

From the Commander of Kadosh

December 27,2021

On this day, Freemasonry celebrates one of our two Patron Saints, St. John the Evangelist. Some 60 years ago in Magnolia Lodge No. 120 in Biloxi, Mississippi I silently wondered why these two Saints among the many. These six decades later I am still not sure how it came to be though I have fully accepted it to be so because our Ancient Masters deemed it to be so. Masonic tradition informs us that, etc, etc.



To help me better understand I found a December 2015 article from the Grand Lodge of Missouri on the subject of our Patron Saints. Here is a part of the article which I hope you find helpful if you are like me in search of some light on the St. Johns.

"Saint John the Apostle or Evangelist (considered by many to be one and the same) has a more obscure history than St John the Baptist our other Patron Saint. Numerous sources cite the persona of the Evangelist as the likely combination of several biblical persons assimilated over the millennia for emphasis and clarity. Much of the writing attributed to the Evangelist echoes Masonic themes, phrases and even ritual, however history falls short of being able to tell us whether the writings of the Evangelist are the actual source of our ritual. Regardless of the lack of traceable history, it seems reasonable to conclude that those intimately familiar with the Evangelist and his writings find him to be the "sensible" patron Saint of the fraternity. Writings such as those in the Book of Revelations, the Gospel of John along with the Epistles of John display a more ideological or philosophical perspective, often hinting at the deeper meaning of a person or event

The adoption of both Saints' John to equally represent the fraternity seems to further distinguish Masonry at its core. The methods of religious practice for these two Saints are very different yet both are fully committed to the same belief. St. John the Baptist is strict and literal while St. John the Evangelist is lofty, philosophical and esoteric; a perfect "yin and yang" example. As the Patron Saints they serve as an example of the balance and harmony men can achieve in Freemasonry.

The Grand Lodge of England was formed on June 24, 1717, on the feast day of St. John the Baptist which corresponds closely with the summer solstice and ancient celebrations marking the longest day of the year. It is most fitting to begin a light-seeking Grand Lodge during one of the longest days of light. The observance of the feast of St John the Evangelist is held on December 27th just after the winter solstice. This is the time that the world begins moving from darkness

We have been exploring different ancient sites and as well as the ancient stone masons who built them. It's such a fascinating subject because there are new findings every day, and yet, it leaves us with more questions than answers. There are countless clues left behind by those who came before us out in the open just waiting to be discovered. From the polygonal interlocking stone walls to the different placements of the ancient sites all throughout the world. Join me as we try to connect the dots of our ancient past.

The Ancient Great Circle. The world holds a lot of mysteries surrounding the ancient world. There are countless sites around the globe that baffles and astounds both the bystanders and as well as experts in the field of archeology.

The Easter Islands, Nazca lines, Ollantaytambo, The Pyramids of Giza plateau, The ancient city of Petra, The Ritchat Structure in the Sahara, Machu Picchu in Peru, The temple of the Oracle of Siwa, Cusco, Mohenjo Daro in Pakistan, The Sumerian city of Ur, and the Angkor Wat temple in Cambodia are only a handful of iconic examples of ancient sites that are almost perfectly aligned with each other across the world if you were to draw a line around them with only less than I degree of deviation. Is it only just mere coincidence, or were the people from our ancient past trying to tell us something? There are clue left behind for us to decipher.

