M asons are a strange breed. We are, for the most part, intensely proud of our membership in this great organization, yet we are constrained by our interpretation of tradition from assertively seeking out other men whom we might consider good material for membership in Masonry.

We spread ourselves thin over a great number of Masonic, community and church programs and organizations, yet when someone asks us if we'd mind helping out or supporting their particular effort or project, we agree as though we had nothing else on our calendar and nothing but time on our hands.

We complain that our fraternity is sadly in need of modernization, yet we cling tenaciously to ancient landmarks and traditions, perhaps hoping that there will actually be a "National Treasure" discovered that will give to the fraternity the stature and credibility that we all know it deserves.

We delight in the association and friendship of our brothers and their families, but are somehow unable to convince the world that this is truly a brotherhood in the purest sense of the word. Recently, I had contact with a tradesman that told me he had been instructed by the manager of his company to check out some problems I was having with my telephone. He completed his analysis, located several problems, fixed them, and came to my door to report the results of his work. He was apparently puzzled by the work order and that it had come from so high a source in the company. When he asked me how that had occurred, I told him that I knew the man who signed the work order as a fellow Mason. A sly grin came over his face and he said with a wink, "Oh, a brother, eh?"

I asked the repairman if it would have made any difference if I had just called the phone company customer service desk to report the problem, and he was forced to think a bit. He admitted it would not have made a difference, but I can't help wondering if it wouldn't have been better for me to have claimed that the manager was just my

brother or brother-in-law, or a good friend, rather that having given rise to the idea that the great "One-World" conspiracy" was at work.



From the Clinic!!!



liver is a delightful 4-year-old boy who has received therapy services at the Scottish Rite Language Disorders clinic for the past year. When his mother first brought him to our clinic, his speech was very difficult to understand. Oliver was diagnosed with a mild hearing loss in both ears, which was treated with the placement of bilateral tubes. In many cases, hearing loss can result in speech and language delays due to the lack of auditory stimulation both in terms of what the child is hearing and in feedback of their own speech.

Oliver was displaying the phonological process of initial consonant deletion, meaning he left off nearly all of the sounds at the beginning of his words. At that time, Oliver was a very bright 3-year-old boy with a lot to say. His expressive and receptive language skills were above average for his age. As Oliver used more and more complex sentences to communicate, he became harder and harder to understand. Oliver was seen once a week and made steady progress. In April of this year, he was discharged from therapy after meeting all of his goals. While we are very proud of his success, his cute smile and laugh is missed on Monday mornings.

In a parent survey, Oliver's mother stated, "Our conversations are greatly improved and he is understood by nearly everyone he meets. He is now confident enough to initiate conversations." She stated, "It was most rewarding to see the improvements while still seeing the enjoyment on Oliver's face. He loves coming here and never wants to leave." His mother stated that she has passed on information to other parents about the clinic and said, "The environment is friendly and welcoming for the children and parents and we have seen excellent results". Oliver's mother expressed her gratitude in the following thank you note:

Thank you for all your help and support over the past year in helping Oliver improve with his speech. He has become more confident and outgoing and is growing into a very social little boy, and I know that a large part of this is due to his improved language skills. **Thank you for everything.**



As a means to make it more accessible and to reach teachers in a given area, the California Masonic Foundation is endeavoring to put on this course <u>in local areas</u>. To present this opportunity to <u>teachers in our own area</u>, and to make a difference in lives of <u>our local youth</u>, the Scottish Rite Foundation is working with the Blue Lodges in Santa Clara Valley to put this on.
