




## From the Clinic





Previously, Cameron received speech and language therapy through Early Start (early intervention) and his therapist recommended continuing therapy after he reached the discharge age of three. He also received Occupational Therapy and A.B.A. therapy (behavior therapy) prior to coming to our clinic. So, when we met Cameron he was a seasoned therapy kid. He immediately knew what to do, adjusted to the new therapist and clinic quickly and was soon off and running!


When therapy began, Cameron was using a limited amount of sounds. His mom reports, "Cameron was able to say some words, and not many. It was hard to understand him, so he would use baby sign language." When his language was evaluated and observed, Cameron was exhibiting both a receptive and expressive language delay.

Treatment has focused on speech sound production and an increase in functional, everyday language to improve Cameron's ability to communicate better with those around him. "Angela has really helped Cameron to develop new words. She has been working with Cameron to work on his sounds and he has come a long way. He can say short phrases. Treatment at Scottish Rite has immensely improved our communication with Cameron. He is able to state his needs and wants, as well as express himself with less meltdowns."

Cameron has made very nice progress so far. His loving family works diligently with him at home, which is the most important aspect of treatment. We have noted an improvement in his ability to make choices, pretend play, make requests, make comments and produce more complicated speech sound patterns in words.

Cameron's mother stated, "It has been most rewarding to see Cameron's development grow and evolve. He loves speech with Teacher Angela and he is excited to come to his sessions. We ask for homework and Cameron goes home and works on his sounds right away. He loves to practice his sounds and words. I highly recommend this clinic to my friends. We feel that Cameron has really progressed in a short amount of time. My husband and I are so thankful to the Freemasons for their Rite Care clinic and all the good work they do in the community. Getting help with his speech has improved my son's self-confidence significantly. Thank You!!!"



THE SAN JOSE COUNCIL OF KADOSH IS THE BODY RESPONSIBLE FOR THE 19TH THROUGH THE 30TH SCOTTISH RITE DEGREES, KNOWN AS THE "PHILOSOPHICAL AND CHIVALRIC DEGREES." THE INFORMATION FOUND BELOW IS A SYNOPSIS OF THE 25TH DEGREE — KNIGHT OF THE BRAZEN SERPENT.



#### "GOD IS THE LIGHT OF THE HEAVENS AND THE EAR TH."

THIS DEGREE INTRODUCES YOU TO THE SUFI TEACHINGS AND TRADITIONS, AND GIVES US CLUES ON HOW THIS ESOTERIC BRANCH OF ISLAM MIGHT HELP OVERCOME THE DIFFICULTIES ENCOUNTERED IN OUR ATTEMPTS TO ADVANCE AS NOVITIATES IN THE MYSTERIES.

IT FIRST ASKS US IF WE HAVE TRULY PERFORMED ALL WE HAVE PROMISED. THIS IS A QUESTION WE MUST FREQUENTLY ASK OURSELVES. KNOWLEDGE, THE TRUTH, AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR SERVICE OFTEN COME TO US IN FORMS WHICH ARE AT FIRST UNRECOGNIZABLE, AND MAY SEEM AT FIRST SIGHT, UNACCEPTABLE. TRUTH MAY APPEAR TO US IN A GUISE WE FIND UNRECOGNIZABLE, OR EVEN FOOLISH. BY WITHHOLDING PREMATURE JUDGMENT AND BY APPLYING MATURE REFLECTION WE LEARN TO RECOGNIZE TRUTH, AND IN SO DOING, WE BROADEN OUR HORIZONS OF UNDERSTANDING, WHICH LEADS TO GREATER WISDOM. AS YOU HAVE DISCOVERED THROUGHOUT THE DEGREES, PHILOSOPHICAL TRUTHS ARE NOT EASILY DIGESTED AS ARE CHILDREN'S PRIMERS. WE MUST VIGOROUSLY APPLY OURSELVES TO LEARNING, AND BE PREPARED TO DO SO AT ALL TIMES.

This month millions of Americans will tune-in to NBC to watch the 2016 Olympic games unfold in one of the most idyllic settings in the world, Rio de Janiero. Despite all the concerns we have heard in the media, I'm sure the games will turn out just fine. A few yeas ago I went to Rio during Carnaval and saw first hand how quickly the city can move to prepare itself to accommodate large numbers of people. The games are not the first event for which Rio has had to "get itself together." To celebrate, the Consistory will be hosting luncheon at Taurinus Brazilian Steakhouse on Sunday August 21st at 1:00 PM. The price will be \$36.00 per person, including tip. If you would like to attend, be sure to make reservations with me by our August stated meeting.



