Memorial Day is a United States federal holiday which occurs every year on the final Monday of May. Formerly known as **Decoration Day**, it originated after the War between the States to commemorate the Union and Confederate soldiers who died in the War. By the 20th century Memorial Day had been extended to honor all Americans who have died in all wars. It typically marks

At noon their memory is raised by the living, who resolve not to let their sacrifice be in vain, but to rise up in their stead and continue the fight for liberty and justice for all.

And speaking of a call for help and being that it's the month of May, let me say... MayDay. MayDay. And why is that a distress signal and why three times? I discovered that a mayday distress call is supposed to be used only in cases of "grave and imminent danger." The correct way to signal mayday consists of three repetitions of the word mayday, then the name of the boat, and its radio call sign. Once this initial message is transmitted, a follow-up message should be transmitted that includes the word mayday again, as well as the boat's position, the nature of the emergency, number of persons aboard, and any other relevant information to assist a rescue effort. The Mayday call sign apparently originated in 1923 by Frederick Stanley Mockford, a senior radio officer at Croydon Airport in London. He was asked to think of a word that would indicate distress and could easily be understood by all pilots and ground staff in an emergency. Much of the traffic at the time was between Croydon and Le Bourget Airport in Paris, so he proposed the word "Mayday" from the French m'aider. "Venez m'aider" means "come help me". I just thought you might find this interesting. I did. J

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

From the Master of Kadosh

emorial Day is currently observed on the last Monday of May.
Formally known as Decoration Day, it commemorates all men and women, who have died in military service for the United States. Traditionally, people

visit cemeteries and memorials on Memorial Day, particularly to honor those who have died in military service. Many volunteers place an American flag on each grave in national cemeteries. It is traditional to fly the flag of the United States at half mast from Dawn until Noon.

Unfortunately, Memorial Day has slowly become less of an occasion of remembrance, possibly because it is a federal holiday and it's observance date has been moved to create a 3 day weekend. Now many people see Memorial Day weekend as the start of the summer season, an opportunity to go on a short vacation or visit family or friends, with less thought given to the original intent of the day.

Memorial Day started as an event to honor Union soldiers, who had died during the American Civil War. It was inspired by the way people in the Southern states honored their dead after the American Civil War. After World War I, it was extended to include all men and women, who died in any war or military action.

There are many stories as to its actual beginnings, with over two dozen cities and towns laying claim to being the birthplace of Memorial Day. Waterloo N.Y. was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon John-son in May 1966.

It is not important who was the very first, what is important is that Memorial Day was established. It is not about division, it is about reconciliation; it is about com-ing together to honor those who gave their all. Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day. The current name for this day did not come into use until after World War II. Decoration Day and then Memorial Day, used to be held on May 30, regardless of the day of the week on which it fell. In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed as part of a move to use federal holidays to create three-day weekends and since 1971, Memorial D-ay holiday has been officially observed on the last Monday in May. Many believe that partly as a result of this change of observation date, the traditional meaning and relevance of Memorial Day has . Many Americans nowadays have

forgotten both the meaning and traditions of Memorial Day. Most people no longer remember the proper flag etiquette for the day. Unfortunately, at many cemeteries, the graves of the fallen soldiers are increasingly ignored and too often neglected. While there are towns and cities that still hold Memorial Day parades, many have not held a parade in decades. Some people think the day is for honoring any and all dead, and not just those fallen in service to our country.

To help reacquaint and remind Americans of the true meaning of Memorial Day, the "National Moment of Remembrance" resolution was passed in Dec 2000. It asks/suggests that at 3 p.m. local time, all Americans "Voluntarily and informally observe in their own way, a Moment of Remembrance and Respect, pausing from whatever they are doing for a moment of silence and/or listening to 'Taps."

The Moment of Remembrance is a step in the right direction to returning the meaning back to the day. What may also be needed to return the solemn, and even sacred, spirit back to Memorial Day is for a return to its traditional date of observance. Let's set aside one specific date out of the year for the nation to get together to remember, reflect and honor those who have given their all in service to their country.

