Well, is it just me, or WHEW!!!!

Every day is precious (Grand and Glorious in every respect), and we give thanks to God for each and every one, but this past year has been tough.



Our Valley started this past year on a happy and exciting note with the Installation of new officers. We had a couple of events early in the year, and as all are painfully aware, we came to a screeching halt. Since the middle of March there have been no fraternal gatherings of any kind.

From the first line of Charles' Dickens, A Tale of Two Cities, "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times". It is true that our traditional meetings and events did not take place, but despite all that, we had many successes.

Our clinicians continued to give valuable care to our children in their speech therapy, but it was all through video therapy. As it turned out, parents had to be more involved, a bi-product that has turned out to be even better therapy that we thought it might. _____ children were treated throughout this past year. We added back, a third clinician, Angela Stephens who worked for us in past. She had been working with video therapy before the pandemic hit, and she was excited about adding some our kids to her list of patients. As well, this has alleviated some of our wait list of kids that might not have been treated otherwise.

We were able to initiate 12 new members this last month, again in a state-wide video "Virtual" setting. It was tremendously successful, and most valleys throughout the state brought in new candidates of their own.

We were able to recognize a graduating senior and again awarded a \$10,000 four-year scholarship to her.

In May, we negotiated a one-year contract with Amazon, who are now leasing 280 of our parking spots for their delivery vans and employees. The funds derived from this contract are almost 2 ½ times what we could bring in with our rental program in the building. And we didn't need extra manpower, janitorial supplies or wear and tear on the building. They use the parking lot with nothing needed from us. They





The New Year is coming but January I has not always been observed as the first day of a new year as our Orator, the Honorable David Kimball, explained at our last meeting.

The earliest recorded celebrations of the new year go back to ancient Babylon 4000 years ago. They observed it at the first new moon following the vernal equinox. Sounds a bit like how we observe Easter.

Past civilizations have used agricultural and astronomical events to mark the new year. The Egyptians used the annual flooding of the Nile for their new year while the Chinese celebrated it at the second new moon after the winter solstice. As I mentioned a few months back, following the French Revolution, France observed September I as their new year.

Medieval Europe temporarily replaced the first day of the new year, January I, with December 25 (Jesus' birth) (winter solstice) and March 25 (Feast of the Annunciation) (vernal equinox). It has been said the early Christian church moved some observances to coincide with pagan festivals in order to gain converts. In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII reestablished January I as the first day of the new year.

Our American new year traditions include eating "Hoppin' John" for good luck, singing "Auld Lang Syne" and dropping the ball at Times Square.

From a Masonic standpoint, the best suggestion how to start the new year comes from a non-Mason, the founder of The Old Farmer's Almanac, Robert B. Thomas "Begin the new year square with every man".



Twenty Sixth Degree — Prince of Mercy

We were introduced to the Hebrew mysteries in the 24th Degree, followed by the Islamic mysteries in the 25th. In this Degree, we explore the Christian mysteries. By way of review, these three degrees posit that religions are the basic level of spiritual learning. The mysteries are the advanced level. As we experience the mysteries, we must elevate our ways of thinking about things, and mentally exchange absolutes for possibilities.

Bodies of the 26th Degree are called Chapters. The colors of a Chapter of Princes of Mercy are red, white, and green. They are seen in the hangings of the room and the Venerable Chief's tunic. The altar is triangular. We will learn more about it shortly.

The presiding officer is the Venerable Chief (VC). At the beginning of the conferral, he explains to the candidate that the Chapter represents a meeting of Christian Masons that meets at night in the catacombs under the city of Rome during the reign of Emperor Domitian.

A Little History

Since Roman times, there is a series of underground tombs or catacombs under the city of Rome. Before the Christian religion became legal in 313 CE, potential converts had to study in secret, and the catacombs were an ideal place. These students were known as catechumens. The material they studied was called a catechism. After a Mason receives a degree, if he elects to learn the full-form proficiency, he memorizes a catechism, which is a series of questions and answers.

