From the Personal Representative:

T his months message is going to be something of a continuation of "The Four T's of Masonry" and will be another of the explicit qualities we are taught to practice in our daily lives; that of Temperance.

This is another of the many personal characteristics taught in the first degree, and I have included it in this series for several reasons. First that

I might get the readers thinking in the direction this subject leads us, and secondly, if we are discussing personal qualities, temperance should be high on everyone's list.

In the First Degree, we are told that Temperance is that due restraint on the affections and passions that renders the body tame and governable and frees the mind from the allurement of vice. This quality alone is one of the preeminent characteristics of a judicious, well disciplined life. We can be cheerful, out-going, and possessed of a lively sense of humor and still exercise Temperance.

A temperate person is sensitive to the concerns of others and courteous to all, without becoming unnecessarily subservient. A temperate person considers consequences before rushing into ill advised or hastily conceived situations. A temperate person controls his or her anger when confronted with difficult situations or with difficult people. Temperate people are pleasant to be with, because they exercise self control and are slow to wrath, as we are instructed in the Holy Writings.

Another word for temperance might be moderation. We seek moderation in all that we do and say because it reflects good taste and self restraint. The architectural instrument that best represents temperance, of course, is the compass. It reminds us to contain our desires and keep our passions under control toward all mankind. It teaches us self restraint. Have you ever encountered an inconsiderate driver and, after he or she has passed you, you look down and see a bumper sticker or other emblem that identifies that person as a member of a religious group or other organization that preaches the Golden Rule? How do his hasty or inconsiderate actions affect your thinking with regard to that person's representing that organization?

We, as identified with the family of Masonry, dwell in glass houses. Our actions are being scrutinized continually, and because we are Masons, we are held to a higher standard than the general public. Our families, our coworkers, the members of our church, and even our friends tend to hold us to answer for our actions on a little higher plane than they do of the rest of society, and that is the way we have chosen to live. When we accepted the mantle of Masonry, we committed to a set of principles by which we agreed to govern our lives and that set of principles says that we are to be temperate in our every act and word.

When I hear a brother Mason use foul, inconsiderate, or abusive language, I mentally cringe, because that type of language is intemperate. It hurts him more than it hurts the person for whom it is intended, but it also hurts the fraternity. When I see a brother act inconsiderately or intolerantly toward another, I want to look for a place to hide, because I am embarrassed for the sake of our principles.

It is one of the four cardinal virtues, I know, but moreover, it is our obligation to our selves and our fraternity to exercise temperance in all we do in this life.

A lthough it has been more than 650 years since Jacques DeMolay died as a martyr to truth and fidelity, the ideas for which he gave his life are be-

ing perpetuated by young men the world over as members of the Order of DeMolav

A youth organization open to young men between the ages of 13 and 21, DeMolay is separate and distinct, from any affiliation, including Masonry. Membership is not restricted to relatives of Masons, but open to all who merit the honor.

It is a *youth* organization that shares *many* precepts with Freemasonry and many DeMolays later join Masonic lodges. More than 100 have become Grand Masters. Like Masonry, it has a beautiful ritual with invaluable moral lessons.

Since its founding by Frank Land over half a century

ago, nearly *3000,000* young men have knelt at altars of 2,500 chapters in ii countries and territories. Among leaders in school and community, DeMolays have gone or to distinguished careers in business, government, military. entertainment and athletics Men such as Walt Disney, John Wayne, Chet Huntley, Vaughn Monroe, Bob Mathias, Fred MacMurray, Alvin Dark, John Steinbeck, and countless others have been DeMolavs.

On the 50th anniversary of DeMolay, Walter Cronkite wrote in part, "DeMolay does a lot for a young man of today It provides a valuable supplement to the principles and guidelines he has been taught by his parents, the school, and the church . . . Heaven only knows *we* read, hear and see a lot of what's wrong with young people today.' We need DeMolay for the youth of our country."

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From the Clinic!!!

P aige is an adorable four year old who has been coming to the San Jose Scottish Rite Childhood Language Disorders Clinic two times per week since mid-March 2009. She has been receiving speech and language therapy since she was one year old due to her diagnosis of Down Syndrome. Children with this diagnosis can learn to talk but tend to do so later than their typically developing peers. These children tend to understand speech (receptive language) much better than they are able to speak (expressive language). In order to help bridge this gap and facilitate her expressive communication, Paige was taught sign language early on. When Paige was initially evaluated at the San Jose Scottish Rite Childhood Language Disorders Clinic, she was communicating primarily via signs/gestures and few words. At the time services were started, Paige's mom recalls, "She understood objects by name, but now she's...not just gain-



ing new sounds to form words but the understanding/meaning of her word choices".

