
I look forward to seeing each of you over this coming year. Come on out and help make a difference!

THE RITE WORD

From the Commander, Council of Kadosh

O ver the years, I have had occasion to discuss the Masonic Fraternity with a number of people. Some people believe they know a lot about the Masons. And a few non-Masons actually do. But most people don't know much because they don't know where to find accurate information. And they don't know anybody who is a Mason. Most people are really not interested.

A number of Mason's wear rings with the ubiquitous Square and Compass. If you're a Mason or if you come from a Masonic family, you immediately recognize the Square and Compass emblem. In my experience, however, most people have little idea what that symbol means or that the wearer is a member of a venerable institution. Or that there actually is such a thing as a venerable institution.

One assumption that any non-Masons make is that the Masonic Fraternity is a monolithic organization, meaning that there is large, centrally controlled body of men who specialize in group-think, secretly influ-

ence historical events, or dream of world domination.

They are surprised when I tell them that Masonry is composite of interdependent organizations. An individual may limit his or her membership to one group and occasional participation. Or, one may join over a dozen groups and become active in each. We joke the member who presents himself for his three Degrees, then you next see him half a century later when his gets his 50-year pin. i have not been a member for 50 years yet, so I cannot claim to actually know somebody like that.

But I do know a large number of people who belong to a number of Masonic organizations, and, outside of occasional scheduling conflicts, seem to find time for all of them. On top of that, they get themselves recruited into leadership roles. Fortunately for such individuals, most leadership jobs are regularly rotated, with officers advancing to the next higher position each calendar year. There are many opportunities for a member to participate. Unfortunately, the number of members willing and able to take on a job with substantial responsibility has clearly been dwindling.

Here at the San Jose Scottish Rite, we are blessed with a strong corps of active members, augmented with a steady influx of enthusiastic new members. As a result, the officer lines in each of the four bodies are filled, as well as positions for trustees, administrators, and degree -teams. 

Mateo is a cute four year, nine month old boy who started services at our clinic due to a moderatesevere receptive and expressive language disorder. While Mateo's native language is Spanish, extensive testing in both English and Spanish revealed that his difficulties were not due to English as a second language.



When Mateo first started treatment, analysis of his language output during a connected speech sample found that his mean-length-of-utterance or MLU was less than one. The MLU is the average number of morphemes that a child produces in a single utterance. It is not necessarily the number of words a child says in one utterance, as the MLU also takes into account the complexity of a child's utterance by examining the syntax and grammar of the utterance. This is important because it can

help indicate a language delay or disorder in comparison to other typically developing children of a similar age. Given Mateo's age at the time of testing, it was expected that he would have an MLU between 3.75 to 4.5.

It has now been a year since Mateo started services, and his language has blossomed. While he still quiet, a recent analysis of his MLU, found it to be at 5.34, which is within the average range as compared to typically developing peers! His mother has noticed a significant difference in his language as well, which has impacted his confidence and "having complete trust in himself. Expressing him[self] with words [has] really impat[ed] me so much and [has made] me so happy" she commented.

While Mateo will continue to come to the clinic to work on grammar, vocabulary and language formulation, he is a much more confident and self-assured youngster. His family has been supportive of him too as they faithfully come every week and always complete the homework. Mateo's mother describes her experience at our clinic as "a wonderful service not just for my son, for my whole family...Special thanks to Rachel...for all the quality time and service." It has truly been a pleasure watching Mateo's language mature and we look forward to seeing him continue to blossom!

Clinic Message for February 2013

I have been asked by our General Secretary, Bob Rowan, to assist in writing some messages about our Childhood Language Disorders Clinic. I appreciate the invitation because I am always pleased to serve and do all I can for our children.

For the calendar year 2012 our clinic served 119 children. In December, despite the end-of-year holidays, our clinicians were able to complete 156 treatment hours for a total of 51 children.

There are currently 90 children on our waiting list, a decrease from a high of nearly 120 children last August when we temporarily closed the waiting list due to high volume. We have now resumed screenings and ask that you direct any parents whose children might need help to contact the Clinic.

Your Scottish Rite Children's Speech and Language Clinic continues to be in need of your financial help. The children in the community need us to continue to provide our services, as indicated by the length of our waiting list. Please consider making a tax-deductible donation to the San Jose Scottish Rite Children's Language Disorders Clinic today.

Thanks again to each of you for your help and support of our Clinic.
