here are a number of issues on my mind this month, but space constrains my hand and I'll just address two that I feel are particularly timely and which interrelate closely.



Our clubs seem to be experiencing a revival with old and new members

stepping up into roles of responsibility to help out. This is a great reassurance to me as I feel the clubs are critical to the success of the order.

One of the aspects of Scottish Rite that has always impressed me is its atmosphere of fraternal interaction and our clubs certainly exemplify this principle and stand as beacons in the areas they represent. You'll read elsewhere in the Rite Word of the activities of the individual clubs, but I don't think it is too repetitive of me to express my enthusiasm and how favorably impressed I have been during my recent visits to all three of our clubs. Keep up the good work, brethren, and many of us from the "Center" will attend as often as we possibly can. Also, please keep us, here at the Center, informed as to your activities and we will try to highlight them in the Rite Word.

On another note, our Scholarship Committee has been working to come up with a solid program that represents the philosophy of the Valley of San Jose and how we view our obligation to support deserving students in their quest for education. It has not been an easy task. Brother Richard Fisher 32° KCCH, Senior Warden of the Lodge of Perfection is Chairman of the committee, with Brother Dave Gibson 32° KCCH, Brother Dave Kimball 32°, and Brother Jeff Conway 32° rounding out the

membership.

For a universe from which to make a selection, we have imposed on the California Masonic Foundation to furnish us the names of a number of applicants from our jurisdictional area who, while well qualified for consideration, fell just beyond the Masonic Foundation's ability to furnish funding. We are contacting these students and will further evaluate their suitability and eligibility to participate in our program and then, if it is appropriate, we will confer on two or three of them scholarships of about \$2,500.00 each, renewable for three more years. We hope to involve the clubs in this process, if the students chosen live in their regions, which it appears they all do.

I believe this is a winning combination of our charitable and fraternal obligations. It gives us community visibility, fraternal activity, and in the process gives deserving students access to much needed financial support. Furthermore, students living any distance from our Center will have one of our clubs to whom they can relate and report to insure faithful follow-up on their commitment and continued successful performance.

The Scholarship Program is a work in progress, and this may not be the final form of its development. Our committee is working diligently with my encouragement, and we all welcome any input the other members of the fraternity may want to provide.

Keep honking, brethren and ladies. We're still listening.

The Package, or the Contents?

An article written by M.W. James H. May, PGM of Arizona, published originally in the November 2001 issue of Arizona Masonry provides the basis for this message.

"Is ritual the "foundation of Freemasonry?" Nope. No more than a

table of contents is a book or than a Lodge is a building."

The <u>Contents</u> of Masonry <u>is</u>, <u>"a system of morals and ethics."</u> Our <u>Package</u> is the ritual and it presents our Contents in very beautiful ways. It is the process by which we convey to our candidates and repeat to ourselves the moral and ethical values we wish to practice, and further, it reminds us of our duties to God, our neighbor and ourselves. Properly presented, it is the most beautifully wrapped gift that we can give.

I have had many discussions relative to our Ritual and even more about the "dumbing down" of our ritual in order that we maintain or improve our membership.

Quoting M.W. May:

"Our ritual has a certain beauty and grace because its language is <u>not</u> that of today. But it is also <u>not</u>

the language of the ancient craftsmen whose accomplishments we celebrate. It is of far more recent vintage. It is different from place to place and also over time, having been altered by many individuals past and present. Further, the ritual has continued to evolve — even up to the present day. Changes have been made consciously and unconsciously, some approved by Grand Lodges while others just "tiptoed through the back door". Most Grand Lodges that now have a written ritual made a transition from an unwritten oral ritual at some earlier point. When they made the decision to write it down for the first time, change was inevitable. Just visualize the debates over exactly WHAT to write down. Someone's viewpoint prevailed while another's did not. That's change.

Is ritual a key element of the Craft? Certainly! We wouldn't be the same without it. I wouldn't look forward to attending Lodge and hearing it time and again if it had no effect on me. It always does, and I'm convinced it helps make me a better person. It's a gentle reminder of duties and obligations, attitudes and behaviors that make life more positive and enjoyable."

In conclusion, it is my firm belief that the most beautiful aspect of Masonry is the system itself. – "The system of morals and ethics under which certain men choose to live their lives."

From the Clinic!!!

What did you say? I'm sorry I still can't understand you!

Athan is an eight and a half year old boy who has been seen at the Scottish Rite Speech and Language Clinic once a week for 17 months. When Nathan first began services at the clinic, he was lisping and having trouble correctly producing several consonant blends and the "r" sound.