Paige's expressive language has improved considerably in the short time she has been coming to the clinic. She is now primarily using words and short sentences to express herself and get her needs and wants met. Additionally, Paige is now using words for several communicative purposes such as commenting, protesting, and asking questions rather than simply labeling objects in her immediate environment. Her family has noted that "her expressive language has dramatically improved. We understand what she is saying most of the time by her use of language. She is much less frustrated and outright opinionated about preferences using words..." Paige has also reportedly made gains in her speech and language goals from the school district, and the team working with her is beginning to recognize her cognitive and language potential. Mom reports, "We all seem to enjoy her so much more as she's more interactive with new language skills."

Treatment sessions are primarily play based to encourage and expand on language. Through expansion techniques (taking what Paige says/does and adding to it) Paige's play skills have improved as she is now playing with multiple objects in multi-step play and is not as rigid and one dimensional in her play skills. Paige and her family have worked with several different clinicians in the past, though remark that Paige's current therapist "…sees and treats Paige as a whole person with potential for learning, and Paige rises to the occasion." Paige's parents state that they would absolutely tell other families about the services provided at the clinic because, "…the therapists can help the children and they are so effective at helping the parents as well. It's a learning process for us all…everyone is so kind, educated in their fields and have real hearts of service. The long wait to get in is so well worth it."

Paige's mom comments, "I am simply so grateful for this place. My daughter does receive speech therapy from school, but I don't believe she would be this far without your clinic. My heart is filled with gratefulness. Thank you for serving a true need."

From the Master of Kadosh

Happy Birthday, America!" So sang the young family in the front yard of their home in Montpelier, Idaho on the sunny afternoon of July 4 two years ago as my sister and I drove past. It was a touching moment for us but not the way you might think. She is a college professor and agnostic. I'm a hands-on, 12



-years-to-graduate-college guy and gnostic (direct opposite of an agnostic). We had an interesting discussion about the meaning of America's birthday.

Many people use the term "America" when they refer to "The United States of America." The USA was born on July 4, 1776 with the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Her conception took place not decades but centuries earlier. And she is still a work-in-progress. During the July 4 holiday, we often talk about the people and the ideas that formed the basis for our country. We reflect on heroic moments during the Revolutionary War, the Boston Tea party, and other events of the late 18th century. Yet to have a country, you also need a place, a physical location. You must have land. This July 4, I'm thinking about the land we call America.

My ancestors came to the United States from Europe at different times from the 17th through the 19th centuries. I do not have reliable information about all of them. Most of us here today are not originally from this land, and our nation is not original, either. As we all know, beginning in the 1500s, the Europeans began to displace the native populations of two complete continents. The land was theirs long before it became ours. Yet based on new archeological evidence, there were significant geographical shifts in populations during centuries before the Europeans came. So who can say that what we think of as natives are not themselves ancient encroachers upon pre-historic inhabitants?

People are still coming to live in the USA. The Europeans have been here so long that we consider ourselves to be the natives, even the owners. Some of us view the newcomers with suspicion, as trespassers. I know several Naturalized Americans (people from somewhere else who became US citizens) who navigated the immigration maze, or who are trying to bring relatives here after 9/11. After hearing their stories, all I can say is, be glad you were born here!

I work for an offshore company, that is, a company whose headquarters is in another country. If you look at our company website, you don't get that impression, but that is the reality of the matter. The majority of the people I work with were not born in the US. Nor is English their native language. Some are here on permanent visas. A few have become naturalized US citizens. We have regular visits by employees from other offices. Lots of VoIP calls, too. Communication is an ongoing challenge, to say the least.

One guy, a friend of mine, recently gathered up his family and moved back home to China. Before departing, he said to me, "Everybody asks me, why don't you want to stay in America? Why are you going back to China?" Of course, that was exactly what I was thinking, but I was too embarrassed to admit it. So I asked cleverly, "How did you respond?" He said, "China is my home. My whole family is there. I can find a house there." I understood that. After two years in South America, I was ready to come home, too.

I guess not everybody in the world wants to come to America or to be an American. Those who do are looking for a fresh start, or maybe an escape from poverty, oppression, overcrowding, of lack of opportunity common to much of the world. That's why my great grandfather came and why I'm still here. It reminds me of the favorite Woody Guthrie song, written in 1940 and recorded in 1944:

This land is your land, this land is my land From California to the New York Island From the Redwood Forest to the Gulf Stream waters This land was made for you and me.

Brethren, Ladies and Friends,