The Great Circle has a circumference of 24,892 miles which is slightly smaller compared to the modern day Equatorial circumference of the Earth. The circle also passes over other natural key landmarks such as the

Great Amazon river, entrance to the Tigris Euphrates river, as well as the Bay of Bengal in the Ganges and not to mention a vast area of the unexplored Sahara desert of ancient Mesopotamia. A handful of historians and scientists suggests that the Great Circle was the ancient equator of the Earth before a great cataclysmic event happened around 12,500-14,500 years ago. We all know that different cultures from around the world talked about a flood myth, from the Holy bible, to the ancient Sanskrit texts, to the Cuneiform clay tablets of ancient Sumeria, and even the Pillar 43 of Gobekli Tepe in Turkey indicated that there was a world-wide cataclysmic event that triggered the great flood, which interestingly, also, happens to coincide with the Younger Dryas period that happend approximately around 12,500- 14,500 years ago that lead to the rapid cooling of the Earth for less than 100 years, and then persisted roughly for the next 1,300 years. Ice-core samples taken from different parts of the world by various scientists confirmed this abrupt change in climate due to a sudden tilt of the Earth's axis.

There are some theories being investigated by experts and scientists, and yet, they can't agree on a definitive cause. The most prominent is the Impact hypothesis which suggests that there was a fragmented comet or asteroid that collided with the Earth, therefore triggering the chain of events such as wildfires, floods and mass extinction of some animal species. The idea of the tilting the Earth's polar axis not too far-fetched as we look into the year of 2011 as an 8.9 magnitude earthquake hit Japan and moved it's mainland by 8 feet, and shifted the Earth axis by approximately 4 inches. We can only speculate what a massive object composed of rocks, ice, and metals can actually do. What if because of an impact event, the celestial axis was inclined at an angle of about 30 degrees from it's present location, which in turn suggests that the terrestial axis then is oriented differently from what it is today. What if the Great ancient circle was indeed the pre-Diluvian equator of the ancient world, and maybe, the reason why these various ancient sites are located where they are is that, the equator is the obvious place to start a settlement or civilization that ensures a good climate for agriculture, a natural protection from the cold climate, and a logical place for a civilization to evolve.

We are at the end of our journey, and yet, we barely scratched the surface of the mysteries surrounding the ancient world. Fin.

"Thirty-first Degree, Inspector Inquisitor, Part I

In the 30th degree, we learned to dispell our fear death by living according to our obligations, promises, and the principles of good living. In the 31st degree, we enact the final judgement of a human soul following death.

In this degree the candidate responds to a series of probing questions and rituals based on an ancient funerary text known as "The Egyptian Book of the Dead". The best version of this document is the Papyrus of Ani, written around 1250 BCE. Ani was an Egyptian scribe. His "book" currently resides in the British Museum.

The Egyptian Afterlife

The Egyptians believed that their land was the best in the world, created by the gods and given to them as a gift to enjoy. The afterlife was essentially a reflection of mortal life but in an ideal state. It was a place of lush vegetation, with eternal springtime, unfailing harvests, and no pain or suffering. There, rich and poor alike were provided with plots of land on which they were expected to grow crops. The physical location of this kingdom was fixed either below the western horizon or on a group of islands in the west. It was sometimes called "the Field of Reeds", a reference to the vegetation that grows along banks of the Nile river.

To reach the Field of Reeds, the recently deceased person needed to be entombed properly with all attendant rites according to their social standing. Your tomb had to be in the land of Egypt, not some other, inferior place in the chaotic world beyond the border. Whenever possible, soldiers and travelers who died abroad were returned home for proper interment.

Funerary rites had to be strictly observed in order to preserve the body which, it was thought, the soul would need in order to receive sustenance in the next life. Once the body was prepared (mummified) and properly entombed, the soul's journey began through the afterlife. Funerary texts carved on the walls of the tomb or left inside coffin told the soul who he or she was, what had happened, and what to do next.

The jackal-headed god Anubis greeted the newly departed soul in the tomb and ushered him or her to the Hall of Truth. There Osiris, king of the underworld, was presiding judge. In the Hall of Truth, the standard is only the will and laws of the gods. Human laws did not matter. There were two parts to the judicial procedure in the Hall of Truth: the Negative Confessions and the Scales of Maat.

Negative Confessions

The newly departed soul made a series of 42 statements, each affirming that he or she is innocent of a violating a specific law or committing a forbidden action. The statements were tailored to the individual making them, although some were common to everybody. A local deity from a specific city or territory of Egypt, judges each statement.