Domitian was the younger brother of Titus, who led the Roman 10th Legion in its sack of Jerusalem and destruction of the Temple in 70 CE. Domitian believed the Roman Empire should be governed as a divine monarchy led by himself as a benevolent despot. He acted accordingly. Toward the end of his reign, Domitian heavily persecuted Jews and Christians, who rejected the Roman gods. That is why the Christians had to meet underground at night, so the Romans would not see them.

The Candidate has a Name

The Candidate in this degree takes the name Constans. Remember that name, as we will hear it again in a future degree. The VC explains to Constans that he previously attained the 2nd degree of the early Christian Mysteries, and it about to receive the third and final degree and become one of the Faithful and Elect.

The VC asks Constans what he was taught before becoming a Mason. Constans replies, "That I should invoke the blessing of God." At this point the VC has everybody kneel and recite the Lord's Prayer. See Matthew 6:9-13. After prayer, everybody stands, then the VC gavels once and they sit.

Immediately, the VC begins his first lecture, discussing the early practices of Christianity. According to the lecture, Christians were divided into three groups: Auditors, Catechumens, and the Faithful. At the first stage, the Auditors received certain ceremonies and instruction to prepare them to study the Christian faith. At the second stage, the Catechumens underwent purifications and baptism, and learned dogmas of the religion. At the third stage, the Faithful learned the mysteries of the faith, such as the Incarnation, Nativity, Passion, and Resurrection of Christ.

Christianity 101

Since some Masons do not come from a Christian background, we should briefly define these terms. Incarnation refers to the idea that Jesus was sired by God, as opposed to having a human father. Nativity is about the birth of Jesus, with accompanying events that demonstrate his divine status and mission. The Passion refers to Jesus's suffering and death on the cross, said to be a vicarious atonement for all mankind. Resurrection refers to the process whereby Jesus was restored to life in a new immortal form. Christ refers to a spiritual anointing that Jesus received to fulfill his mission. The term Christ comes from the Greek word for anointed: $X\rho i\sigma to \zeta \text{ (Christos)}. \text{ Of these events, only the crucifixion is considered historic, that is, Bible scholars and historians agree that it actually happened.}$

The Mysteries

The VC continues, explaining that many ancient writers talked about a mystic aspect to Christianity, similar in form to the Grecian (Greek) mysteries. That includes secret doctrines that only select members received. These groups has three

degrees or levels: the Material, the Intellectual, and the Spiritual. These teachings and practices or sacraments are contained in a work called "The Celestial Hierarchy".

There really is a publication called The Celestial Hierarchy. It was written sometime during the 5th century by a Christian theologian known as Pseudo-Dionysius. The work deals primarily with the nine orders of angels. The work influenced the theology of Orthodox movement, as well as that of the Christian scholar—philosopher, Thomas Aquinas. You can read English translations of The Celestial Hierarchy on multiple websites.

The Orator and Junior Warden then recite the story of Jesus' trial before the Roman Prefect Pontius Pilate, based primarily on the account found in John chapters 18 and 19. If you study the accounts of Jesus' trial from a legal standpoint, there emerges a powerful example on the miscarriage of justice and the power of mobs.

The VC now gives his second lecture, describing how brutal ignorance leads the low masses of humanity to hatred of those who try to teach them and to regard intellect and learning as their enemies. The setting maul, which we learned about in the 3rd degree, is a symbol of brute force.

Two Heros address The Question

There is a correlation with the stories of Hiram Abiff and Jesus in that they both suggest immortality of the soul. We know the Hiramic legend is just that, a legend. And the resurrection of Jesus must be taken as a matter of faith. But the point is immortality of the soul, some form of life or continuation of consciousness after physical death.

Science cannot prove that the soul exists, what it is, nor its life expectancy. Neither can philosophy explain it. The only way for a person to really know is to experience death and then see what happens. A normal, healthy human mind may be curious about death and the hereafter, but definitely not in a hurry to find out. So in the meantime, we just wonder about it.