Three sports I will be watching closely are track, swimming, and gymnastics. While I do not follow these sports at all, whenever the Olympics roll around I suddenly become a big fan. This year I'm confident our teams will bring home a good number of medals. Michael Phelps is half-fish and our female gymnasts all seem to have figured out how to defy gravity. I was very pleased to learn that I6 year old New Jersey Native, Laurie Hernandez, is the Ist U.S. Born Hispanic athlete to make the U.S. Women's Gymnastics Olympic team since 1984. Very cool! Like myself, Laurie is Puerto Rican, which means we may be distant cousins (just kidding...maybe).

While sports like swimming and gymnastics are very popular in the Olympics today, it wasn't always so. In fact, neither sport was included in the original games. The first written records of the ancient Olympics date to 776 B.C., when a cook named Coroebus won the only event – a 192-meter footrace called the stade (the origin of the modern "stadium") – to become the first Olympic champion. However, it is generally believed that the Games had been going on for many years by that time. Legend has it that Heracles (the Roman Hercules), son of Zeus and the mortal woman Alcmene, founded the Games, which by the end of the 6th century B.C had become the most famous of all Greek sporting festivals. The ancient Olympics were held every four years between August 6 and September 19 during a religious festival honoring Zeus. The Games were named for their location at Olympia, a sacred site located near the western coast of the Peloponnese peninsula in southern Greece. Their influence was so great that ancient historians began to measure time by the four-year increments in between Olympic Games, which were known as Olympiads.

After 13 Olympiads, two more races joined the stade as Olympic events: the diaulos (roughly equal to today's 400-meter race), and the dolichos (a longer-distance race, possibly comparable to the 1,500-meter or 5,000-meter event). The pentathlon (consisting of five events: a foot race, a long jump, discus and javelin throws and a wrestling match) was introduced in 708 B.C., boxing in 688 B.C. and chariot racing in 680 B.C. In 648 B.C., pankration, a combination of boxing and wrestling with virtually no rules, debuted as an Olympic event. Participation in the ancient Olympic Games was initially limited to freeborn male citizens of Greece; there were no women's events, and married women were prohibited from attending the competition.

After the Roman Empire conquered Greece in the mid-2nd century B.C., the Games continued, but their standards and quality declined. In one notorious example from A.D. 67, the decadent Emperor Nero entered an Olympic chariot race, only to disgrace himself by declaring himself the winner even after he fell off his chariot during the event. In A.D. 393, Emperor Theodosius I, a Christian, called for a ban on all "pagan" festivals, ending the ancient Olympic tradition after nearly 12 centuries.

It would be another 1,500 years before the Games would rise again, largely thanks to the efforts of Baron Pierre de Coubertin (1863-1937) of France. Dedicated to the promotion of physical education, the young baron became inspired by the idea of creating a modern Olympic Games after visiting the ancient Olympic site. In November 1892, at a meeting of the Union des Sports Athlétiques in Paris, Coubertin proposed the idea of reviving the Olympics as an international athletic competition held every four years. Two years later, he got the approval he needed to found the International Olympic Committee (IOC), which would become the governing body of the modern Olympic Games.

The first modern Olympics were held in Athens, Greece, in 1896. In the opening ceremony, King Georgios I and a crowd of 60,000 spectators welcomed 280 participants from 13 nations (all male), who would compete in 43 events, including track and field, gymnastics, swimming, wrestling, cycling, tennis, weightlifting, shooting and fencing. All subsequent Olympiads have been numbered even when no Games take place (as in 1916, during World War I, and in 1940 and 1944, during World War II). Today, the official symbol of the modern Games is five interlocking colored rings, representing the continents of North and South America, Asia, Africa, Europe and Australia. The Olympic flag, featuring this symbol on a white background, flew for the first time at the Antwerp Games in 1920.

So, be sure to tune-in to the Olympics this month and cheer on our athletes. And don't forget—WE ARE <u>ALL</u> TEAM USA. Yours till the kitchen sinks and Niagara falls,