The pattern was: "Hail [name of the god] who comest forth from [place], I have not [bad deed]."

Example: "Hail, Sertiu, who comest forth from Anu, I have not been angry without just cause."

The Confession included statements such as: "I have not stolen. I have not slain people. I have not stolen the property of a god. I have not said lies. I have not led anyone astray. I have not caused terror. I have not made anyone hungry".

In some texts, this confession appears: "I have not learnt things that are not", which referred to believing in falsehoods. That is an ideas that was contrary to the will of the gods, or something that seemed true to the person but was false in reality.

The Scales of Maat

Maat was the goddess of truth and harmonious balance. She is represented as a tall woman, whose headdress consisted of a single white ostrich feather.

The soul of the deceased was required to have his heart weighed on an enormous balance-scale against Maat's feather. During the process of embalming or mummification, the vital organs, including the heart, are removed from the corpse and stored separately in canopic jars. That makes it possible to put the heart on the scale without harming the person to which it belonged.

The heart is placed on one pan and Maat's feather on the other. The pointer at the top of the balance-scale indicates which item is heavier. The preferred outcome is where the heart is lighter than the feather, indicating the absence of guilt. The falconheaded god Horus conducts the Soul to Osiris, to receive the final judgement. Behind him stand Isis and Nephthys to welcome to the soul to the Field of Reeds.

On the other hand, if the deceased's heart was heavier than Maat's feather, it indicates of guilt, despite the soul's professions of innocence. Such heavy hearts were summarily tossed onto the floor. Lurking there was a monster named Ammut. She was part crocodile, part lion, and part hippopotamus. When she ate the heart, the person's soul ceased to exist. While many people fear an after-world of torment, to an ancient Egyptian, non-existence was the worst possible outcome.

Embalming, funerary rites, and tomb preparation were expensive. That's why Egyptian tombs contain the remains of royals, court officials, and skilled artisans. Despite the egalitarian nature of the Field of Reeds, the majority of Egyptians could not afford the procedures required to get there.

Why the Egyptians?

We understand that this degree is about a person's final judgement. But why would Grand Commander Pike choose a judgement scenario from ancient Egypt? The various orders of Knighthood in the Scottish Rite all follow a Christian-Crusader theme. Why not use an example from the Christian faith?

Christian eschatology deals with matters such as death and the afterlife, Heaven and Hell, the second coming of Jesus, the resurrection of the dead, the rapture, the tribulation, millennialism, the end of the world, the Last Judgment, and the New Heaven and New Earth in the world to come.

All of these concepts exist in mainstream forms of Christianity but their meaning and significance vary, as well as the order in which certain events are supposed to happen. So it's a lot easier to avoid the quagmire of conflicting religious beliefs by viewing the judgement and afterlife from a totally independent perspective.

Caves and Hieroglyphics

Plenty of caves have been found in the Holy Land containing artifacts of great interest and historical value. But no caves with Egyptian hieroglyphics have been found there. So the idea that Crusaders might discover such a thing stretches the imagination. Is there any historically consistent way this setting could happen?

During the 7th Crusade, there were Crusader invasions into Lower (Northern) Egypt, in an effort to take advantage of the conflicts among the various Muslim groups that opposed the Christian presence in their territories. And if the so-called cave was really an unexcavated tomb, there might well be hieroglyphics on its walls, so the setting would be plausible.

Hieroglyphics is a form of written communication using pictorial symbols that represent meaning or sound, or a combination of the two. At the time of the Crusades, nobody in the world could understand Egyptian hieroglyphics. It was not until the discovery of the Rosetta stone by a French officer in 1799 that enough material existed to decipher the hieroglyphics, which took placed during the 50 years following its discovery.