The lecture continues by explaining how the death, burial, and raising of Hiram's body from the grave sym-

bolize the death and resurrection of Jesus and also burying the sins of the natural man and experience a new life by means of faith. Reflected here is the idea that you can leave the stains of the past behind you and become a new person in the here and now. No need to fear death and hope something good happens to you afterwards.

The VC goes on to compare the three Masonic pillars of Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty, typified by King Solomon, Hiram King of Tyre, and Hiram Abiff with the Christian Trinity of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Christianity 102

Since we are learning about the Christian faith, we should know that the doctrine of the Trinity is not found in the Bible. The Christians of the 1st century struggled to understand the relationship between Jesus and God. The existence of a relationship is obvious from reading the Gospels. Trinity was the explanation that eventually gained the most acceptance. Trinitarian Christians have attempted to compare this idea to other religions, such a the Hindu deities Brahma, the creator; Vishnu, the sustainer; and Shiva, the destroyer. Another example is Osiris, Isis, and Horus, from the Egyptian pantheon. Unfortunately, these comparisons rely on oversimplified notions.

Back to the Lecture

The lecture concludes with the premise that no human virtue is more worthy of imitation than to lay down one's life for his family, his country, or his cause. See John 15:13. This does not mean that you're supposed to give up your life, like some form of surrender. It means you are willing to face death even though you don't deserve to die. We remember some people like that every Memorial Day.

Now comes the question that determines whether Constans (the candidate) is worthy to become a Prince of Mercy, a true recipient of the 26th degree. The VC asks Constans, "Do you believe that you are so duly and truly prepared, truly prepared to be made a Prince of Mercy, that if you were about to be put to death by an unjust judgement of the people, could you sincerely say, 'Father, forgive them for they know not what they do'?" See Luke 23:34.

Constans responds, "I hope with the help of God I could."

The VC asks, "If death were imminent, could you sincerely say, 'Oh my Father! If it be possible, let this cup pass from

me! Yet not my will but Yours be done'?" See Matthew 26:39.

Constans again responds,"I hope with the help of God I could."

The VC declares, "My Bother, you are worthy to be accepted among the Faithful (the third and final degree of Christian mysticism). What now do you most desire?"

Constans responds, "Light."

The VC says, "Jesus of Nazareth said, 'I have come as light into the world that whoever believes in me may not remain in darkness.' (See John 12:46) My Brother, this is life eternal, to know the only one true God, and the Word that did create the universe, in whom is light, and that light the life of men. (Compare John 17:3 and 1:4) My Brethren, aid me to bring this newly accepted Brother to light!"

The VC helps Constans to stand, and then continues, "Behold the darkness is past, and the True Light now shines... You have been taught to believe in the true God. As Masons, we do not know if you are a Christian, Jew, or Muslim, or even of another faith..." He then explains that if you want people to respect your religion, you must also respect theirs.

Next, the VC describes the altar. In the center of the room is a three-sided altar. Each side is 18 inches wide and the altar is 36 inches tall. Two items sit atop the altar. One is a golden equilateral triangle with the Hebrew letters YHVH, the Greek letters A and Ω , and a passion cross. The VC explains that these symbols come from the Book of Revelation (in the Christian Bible).

At this point, Constans stands before the altar, and the VC asks him whether he assents to the instruction he has received so far in the degree. He does. Is he willing to be solemnly bound to the duties imposed by this degree? He is.



It was during this time that Kyle's speech was limited, as it was difficult for him to express himself or for people to understand him. His mother says, "he was only able to produce single 2-3 word sentences". Because of this, "Kyle became easily frustrated and had many behavioral problems at school".

Sharon describes Kyle's current speech-language abilities as "gaining more confidence speaking to people. As his vocabulary increases he is able to speak in longer sentences. He is also using more past tense words when describing past events". Sharon feels as though "life is easier when we can understand things that Kyle says", and "we are able to have him talk about his frustrations and reduce the frequency of his melt-downs".

