Ladies and Distinguished Guests: It is with a feeling of great honor and also with a feeling of great humility that I again enter into this office; honor because of the trust in me evidenced by being elected to this position, and humility because of the realization of the responsibility it places upon me. It was six years ago that I first was elected to hold this office, and the Scottish Rite has held a large part of my heart since I first went through the degrees. As many of you may know, I have recently been having health problems, including 2 major surgeries in the past several months, but I am recovering well.

Masonry, as an institution, is very important to me. I am following in the footsteps of my father, who was a Scottish Rite Mason, a Shriner, Worshipful Master of his Lodge in Chicago in 1944; and of my brother who was a Mason, raised incidentally, by my father when he was Master. As with all Masons, my first allegiance to the craft is to the Blue Lodge, the foundation of all Masonry, and the place where the infinite wisdom of the Order was first introduced to me. It was through the degrees of the Scottish Rite, however, that the depth of meaning of the three degrees of Masonry began to really come to life in my mind.

Above all, the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Masonry is an educational institution.

Throughout its history it has stood as a beacon guiding us away from the dangers of ignorance. Our rituals and writ-



ings are deeply involved with teaching us about great ideals of morality, philosophy, religion and philanthropy, without being encumbered by sectarian doctrine that would restrict its universality.

As a movement, it seeks not to teach the "truth," but rather it teaches a way to find the truth, leaving it up to each individual to discover what his own truth is. It seeks only to be a guide to the common-

alities of various philosophical and religious approaches to belief so that we may be more united in our standards of right and wrong, and in our understanding of the reality of God.

*There is an interesting quote from the great work by Albert Pike; *Morals and Dogma*, which states, "Everyone is entirely free to reject and dissent from whatsoever herein may seem to him to be untrue or unsound. It is only required of him that he shall weigh what is taught, and give it fair hearing and judgment." That is a really strange comment from a work that contains the word "dogma," but it is a clear indication that the symbolism of Freemasonry is open to many viewpoints and the "true" viewpoint is your own understanding.*

This points out the very democracy of Freemasonry, and much of the beauty of the Scottish Rite. There are moral and philosophical guides presented, but, ultimately, it is the individual who must decide for himself what the important truths really are.

Interestingly enough, there was no connection with Scotland in the development of the organization. It appears that during the 17th and 18th centuries, a time of great political upheaval, many Scottish Masons fled to France, at a time when the ritual was evolving, and lending their name to the movement. As a matter of fact, the Supreme Council of Scotland was not established until 1846.

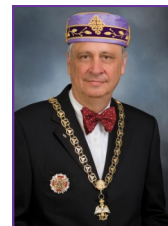

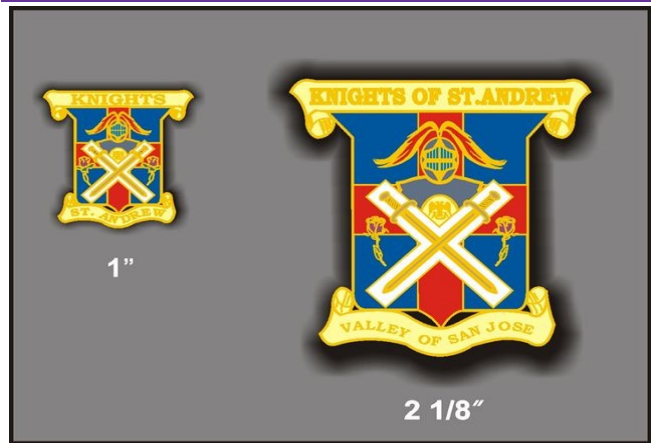

In keeping with the Grand Master's program to try to re-energize our Masonic Youth Orders, I submit to you the following article and although it is from an older publication, it is nonetheless valuable.

Order of DeMolay

Although it has been more than 650 years since Jacques DeMolay died as a martyr to truth and fidelity, the ideas for which he gave his life are being perpetuated by young men the world over as members of the Order of DeMolay.

A youth organization open to young men between the ages of 13 and 21, DeMolay is separate and distinct from any affiliation, including Masonry. Membership is not restricted to relatives of Masons, but open to all who merit the honor.

It is a youth organization that shares many precepts with Freemasonry and many DeMolays later join Masonic Lodges. More than 100 have become Grand Masters. Like Masonry, it has a beautiful ritual with invaluable

moral lessons.

Since its founding by Frank Land over half a century ago, nearly 3,000,000 young men have knelt at altars of 2,500 chapters in 11 countries and territories. Among leaders in school and community, DeMolays have gone on to distinguished careers in business, government, military, entertainment and athletics.

Men such as Walt Disney, John Wayne, Chet Huntley, Vaughn Monroe, Bob Mathias, Fred MacMurray, Alvin Dark, John Steinbeck, and countless others have been DeMolays.

On the 50th anniversary of DeMolay, Walter Cronkite wrote in part, "DeMolay does a lot for a young man of today. It provides a valuable supplement to the principles and guidelines he has been taught by his parents, the school, and the church . . . Heaven only knows we read, hear and see a lot of 'what's wrong with young people today.' We need DeMolay for the youth of our country."

From the Clinic!!!



Dominic is a charming four year old boy who has been attending the San Jose Scottish Rite Childhood Speech and Language Clinic for a little over a year. Dominic initially came to the clinic when his pediatrician recommended a speech and language evaluation due to some delayed speech sounds. An evaluation conducted at our clinic found that Dominic had a mild articulation disorder as he had difficulty producing some early developing sounds. An articulation disorder occurs when a child substitutes one sound for another, omits sounds, or distorts sounds. There is a specific range of ages when children should produce each sound correctly. A child is appropriate for treatment when their error pattern continues after a certain age.

When Dominic first started treatment he was sometimes hard to understand and was getting frustrated. After a short time in treatment however his family noticed that his frustration level was decreasing and he was becoming more intelligible. During the past year Dominic has worked very hard on a variety of sounds, including “f”, “k”, “p”, “s”, “sh” and “ch”. His parents and grandparents have been instrumental in helping Dominic master his sounds. His family’s dedication to bringing him consistently to treatment and doing homework each week has been essential to Dominic’s progress.

We are very excited for Dominic because in the next few months he will graduate from the clinic! Here is a short note from Dominic’s mother regarding the clinic: “The services we have received at Scottish Rite are superb! The therapists are well trained and wonderful with the children...I have personally referred four other families to the clinic. I feel the learning environment is wonderful for children and that all children would benefit from the services offered. Much thanks to all the hard work that goes into providing exceptional speech and language services...We truly appreciate everything.”

We have a new clinician on staff as of the middle of March. When you have the time and/or opportunity, please introduce yourself to Sharon Lewis. She comes highly recommended and is charged with helping us reduce our wait list and picking up additional responsibilities when Rachael Sense takes her maternity leave. In the meantime, our clinic staff has been increased and we are “making hay while the sun shines.” (Or at least while Rachael is still here.)

From the Master of Kadosh

This month we celebrate Maundy Thursday at Scottish Rite. For the Chapter of Rose Croix, it's the biggest event of the year. For the Consistory, it's an event we enthusiastically support. I understand that we are doing the Remembrance Ceremony this year, so be sure to attend with your wife or significant other.



The two major religious holidays we observe in the US during this time are Easter and Passover. The stories recounted for these holidays are interesting and inspiring, whether you consider them from a religious, philosophical, or historical point-of-view. Both stories tell of facing and overcoming powerful injustice, in the end rising above what you were to a new height of being.

Doesn't that sound inspiring? Doesn't that make you want to read the story of the Exodus or the Resurrection? Well, that's the idea.

At this time of year, I enjoy watching Cecil B. DeMille's movie *The Ten Commandments* with Charlton Heston as Moses and Yul Brenner as Ramses. I like the eloquent language the actors speak. For example, Prince Ramses says of Moses, "The city he builds shall bear my name, the woman he loves shall bear my child." If the movie doesn't come on TV at a convenient time, I watch my copy of the Director's Cut 50th Anniversary edition video.

Because the Exodus and Ten Commandments stories are written in the so-called Old Testament, they are legacies of the Jewish, Christian, and Muslim faiths. On the other hand, the story of Jesus' resurrection on Easter morning seems to have been interpreted as a Christian-only event. It's just my opinion, but I think that notion is too restrictive.

Paul, an early convert to the fledgling Christian movement and eventually one of its key leaders, did not limit resurrection to Christians. In Acts 24:15, Paul says that this mystical, unexplained phenomenon -- the transformation of dead mortals into the living immortals -- applies to everybody, all human beings. That comes from somebody who was there at the beginning, who was in a position to understand the original idea and intention.

Essentially, Easter symbolizes the concept that death is not the end, rather the next step in one's continuing existence. Since death is a part of life, and each of us will pass through the experience some day, then this message is clearly for everybody. The Easter story does not attempt to answer all of your questions. Yet it does offer you hope, comfort, and encouragement.

Check out these stories for yourself. Every Mason has a Bible. Open yours and enjoy reading it.

Finally, our Scholarship Selection Committee evaluated the applications and selected our 2009 Scholarship recipient.

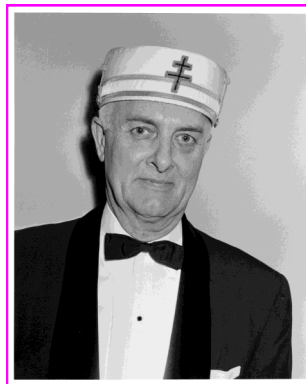