Seneschals and Squires

During the Middle ages, A Seneschal (pronounced SEN eh shall) was the court-appointed manager of a royal or noble household. He was in charge of domestic arrangements and the administration of servants, which might involve hundreds of laborers, servants and their associated responsibilities.

Among the Knights Templar, the Seneschal was the number-two officer and assistant to the Grand Master. In peacetime, the Seneschal administered all the lands belonging to the chapter house. In wartime, he handled the movement of the men, the pack trains, the food procurement, and other issues of moving an army.

A squire was a knight-in-training, a son of noble birth between the ages of 14 and 21. He was a shield bearer or armor bearer of a knight, he saddled the knight's horse and cared for the knight's weapons and armor. If all went well, the squire would become a knight himself after his 21st birthday.

The Opening Scene

The degree begins in a darkened room representing a cave. A Seneschal is sitting in the cave contemplating Egyptian hieroglyphics and drawings on the wall. He obviously can't decipher hieroglyphics so he focuses on the pictures and attepts to figure out what they mean.

Outside the cave, a Squire notices the light from the Seneschal's lamp and comes to see what he is doing. They sit down together and begin to discuss the hieroglyphics and drawings. The Seneschal thinks they contain a lot of valuable instruction. But the Squire argues that the ancient Egyptians are long dead and their artwork is only good for decoration.

The Seneschal admits that the Squire may be correct, but he adds, "Our symbols (the Christian symbols of the Crusaders) might be merely decoration to those whose eyes and minds are not yet open, and whose minds are guided by ignorance".

The Squire asks the Seneschal if he is claiming to understand these "scribblings". He responds, "Not all but their sense is clear enough to me".

The Squire is incredulous. "What sense is a baboon staring at two men, one dressed like a bird and the other like a dog?" He adds, "The Egyptians

were heathens and idolators. It would be better to chop their so -called artwork from the walls and grind it into mortar to build a church!"

The Seneschal responds, "Men often seek to destroy things they don't understand. He asks, "Where is the glory in destruction?" Christ taught us that there is glory in good works." Referring to the excesses committed by some of the Crusaders, he asks, "How can the destruction of cities or the murder of innocent women and children be considered good works?"

The Squire admits that there was an excess of enthusiasm on both sides of the conflict. "Yet the stories of our old glories fill my heart with pride."

The Seneschal explains that, "It is easy to be proud of the accomplishments of others. Gaze upon this wall and learn its lessons. Our ancient teachers, the Greeks, learned this lesson from the Egyptian priests. The Greek's care for wisdom of the past permits me to transmit it to you. Treat it with the same veneration and future generations may learn it from you".

After a few moments, the Seneschal asks, "Do you believe in the judgement of the dead?" The Squire answers, "I do. We are taught in the Bible that Christ will judge all mankind." The Seneschal adds, "The ancient Egyptians also believed in the judgement of the dead—a lucky guess, perhaps. Sit quietly and transport your mind back two thousand years, if you can." And the lights go down.

Reception in the Hall of Justice

When the lights come up again, we are in a Court of the Dead takes place in the Hall of Justice or "Maati" as the Egyptians called it. The candidate represents the soul of Cheres (pronounced KEY rees). According to Rex R. Hutchens, 33° GC, Cheres was an architect from the land of Chemi or Khem.

Herodotus, the Greek geographer and historian, used the term Chemi for the land of Egypt. Chemi literally means "black" or "pupil of the eye". However the ancient Egyptians were not black-skinned like the Nubians or Ethiopians. For example, the Egyptians drew their women with yellow skin and men with red skin. It has therefore been suggested that Chemi (black) refers to the color of the soil, not the complexion of the people.

There were indeed black-skinned Pharaohs. The Kushites of the kingdom of Nubia lived further up the Nile, south of the Egyptians. They overthrew the natives and ruled over Egypt for more than 90 years, during a period known as the 25th Dynasty.