Sharon feels like the speech therapist that works with Kyle is helpful, flexible, and very patient. The speech therapist understands Kyle's needs and has very good strategies to get Kyle to cooperate during sessions. Sharon describes her experience at the clinic as "feeling welcomed. The speech therapist we see at the clinic is always very friendly. At the end of the session she always goes over things they do during the speech and updates my child's progress with me. I am very happy with her services".

We thank Kyle's family for sharing their experiences and are so pleased to hear that they see steady progress in his speech and language development. We look forward to continuing his progress through teletherapy as it has been an effective and fun new way to learn.





have indicated they want to extend the lease for another year, and maybe as many as 5 years. A real financial boon for our Foundation.

Our Building Fund Campaign also saw a huge donation of funds this past year. Although we started out as three year campaign, as we finish our 2nd year, to date, we have collected nearly 90% of our \$250,000 Goal. Thanks to all who generously contributed to this cause.

Financially, as I write this article with three weeks left in the year, we are currently some \$236,000 better than budget. This is due to many factors, but none the less, a huge accomplishment for the Foundation.

And finally, I want to spend some time talking about the building itself. Due to the Herculean efforts of our staff, Gregg, Angela and Monica to upgrade the building, you will not recognize the building today. We have painted the entire interior of the building; as well new floors have been installed throughout most of our areas; New ceiling tiles in the foyer and halls; new lighting throughout; new plugs and switches; completely updated stage with new curtains and lights; new dishwasher in the kitchen; completely refurbished apartment; complete new clinic spaces; a new dividing wall between the auditorium and dining room; and new risers in the auditorium which has added an additional 90+ seats. There are numerous other smaller tasks that were also completed. In all, the building which was built in 1984 has never looked better! But this could not have been accomplished only with the staff's efforts. We also had a few member volunteers who gave of their time and talents. One such volunteer was Wor. Art Pasquinelli, who for five – six months was in the building nearly every day, painting, cleaning, demolishing, moving or whatever other task we threw at him. He was truly a godsend! As well, Jeff Toone spent many hours on our computer network and audio visual components of our operation. And Brandon Duenas, who spent numerous hours as a Jack of all trades addition to the team. Lastly, I would like to recognize a non-member (although a Mason from Scotland), Jimmy Reilly who painted nearly the entire interior of the building putting in hundreds of hours over the last 8 months. His talents were invaluable to making the walls look fresh and clean. He was truly amazing.

So as we close out 2020, we look to a new year, and a new corps of officers who will be installed Tuesday, January 12th, to take us to a new chapter in our history.

A huge thank-you to our four outgoing Masters, Brother Wolfgang Lochner (Venerable Master), Wor. Art Pasquinelli (Wise Master), Bro. Richard Fisher (Commander of Kadosh), and Wor. Dell Bleiler (Master of Kadosh of the Consistory).who had a tough road to keep our members engaged as best they could through these times. They can all be very proud of how they helped to lead our Valley.

Again, as of this writing, we have no idea what lay ahead or when we can get back to some sort of normalcy. Each year I try to discuss what events we are anticipating, but I am going to dispense with that this year and not try to out guess when we can get back to meeting in person. But I do want to remind all, that as this is an odd-numbered year, we look forward to being able to recognize some of our deserving members through Supreme Council, by elevating a few of them to the rank of Inspector General Honorary or 33 Degree, as well as bestowing the rank of Knight Commander of the Court of Honour or KCCH. We look forward to hearing the results of Supreme Council's decision.

The last item I would like to speak to is communication. Please let us know how we are doing. What would excite you to return to an active role? Our Valley is here to support you, but I need to know your thoughts and desires. Please contact me when you think we are failing. Let us know also, when you think we are doing well, but most importantly communicate. You are a valued member and we value your input. The Valley is only successful if you think we have done right. Let us know!
