

The Rite Word

From the Venerable Master

A sense of *Community* is something that every person desires and is the underpinning link in the chain of society. Everyone wants to belong and to feel like their presence adds value. Everyone wants to be part of a greater whole. This concept is deep rooted in not only our country, but throughout the world in all human associations and religions.



When one looks with a keener eye, we find a deeper love of and appreciation for *Community* as expressed through God and Country.

Community is observed through the eyes of the lewish faith under the Shavuot. The religious observance consists of the grain harvest, and the giving of the Torah. Shavuot is one of three ancient pilgrimage festivals, and focuses on the synagogue, community, and its ritual. The Community gathers at the synagogue for special readings including medieval poems and the book of Ruth. The book of Ruth is important as its setting takes place during the time of the barley harvest, and the assumption by Ruth of Naomi's religion was symbolic of the Israelites' accepting the Torah at Sinai. This also includes the period of time when King David died according to rabbinical tradition, which we find during this season, in the end readings of Ruth. A strong sense of Community is observed during the all-night study sesof Tikkun Leil Shavuot. During sions Shavuot both Hallel, the Psalms of Praise (Psalms 113-118), this is observed along with Yikor, it being a memorial service. Through the community of Shavuot, historic consciousness is found. One can observe that it takes the form of a covenant between God above and Israel at

Mt. Sinai below and is an emblematic marriage between God and the *community* of Israel, in hope and celebration of the springtime of their relationship.

The Star Spangled Banner, Stars and Stripes, and of course Old Glory are but a few names that the flag of our country goes by. This month we have the opportunity to pay our respects to our flag, the symbolic emblem of our nation. June 14th was chosen by Bernard Cigrand in 1885 to hold a 'Flag Birthday' or 'Flag day.' He arranged to hold this observance for his students in Fredonia, Wisconsin. In 1889, George Balch of New York did the same for his pupils. Two years later the New York school board formally adopted this observance. Many important groups and individuals supported this tradition, and it grew. On June 14, 1894, over 300,000 school children observed Flag day. This was not to be only for the children; in 1914, Franklin K. Lane spoke about what the flag symbolically spoke to him that morning, "I am what you make me; nothing more. I swing before your eyes as a bright gleam of color, a symbol of yourself." The celebration became an official holiday when Woodrow Wilson made the official proclamation in 1916. On August 3, 1949, our Brother and President Harry Truman signed an act of Congress designating June 14th of every year as National Flag Day, and since that day, we have the opportunity to honor the flag of our great country every year. We have a community of children, teachers, and leaders to thank for this, and of course a little help from a Brother. Take a moment and listen to our brother Red Skelton's rendition of the Flag salute online. What a wonderful sense of Community, Country, and God!

29th Degree – Scottish Knight of Saint Andrew

The main theme of the 29th Degree focuses on the fictionalized events, which take place after the capture of the chivalric Knights of the Alliance.



The Sultan Beyazid, received at his temporary court, which set in the interior of the Cathedral of St. Andrew, several chivalric Knights who belong to the Order of St. Andrew.

The Sultan Quoting from the prophet Mohammed, "Thou shalt not degrade noble enemies!", immediately unchains the Knights and provides a respectful opportunity to eventually set them free.

While the incidents that portrayed in this degree are not historical in fact, the lesson taught is Toleration – which is one of the great tenets of Freemasonry. This degree is unique in the sense that it is the only Scottish Rite degree where religious tolerance, particularly between Christianity and Islam, the second largest monotheistic religion in the world, is emphasized.

33rd Degree—Inspector General Honorary

Achieving the 33rd Degree, Inspector General Honorary (IGH), is an honor bestowed on a just handful of Scottish Rite Masons. Originally, there were only nine members of the Supreme Council. And they were the only 33rd Degree members in the Scottish Rite. Over the years the number of Sovereign Inspectors General (SGIG) in the Supreme Council was periodically expanded.

In 1857, the Supreme Council chose to expand the number of Scottish Rite Brothers who could receive the 33rd Degree. The SGIGs became Inspectors General Active (IGA), and the additional 33rd Degree members were called Inspectors General Honorary (IGH). Today, there are 33 SGIGs or "Active 33rds" in the Supreme Council.

What do you learn in the 33rd Degree?

Like all Masonic degrees, the 33rd coveys a lot of information and emphasizes moral rectitude and service. If you have taken the time to study the rituals and lectures of the preceding Scottish Rite degrees, you will recognize a summary and application of their lessons in the 33rd.

Despite some people's colorful imaginations, the 33rd degree is not convey secrets about space aliens, the national treasure, or magical powers. But it does provide what Tantric Buddhists call "abhisheka" or an "empowerment".

A Buddhist empowerment is the transfer of power during a ceremony to give recipients the authorization to hear, study, and practice the teachings of the "Vajrayana" (meaning the diamond or lightning path). "Vajra" is a term used to signify the absolutely real and indestructible in a human being—as opposed to the fictions an individual entertains about himself and his nature—and "yana", the spiritual pursuit of the ultimately valuable and indestructible.