A Cast of Deities

With the exception of the Seneschal, Squire, and Candidate, all of the roles in the 31st degree are gods of some kind. Many of them are female.

There were literally hundreds of major, minor, and local deities worshipped at different times and places in Egypt. More than one deity is said to have created all the others. Some of the later deities were composites or combinations of two prior individual deities. Many of them were family members of other deities. Even a few humans became minor deities, such as Imhotep, the architect of the stepped pyramid and vizier to Pharaoh Djoser.

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These Egyptian gods have speaking parts in the degree:

- Anubis Jackal head. God of embalming and protector of the dead
- Atum Creator god and solar deity
- Duamutef Son of Horus
- Imsety Son of Horus
- Isis Goddess of motherhood, magic, fertility, healing, and rebirth
- Hapy Son of Horus
- Horus Falcon head. Linked with kingship, protection, and healing
- Kebehsenuef Son of Horus
- Maat Goddess of truth, justice, balance, and order
- Nephthys Mistress of the house, sister and helper of Isis
- Osiris God of death and the afterlife, ruler of the underworld

Thoth — Ibis head. Recorder of the gods and patron of scribes

These Egyptian gods are referred to in the degree but do not speak:

- Amun Another form of the creator or sun god
- Amun Khem Amun of Egypt, another name for the sun god
- Amun Ra The Egyptian supreme being
- Khem aka Horus the elder, generative power surviving death
- Kneph God of the Nile river

Ptah — Creator of all other deities, his breath gives life to everything

Amen, Amun, Aten, Aton, Atum, and Ra are names for the creator god, sun god, and king of the other gods. When Amen, et. al. is combined with Ra, it refers to the supreme being of the Egyptians, an abstract entity. All the other deities, even Ra himself, being but emanations from him.

In addition to his other achievements, Ptah was also the patron of crafts-people and architects, and the inventor of masonry. Operative masonry, that is.

Next month, we will examine the ritual of the 31st degree and learn about the Scottish Rite interpretation of the ancient Egyptian Hall of Justice.

He asks a lot of questions. We get homework from his therapists and review it with him and place it on his bedroom wall. We began to see him gain confidence in his speech. We were once worried about his speech but now he's just like a chatterbox and doesn't stop."

After a break in services and therapist change, Colton began receiving services via telehealth. His mother stated, "Angela understands special needs kids and their weaknesses and enhances from there. She has a patient personality with a firm tone which helps his speech level increase."

Colton is seen for individual visits, and he is also part of a social group. During his group visits he learns skills to promote social thinking and gets to use his speech and language to interact with peers. According to Colton's mother, "The social communication group is one of the most rewarding parts for Colton. His social skill deficits make him not want to talk to peers. He has learned new things like greetings and feelings. We have begun to see him chatting with peers at school instead of just adults without shyness and with confidence. He expresses his opinions well and passionately. Practicing feelings during the communication group is very powerful."

Treatment has focused on activities that target areas such as language development as well as social language and social thinking. Colton has worked on cognitive linguistic tasks such as making inferences, idioms, conditional directions, explaining what's wrong and predicting a story. Currently he is working

on problem solving, multiple meaning and sentence comprehension. Colton has worked hard developing his ability to take the perspective of others. He participates in activities where he determines what other people might be thinking, saying and why. We call these thought bubbles and speech bubbles.

In social group Colton has worked on feelings, conversational turns, personal space, body language, perspective taking, following group plans, whole body listening, greetings and interruptions. Colton is a great leader in group. He does a wonderful job participating and demonstrates a nice understanding of the concepts.

Colton's parents stated, "We really respect the Clinic's mission and appreciate the people who donate to the clinic funding to help special needs kids grow and prepare them to become useful civilians in the future. The speech therapists are all very professional and super patient to the clients and parents. They are very understanding of the special needs kid's behavior and are very accommodating. We really appreciate that the clinic gives clients a lot of opportunities/ flexible times to develop and grow."