Many feel that when Congress made the day into a three-day weekend in with the National Holiday Act of 1971, it made it all the easier for people to be distracted from the spirit and meaning of the day. As the VFW stated in its 2002 Memorial Day address; "Changing the date merely to create three-day weekends" has undermined the very meaning of the day. No doubt, this has contributed greatly to the general public's nonchalant observance of Memorial Day."

For all of the readers of this Rite-Word article, let's do our part to help instill the true meaning of the day, regardless of the date of observance.

Please this year, as you remember our Fallen Soldiers, take a moment to reflect on the reason for the establishment of such a remembrance. It is just as relevant today as it was in any and all of the eras of the past.

ate is an endearing three-and-a-half year old girl who was diagnosed with Childhood Apraxia of Speech (CAS) just before she started treatment at our clinic. Children with CAS have a difficult time commanding their mouth to move the way they want it to in order to speak correctly. CAS isn't a problem with weak muscles. The problem is with the "wiring" or getting the message from their brain to their mouth. When a child has apraxia, it can create significant problems in learning to talk and to be understood. Children with CAS need more intensive therapy to achieve results and progress can sometimes be slow. They not only struggle with articulation, but they also have difficulty putting sentences together and using grammatical rules correctly. Often they have a high degree of frustration and

can become self-conscious and withdrawn in social situations or become shy. Cate's mom stated that

Cate's speech disorder "was creating a lot of frustration" because she couldn't communicate her ideas or needs.

When Cate first started treatment she was only using Consonant-Vowel (CV) syllable shapes, which severely decreased her intelligibility. She was not using longer syllable shapes in her spontaneous speech such as "puppy" or "mommy". She also had difficulty switching vowels in the same word. Thus, a reduplicated syllable pattern such as "mama" was much easier for Cate to produce than "mommy" in which the consonants stayed the same but the vowels changed. Typically, we expect these simple movement patterns to be produced by children as young as 12 months, but they are often difficult for a child with CAS. Initially, Cate worked very hard on producing longer syllable strands with simple consonants, which she has now mastered. Cate is now working on producing CVC words in which she must include a /p, b, m, t, s/ in the final word position. Typically, Cate says "ho" for "hot" or "mo" for "mop". After a couple of months of hard work, she is now becoming more successful at using this syllable pattern with fewer cues from Rachel, her Speech-Language Pathologist.

Cate's family is extremely thankful for the services they continue to receive at our clinic. Cate's mom stated, "Rachel is so friendly and helpful, the location is convenient, the facility is nice, and it removes a tremendous stress not to worry about the financial cost of treatment...My experience here has been great, and I think it's a very valuable community resource."

San Jose Chapter, Order of DeMolay

History, Background and Needs

In 1919 a brother Scottish Rite Mason received a phone call from the Senior Warden of his lodge, asking a favor. A good young man's father, a Fellowcraft, had died and the youth needed a job, and perhaps more. At that moment "Dad" Frank S. Land, 33°, began something that has become a hallmark youth organization, one with the closest of ties with Masonry. It began with one young man, growing quickly to nine. They searched and researched for some more substance than that of a social club. Dad Land, being the Commander for the DeMolai Council of Kadosh, introduced the boys to the story of the last leader of the Knights Templar. Jacques DeMolay is an exemplar of loyalty, courage, fidelity and toleration. Thus was launched the Order of DeMolay.

San Jose Chapter was formed 1921 and was (arguably) the first DeMolay Chapter in California. The chapter has been under the sponsorship of San Jose Scottish Rite almost continuously since that time. As with all organizations, as we all have most likely experienced, membership grows and wanes from time to time, but the foundation and purpose of DeMolay have held fast throughout the years.

As did Frank Land in 1919, you are receiving a 'call' asking for a favor.

San Jose Chapter needs revitalization. A few years ago a small group of men, mostly Masons and some former DeMolay's, were called upon to help rebuild the chapter. Some successes have been seen, but we need help.