The 33rd Degree presents an aspect of humanity of which many of us are not fully aware. This perspective enables us to better understand and deal with the realities of the human experience and human society in which we, as Scottish Rite Masons, are to serve and help improve.

The 33rd Degree is about empowering the recipients' vision to more effectively and efficiently contribute to the world around them. It is essential to understand our role as leaders, how to go about leading, and how to interpret the results of our efforts.

Good leadership does not always give rise to success. Leadership has nothing to do with scoring points, getting your ticket punched, climbing the ladder, gathering honors, or accumulating wealth. True leadership is taught or exemplified in many Masonic degrees. If you pay attention and apply what you learn, it will greatly benefit your efforts.

It is all about work, effort, and caring about your neighbor as you do yourself. Your reward may be as subtle as restoring a smile to the faced of a troubled individual.

You must accept the concept that Truth and Justice will ultimately prevail. Then you make it your mission in life to do all you can so it actually happens. You are not defeated until you choose to quit. You may feel exhaustion, frustration, ridicule, and even trauma along the way. There is nothing wrong with stepping back for a while to heal or rest. Then you rise up and resume the struggle.

Nomination to the 33rd Degree

Every two years, the Supreme Council informs each Scottish Rite Valley of the number of nominations for the 33rd Degree that Valley is allowed to make. The current IGHs and the Personal Representative hold a meeting to discuss possible nominees.

The last figure this author heard was that no more than two percent (2%) of a Valley's total membership may be 33rd Degree Masons. If your Valley has a lot of members, it may be allowed to nominate two or maybe three Scottish Rite Brothers for the 33rd Degree. On the other hand, if your members are few, your Valley may not have any openings in a nomination cycle.

It is easy to identify prospective nominees. They are the guys you always see at meetings, community service activities, conferring or communicating degrees, and other Scottish Rite functions. And they are active in their Blue Lodges, as well. For the 33rd Degree, candidates must have been 32nd Degree Knights Commander of the Court of Honor (KCCH) for at least 45 months.

At its biennial session (every two years) the Supreme Council elects members of the Rite, nominated by their respective Valleys, to receive the 33rd Degree. Each nominee must be unanimously approved by the members of the Supreme Council. Why require a unanimous vote? Because the 33rd Degree Brothers become honorary members of the Supreme Council, just like applicants for Masonry go on to become members of a Masonic Lodge.

What does a 33rd Degree Mason do?

As an Inspector General Honorary, you are entitled to sit in the Supreme Council in its biennial session. You can propose measures and statutes, move amendments and substitutes, and join in the discussion of questions arising upon propositions and amendments you have offered.

You may be assigned as a Deputy of the Supreme Council for a State or Territory, with all the powers of the Active members. This arrangement is necessary since there are only 33 Active members but there are more than 33 states and territories in the Southern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite.

33rd Degree Jewel

A description of the 33rd Degree jewel is found in the Grand Constitutions of 1786. You can find that description on the Supreme Council website. Here is a revision of the description expressed in the words of a 21st-century person:

At the bottom is a dark red Teutonic cross. The arms of the cross are formed by four tau (T-shaped) crosses. Atop the cross is a golden cross formed by two pillars. Each of the outside arms of the tau crosses is superimposed with five tiny equilateral crosses.

Atop the Teutonic cross assembly, from the lower right to the upper left rests a sword. From the lower left to upper right rests the Hand of Justice at the end of a long rod. On top of them is a ninepointed star formed by three interlaced golden triangles. These collectively make up what are called the Grand Decorations of the Order.

Imposed at the center of the Grand Decorations is the Shield of the Order. It consists of an azure (sky blue) shield, with a doubleheaded eagle. At the eagle's right is a balance. At its left are the Masonic Square and Compasses.

Around the shield runs a band with the Latin inscription, ORDO AB CHAO, which means "Order from Chaos". The inscription is enclosed by two circles, formed by two serpents, each biting his own tail. Such a serpent is commonly known as the Ouroboros.

The golden interlaced triangles form nine small triangles around the band that surrounds the shield. Each contains one of the letters S, A, P, I, E, N, T, I, and A. They spell the word "Sapientia", Latin for "Wisdom".

The Grand Constitutions of 1786 were ostensibly ratified by Frederick II (Frederick the Great), King of Prussia. However, the earliest known copy dates to about 1802. It bears the handwriting of The Reverend Frederick Dalcho, who was made a Deputy Inspector General of the Order of the Royal Secret in 1801. The title "The Reverend" means Dalcho was a Christian minister by profession and is not related to the Scottish Rite.

33rd Degree Cap

The cap for an Inspector General Honorary is white with a white band edged in gold. It displays the symbol of 33rd Degree, a two-bar Latin cross with the upright bar slanted 20 degrees to the right. The transverse bars are horizontal. The lower bar is slightly longer than the upper.

Sovereign Grand Inspectors General, or "Active Thirty-thirds", wear purple caps. The two-bar cross is enhanced with crosslets (little crosses at the end of each arm). The band around the cap is a deeper shade of purple and embroidered with golden olive leaves.

33rd Degree Ring

The ring of the 33rd Degree is made of gold in a triple-ring design. On the outside is an equilateral triangular enclosing the numerals 33. On the inside, the ring is engraved with the motto "Deus Meunque Jus" together with your name and the date on which you received the Degree. A 33rd Degree brother may wear his ring on any finger of either hand.

Several vendors offer 33rd Degree rings. Not all of them follow the official design. With the price of gold skyrocketing over the last several decades, 33rd Degree rings are also available in silver, and more recently, in stainless steel with gold plating.

33rd Degree Motto

The motto of the 33rd Degree is the Latin phrase "Deus Meunque Jus" which in English means "God and my right." Some sources say it was the old war-cry of the Knights Templar. Other sources say the war-cry of the Knights Templar was "Beau-Séant!". That was also the name given to the black-over-white flag the Templars took into battle. Beau séant is French for "well seated".

The French translation of Deus Meunque Jus is "Dieu et mon Droit", which is the motto of the British Monarch (King or Queen, whichever is ruling) and appears on the Monarch's coat of arms.

33rd Degree Honorific

When somebody mentions the name of a 33rd Degree Scottish Rite Mason, they add the honorific or title of "Illustrious". For example, "The Illustrious Harry S Truman", who in fact was a 33rd Degree as well as Past Grand Master of Missouri.

The term "Illustrious" is also used in the Cryptic Council of the York Rite, whose presiding officer is the Illustrious Master. Merriam-Webster defines illustrious as "notably or brilliantly outstanding because of dignity or achievements or actions". That is a big responsibility to live up to.

33rd Degree Signature Block

All Scottish Rite Masons are entitled to use a special signature block. An Inspector General Honorary places a double cross before his name. After his name he adds a rayed triangle with its apex upward, enclosing the numerals "33". These are printed in crimson ink, as described in the Statutes of the Supreme Council.

For more information on Scottish Rite signature blocks, see pages 219 and 220 of Mark A. Tabbert's book, "Vested in Glory". The book is out-of-print but you can find a copy at a used book store, in-person or online. Or look in the San Jose Scottish Rite library.

33rd Degree, Grand Cross

Once you received your 33rd Degree, have you reached the ultimtate? Not exactly. There is one more honor, the 33rd Degree, Grand Cross (abbreviated 33°, GC). The Grand Cross is reserved for those Scottish Rite Masons who have made not just outstanding but exceptional and substantial contributions to the Rite.

A Grand Cross recipient wears a white cap with a blue band edged in gold. It displays a replica of of the Grand Cross jewel, which is a golden Teutonic cross. The arms of the cross are formed by four tau (T-shaped) crosses. Atop the cross is a golden cross formed by two pillars. Beneath the cross is a gold wreath.

Atop the Teutonic cross assembly is a blue circle surround-

ed by a gold border. Inside the circle are written the words GR CROSS and COURT OF HONOR. At the center is a white circle embroidered with a crimson rose and green leaves at its center.

According to the Supreme Council website, the Grand Cross is conferred on about a dozen 33rd Degree Masons every other year. Two 33°, GCs were in attendance at the 33rd Degree conferral at the Oakland Scottish Rite Center on September 11 of last year. That gives you an idea how rare they are.

Conclusion and Question

The large majority of Scottish Rite Masons will never receive the 33rd Degree. So why even have such a degree? Like the Knight Commander Court of Honor we discussed last month, the 33rd Degree is not about prestige or superiority. It comes as reward for outstanding service in the past. The reward itself is even more outstanding service in the future.

Why are some Brothers' outstanding services recognized and rewarded, while the outstanding services of others are not? That would be a fair question if you were thinking in human terms. Instead, think of it in Divine or eternal terms. Like the Law of Karma, the good (as well as evil) you have done follows you into your next existence, where and whatever it may be.

Prior to initiating speech therapy, Wesley's mom stated, "Most adults and other kids had difficulty understanding him and he would get upset or have a tantrum about it." Treatment has focused on activities that target Wesley's speech sounds to help make his speech easier to understand. Wesley enjoys games, hidden pictures and likes to have movement breaks to wiggle!

Often kids have errors in their speech sounds which follow certain patterns. During Wesley's treatment, we are targeting his specific error patterns and focusing on sounds such as /s/ blends, /l/ and/ r/ and initial and final consonants in words.

Since initiating treatment Wesley's mom shared, "He has significantly improved. I find less people having difficulty understanding him, the teachers at his school have seen improvement. He still has some specific words that he struggles with but he understands better now that if he practices, he will get it. We have seen less frustration in him over his speech and we don't need him to repeat himself as much, as we understand him the first time."

During Wesley's time receiving therapy his mom stated, "I find he has improved his attitude about receiving speech classes now that he is actually seeing improvements. It makes him happy that he isn't afraid to speak and we aren't having the frustration as much anymore."

Wesley and his family have been a joy to work with and we look forward to continued progress thanks to the San Jose Scottish Rite.