Nathan has made great progress. He no longer lisps and has no trouble making consonant blends. The "r" sound has continued to be hard for him but he has mastered "r" at the beginning of words and the "er" sound. Nathan is a bright, funny and very mature eight year old, who loves games, sports and jokes. Nathan's mother, Jenny recently completed a survey about her experience at our clinic.



Nathan's mother heard about the clinic through a friend and researched it on-line. After therapy she stated, "Nathan no longer lisps and he can speak far more clearly. Even his problems with the letter "r" have been reduced greatly." She stated, "Nathan use to get very frustrated when he was not understood at school and at home, he would cry and yell constantly." She reported, "Now Nathan is very confident and happy."

When asked what has been most rewarding about receiving services here she stated, "Watching Nathan's confidence build and not having to constantly ask him -what did you say, I'm sorry I still can't understand you. This had made a tremendous impact on all of us."

She described her experience by saying, "Our therapists have been warm, caring, friendly, helpful, understanding, accommodating and professional."

When asked if she would refer other parents to this clinic, she stated, "I have told other parents about our wonderful experience with this clinic. The process of going through speech therapy can be daunting and the Scottish Rite offers a high quality program in a caring environment."

Nathan's mother stated, "We are so grateful to have had Nathan accepted into the Scottish Rite speech program. Nathan's speech, attitude, and confidence have improved tremendously."

The Miracle of RiteCare Clinics, Centers, and Programs

In the early 1950s in Colorado, the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States initiated a program to help children with speech and language disorders. The results obtained from this program led to the establishment of RiteCare clinics to provide diagnostic evaluation and treatment of speech and language disorders, as well as learning disabilities.

Today there are 168 RiteCare clinics, centers, and special programs operating or planned for children and therapists located throughout the United States. Each facility is staffed by speech-language pathologists or other trained personnel. Through the support of Scottish Rite members, these clinics, centers, and programs continue to increase. The value of this philanthropy has long been apparent. Tens of thousands of youngsters across the United States have been helped significantly. With the good work of dedicated clinicians and parents, the Scottish Rite has achieved successes that could only be imagined a few years back. Children who might have remained educationally handicapped for a lifetime can now talk, read, and lead useful lives.

An Item of Interest:

Dan Brown, the author of "The Da Vinci Code", is believed to be writing another book tentatively titled "The Solomon Key" which is "set deep within the oldest fraternity in history ... the enigmatic brotherhood of the Masons". The planned release date for Mr. Brown's new book is not yet known, however, speculations are that the book may be released on a date that is of significance to Freemasonry. Since some of the leaders of the American Revolution were Masons, including George Washington, the book may be released on July Fourth, which is also the date in 1848 that the cornerstone of the Washington Monument was laid in a ceremony hosted by Freemasons.

On September 18, 1793, President Washington led a Masonic parade down Pennsylvania Avenue to lay the cornerstone of the U.S. Capitol. It is considered to be one of the most important events in Masonic history. Also, the cornerstone of the White House was laid on October 13, 1792, during a Masonic celebration. On that day in 1307, the King of France ordered the arrest of all Knights Templar. Any of these dates are candidates for the projected release date.

Mr. Brown has toured a number of Masonic temples to get the historical facts correct, says Akram Elias, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accept Masons of the District of Columbia.

Message from the Master of Kadosh

recently was introduced to the Masonic writings of Brother Manly P. Hall, 33° through his book "The Lost Keys of Freemasonry". It has made a big impact on me and has furthered my understanding of the secret of Hiram Abiff. I want to share some of



Brother Hall's insights on Freemasonry during this Scottish Rite year via this regular message from the Master of Kadosh. I have chosen to focus on his truly insightful thoughts concerning the qualifications of a true Mason. I want to start by telling you a bit more about Brother Hall.

Brother Hall wrote the aforementioned book in 1921-23 and it was published in 1923 when he was just 21 years of age and 31 years before he became a Mason. At that time his only actual contact with Freemasonry was through a few books commonly available to the public. It was through his study of comparative religion that he became aware of the secret philosophical schools and societies of the ancient world and how Freemasonry was related to the other Mystery Schools in the common goal to regenerate man and reform human society.

In next month's "Rite Word", I will begin the discussion of the true qualifications of a Mason as set forth by the then 21 year old non-Mason who was subsequently raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in Jewel Lodge No. 374 in San Francisco in 1954. In 1961 he was invested as a KCCH and then received the 33° in recognition of his contributions to Scottish Rite Freemasonry.


