From the Personal Representative:

In April, several members of San Jose Scottish Rite had the pleasure of attending a Scottish Rite Management Workshop in Seattle. While conferences of this type are always inspirational, there were a number of small group sessions that some of us really found interesting and educational. The session that I was particularly taken by was devoted to the explanation of a new "off site" study course on the history, development and symbolism of Scottish Rite, from its earliest inception to the present day activity.

The course is not simply a review of the evolution of the order, it is an in-depth exposé of the rituals, philosophy, and sources of the rite. It is, in short, a graduate degree in Scottish Rite.

Several of those attending the classes in Seattle purchased the source book on the spot and others of us chose to order it from Supreme Council. Having little space in my luggage, I chose the latter.

On my return to California, I introduced the matter to our Tuesday morning "Kitchen Cabinet" and was met with an enthusiastic response. Of the eight members at that particular meeting, all eight expressed an interest in pursuing the course of study, and it was suggested that, while the course is designed for individual study and research, it might be a good idea to set a particular time and place to allow the study to be done in groups. I called Supreme and spoke to Ill. Brent Morris, and he agreed that this would be an interesting and enjoyable way to take the course. Now my only problem is ... how many copies do I order, and that's the theme of this article.

If there is any interest in this idea, I need some response from the members of the valley. The

study could lend itself to group sessions either at the Center, or sponsored by the clubs, but I need to have those interested contact me and let me know if you'd like to participate. The source book is \$35.00 and if shipped individually the shipping is about \$18.00. If we order as a body and resell the books to the brethren, there would be a

slight savings in the shipping cost, and this is what I propose.

There seems to be quite a resurgence of interest in the history and philosophy of Freemasonry, and the enthusiasm for this course is an example of that trend. We say frequently that we are in search of further light in Masonry, my brothers, and this course will give meaning to that quest.

Let me know your desires. Call the office or me personally and let us know if this is of any interest to you. Depending on your response we will set up whatever kind of classes you would like and we will proceed from there.


Our desert was a simple, but tasty, ice cream treat.



From the Clinic!!!



arry is a delightful four and a half year old boy who has been seen at the San Jose Scottish Rite Speech and Language Clinic two times a week for six months. Harry was diagnosed with High Functioning Autism just before he started treatment at our clinic. He had a very hard time listening to directions and had difficulty with expressive grammar and vocabulary. He also needed help with social language, such as taking turns during games, using his words to communicate with others, staying on topic during a conversation, or asking and answering questions during play. Harry is a loving, energetic child who smiles often during therapy and enjoys giving and getting hugs.

Harry has made significant progress in a very short period of time. He can now follow directions with two steps given some cues and has increased his expressive vocabulary and grammar skills during structured activities with the clinician. Harry continues to need help with social language, but he is becoming more attuned to his communication partner and is starting to ask and answer questions appropriately during conversations given support. He is also work-

ing on understanding a person's non-verbal communication, such as facial expressions and eye gaze, to understand what another person is thinking.

Harry's parents recently filled out a survey about their experience at the clinic. Since Harry's treatment began, his parents have noted a marked difference, as he "has fewer meltdowns, seems happier and less anxious, and improved relationships with his peers and teachers". Harry's family wrote that his speech and language skills have "improved beyond our wildest dreams". They are delighted that Harry is asking questions, telling pretend stories and is using his words when he is playing with his peers.

They described their experience at the clinic as "superlative" with "wonderful, caring staff." They have also told other parents about the clinic and wrote that they will "continue to advocate for Scottish Rite...We absolutely love [the clinician]...our son has made incredible progress because of her care."

Our clinicians currently are treating 41 children but we have another 62 on our waiting list!



Masonic Influence on Independence Day

As we approach the month of July, our thoughts turn to the celebrations on the 4th of July, the birthday of the



Some of the greatest names of the American Revolution were Masons, namely Ethan Allen, Edmund Burke, John Claypoole, William Daws, Benjamin Franklin, John Hancock, John Paul Jones, Robert Livingston, Paul Revere, Colonel Benjamin Tupper, and George Washington. Also, evidence of Masonic connections does exist for Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, and Daniel Webster. Fifteen of fifty-six signers of the Declaration of Independence were Freemasons or probable Freemasons.

Nine signers of the Constitution were Masons. Evidence of membership or affiliation for thirteen other signers does exist. Six additional signers later became Masons making 28 of 40 signers of the Constitution Freemasons!

Some other Masonic influences in early American History were:

- The majority of the commanders of the Continental Army were Freemasons and members of "Army Lodges."
- · Most of Washington's Generals were Freemasons.
- The Boston Tea Party was planned at the Green Dragon Tavern, also known as the ""Freemasons' Arms," and "the Headquarters of the Revolution."
- Robert Livingston, Grand Master of New York's Masonic Lodge, swore in George Washington as the first President of the United States. The Bible on which he took his oath was from his own Masonic Lodge.
- The Grand Lodge of Maryland laid the Cornerstone of the Capital building.

Past history gives Freemasons much to be proud of because this Nation's government was structured by the tenets of Freemasonry!

A true Mason knows that his work is not secret but realizes that it must remain unknown to all who do not live the true Masonic life. Yet, if the so-called secrets of Freemasonry are shouted from the rooftops or broadcast on the Internet, the Fraternity is absolutely safe. These disclosures reveal merely the outward forms and ceremonies of Freemasonry. Only those "who have been weighed in the balance and found to be true, upright, and square have prepared themselves by their own growth to appreciate the inner meanings of their craft".

A Mason is not proud of position. He is not "puffed up" by his honor, but with a seeking heart is eternally ashamed of his own place, realizing that it is far below the standard of his Craft. A true Mason never feels worthy of his Craft.

A Mason cannot be ordained or elected by ballot. He is evolved through the years of self-purification and spiritual change. There are thousands of Masons who are brethren in name only, for their failure to follow the ideals of their Craft makes them unresponsive to the teachings and purpose of Freemasonry. When this fact is better lived, "Freemasonry will awake, and speak the Word so long withheld".

The true Mason knows the value of seeking the truth wherever he can find it. The Masonic Lodge is universal; therefore all true Masons will seek through the "extremities of creation for their light". He must search for the high things in lowly places and find the lowly things in high places.