We need some support from the members of the Scottish Rite in growing the membership of the chapter and in volunteering to serve on the Advisory Council. The Advisory Council's goal is to help guide the young men of the chapter in becoming a fully functional DeMolay Chapter – from conducting meetings with the DeMolay rituals to planning events (such as the Blue Lodge Iron Chef contest). We desire to give advice when it is asked for, but the members of the chapter run their organization.

The membership is very low, to the point where your chapter is not fully functional. Do you have a son, a grandson, nephew, neighbor's son, etc., who could benefit from an organization that embraces the precepts of love of parents, reverence for sacred things, courtesy, comradeship, fidelity, cleanness, and patriotism?

We need young men who want to become leaders, to learn how to plan and conduct events, to help their fellow members learn and grasp the lessons of DeMolay, and to just have some fun. We need young men who want to be active in San Jose Chapter, getting as much back as they give. We need young men who may just become the next generation of Masons.

San Jose Chapter is in the phase of reforming and planning, working on building the foundation for the members to learn and grow. We have a few members, but these few are dedicated to the organization and anxious to see the chapter grow to the strength and 'glory' it once had. We must have something for young men to be attracted to; we need to be able to make a promise that they are joining a vital organization. There are so many other great activities our youth can be involved with, we have to compete! We need to build the chapter's capacity for new members while increasing membership – this will not be a simple task, but the rewards will so much bigger than the efforts.

REGIONAL ORIENT MEMBERSHIP AMBASSADOR'S MESSAGE May 2013

A ncient Craft Masonry ("Blue Lodge"), the Scottish Rite, the Royal Arch, Cryptic Rite and Knight Templarism: each has one its own laws, rules, and regulations, written and unwritten. All of these, when viewed as a single subject, comprise Masonic jurisprudence. As in civil jurisprudence where Federal, State, County and City laws differ, in Freemasonry each Rite

has its own jurisprudence, and inside each Rite its local or constituent bodies have their by-laws. Nevertheless, as in civil law, Masonic jurisprudence is in substance the same set of fundamental laws.

This fundamental principle should be remembered when the rules and regulations governing individual Scottish Rite members are considered. Individual Scottish Rite membership is an office: each member has his own place to sit, his own time to act or speak, his own duties to perform, his own rights and privileges, his own regalia and his own responsibility. His title as a 32° Scottish Rite Mason is significant and as much a title as Venerable Master, Senior Warden or Marshal of Ceremonies.

Unlike the member of a club or a society, there is nothing fluid or uncertain in a Scottish Rite Mason's activities. He may be volunteering his time and efforts, but he has also agreed to carry out certain duties as a Scottish Rite Mason, including to pay dues, to vote, to take part in discussions, to obey when instructed or ordered by the Master, to give relief, to visit the sick, to answer the Sign of Distress, and to hold office if in his Brethrens' judgment he ought to do so. A member, solely in his capacity as a member, also has his own designated right of power as a Scottish Rite Mason. The laws, rules, and regulations by which he is governed appear on the surface to be little more than restrictions and restraints, as if in the eyes of the Fraternity he were "merely a member." However, if those rules and regulations are analyzed, and if they are observed in action, one will find that their grand purpose is to guarantee that no officer, custom, or set of circumstances shall interfere with a member's freedom—his freedom to act, his rights, his duties, or his power.

Maury Dunbar & Freemasonry

For thirty years the San Jose Scottish Rite of Freemasonry enjoyed over twelve hundred talks from its Orator and Librarian Maury Dunbar. The talks ranged from Masonic personalities and ancient societies to modern conflicts.

Eighty percent of the more than over 5,600 volumes in the Scottish Rite Library were found by Maury, some by rummaging through Good Will and other stores. He transformed the library. The library now holds rare and first editions volumes plus the holy scriptures of the world's great religions. You may find books concerning Masonic history and personalities such as Benjamin Franklin. Maury, a college professor and Steinbeck scholar, said that you could earn a master's degree in English by studying Shakespeare in the library.

The Scottish Rite awarded Maury with the coveted 33rd Degree.

He was the:


