Fraternal greetings! I hope everyone enjoyed the various holiday celebrations including Hanukkah, Christmas, and New Year. Typically, around the New Year people decide to adopt new positive habits and let go of some bad habits. As such, I felt in this month's article I would share a possible new habit for you to consider, if you're not already engaging in it, which is meditation. I will describe a meditation I attempt to do every day for at least 20 minutes. I hope you try it, at least once, and give it some serious consideration. I have been meditating for several



years now, and I've seen significant benefits, including better concentration, clarity, calm, and overall peaceful feelings.

A Meditation for Love and Light

Begin the meditation by sitting in a comfortable position with your back as straight as possible. Place your hands on your lap or in a folded position. Ensure that you are in a safe and quite space, free from distractions. First, tell yourself that there is nothing else to do at this time other than meditate. Give yourself permission to free yourself from life's demands and take a moment for yourself. Next, with your eyes open and not focusing on anything in particular, take three or four deep breaths. In through the nose and out through the mouth. Next, softly close your eyes. Feel your body weight as it presses against the chair. Feel where your body comes into contact with the surface and feel yourself sinking down into your chair. Next, focus on your tongue. For three breaths, notice any particular tastes in your mount. Just noticing the taste, and not trying to judge or classify the tastes. Also attempt to clear your thoughts, and if your thoughts wander, bring it back to focusing on your tongue, or any other aspect of the meditation.

After three breaths of focusing on your tongue, shift your attention to your nose. Notice, for three breaths, any scents in the air.

Next, focus on your hearing. Listen for three to five breaths any sounds in the environment. Try not to get stuck on any particular sound but listen for any subtle sounds that are in your environment. Again, don't try to classify the sounds, just experience them coming in and out of existence. Try to listen for the silence in between the sounds.

Next start to scan down through your body. Start at the top of your head. Move down from the top of your head, through your face, down your neck, to your left arm, then your right arm, then back down the back of your back, then to the left side, then the right side, then down from your throat through your torso. Next, scan the left leg to the toes, then the right leg to the toes. As you do this try to notice any type of lingering feelings that are latent in the body. Overall try to assess how you are feeling today and become aware of the various sensations in your body. Again, don't judge any particular feeling, just notice, and don't get stuck on any particular area or part.

Next, take a moment to focus on what you want to achieve through the meditation. I typically say "God, I would like to be filled with your Love and Your Light, such that it will create inner and outer space, silence, and equanimity for the benefit of myself and others." The Sixth Degree

The Sixth Degree, Confiential Secretary, is the first of a series of dramas that take place in King Solomon's audience chamber. An audience chamber is a room where a monarch or head-of-state conducts formal interviews. If you were to ask an archeologist where that chamber was located, assuming one did exist, he couldn't tell you. The Scottish Rite uses its stage or lodgeroom to represent the audience chamber.

There are four characters in the drama of this Degree. They are King Solomon; Hiram, King of Tyre; Zerbal, the Captain of the Guard; and the candidate, who represents Zabud.

With the exception of Zerbal, these are true Biblical characters. Zabud is named in I Kings 4:5, where he is described as a priest and "the King's friend". To be a friend of the king is an honor given to a member of the royal court. Unfortunately, we have no further information as to Zabud's actual job in the court.

The scene opens with the two Kings having an argument over a payment Solomon made to Hiram. The payment was the gift of 20 cities in the northern Galilee that Solomon gave to Hiram in exchange for the latter's financial support in building the Temple in Jerusalem.

This setting is historical and you can read about it in the book of First Kings, chapter 5 in the Bible. According to the Bible account, Hyrum of Tyre contributed a number of essential assets to King Solomon:

- Timber from the cedar and cypress forests of Lebanon
- Workers to help harvest the timber
- The services of Hiram the bronze worker (Hiram Abiff)

• 120 talents of gold, worth about \$255 million today, to pay the workers on the Temple construction project

In return for the timber, forest workers, and Hiram's services, King Solomon sent to the King of Tyre 3,750 tons of wheat and 186 gallons of fine oil. Most likely it was refined olive oil, a very useful product in ancient days.

In exchange for the 120 talents of gold, King Solomon deeded to Hiram of Tyre, 20 cities in northern Galilee. That is right on the boader between the kingdom of Israel and the city-state of Tyre. Today, we would consider those "cities" to be puny little villages.

And, unfortunately, the villages turned out to be in poor condition when Hiram of Tyre went to inspect them. Apparently, King Solomon looked on his map, noted the villages along the border, and deeded them over without knowing anything about them. It was like promising San Diego but delivering Tijuana, no offense intended toward the latter. In the Bible, Hiram of Tyre was not pleased. In the Sixth Degree, he feels insulted and betrayed, and expresses his feelings clearly and loudly to King Solomon in the latter's audience chamber. Zabud, the King's friend, hears the shouting, becomes worried for King Solomon's safety, and listens just outside the door.

Hiram of Tyre notices Zabud, claims that King Solomon had placed a spy, snatches Zabud and drags him onto the stage. Hiram grabs a sword and is ready to kill Zabud right then and there. King Solomon pleads for King Hiram not to take a human life and then sends Zabud away in the custody of the Captain of the Guard.

King Solomon then explains that he intended to rebuild the 20 dilapidated villages. In the Bible, Solomon actually did rebuild the 20 villages, according to II Chronicles 8:2. Although the Bible account leads you to think that King Solomon probably decided to rebuild the villages only after King Hiram complained about them. Perhaps he thought that the land was more valuable than the buildings.

At this juncture in the Degree, the two Kings make amends. Then Hiram asks about Zabud. The Captain of the Guard returns Zabud to the audience chamber where King Solomon makes an long, angry accusation of Zabud's alleged unmasonic conduct, which evidently led to summary execution in those days. At this point, the Captain of the Guard, speaking on behalf of the Candiate taking the part of Zabud, explains why he was listening in on the royal ruckus.

It turns out that Zabud feared for King Solomon's safety and was ready to come to his defense, even though he was unarmed and probably not trained for combat. Because of his focus on King Solomom's welfare, Zabud made little effort to conceal his presence, which is how King Hiram easily spotted him.

In the same way that the two kings setlled their disagreements and bad feelings, once they took a moment to really listen to each other, they recogized the honorable and selfless intentions of Zabud. King Solomon appoints Zabud as his Confidential Secretary, which is where this Degree takes its name.

The lesson of this Degree is to be zealous and faithful, to be unbiased and benevolent, to act as a peacemaker when dissention, disputes and quarrels arise among your Brethren. In closing the Degree, King Solomon asks whether any Brother harbors ill will or has an unsettled quarrel with another Brother. Hearing none, King Solomon closes the Lodge.

We will learn more about Solomon's methods for raising revenue, and their consequences, in a subsequent Lodge of Perfection Degree.

Next, focus on your breathing. Start to notice the subtle places in your body where your breathing causes movement. It may be in your stomach or chest. Count your breathing, relax, and just notice the flow of air in and out of the nose. After about five to ten counts, proceed to the next step.

Next, softly begin to notice and or visualize a beam of pure light coming from heaven down to you on the top of your head. Begin the notice the light entering your body and proceeding down to the tips of your toes. Begin to visualize and/or feel the pure light filling up your toes, then moving to your feet, then moving up your calves into your thighs. Next the light moves up through your stomach, up to your heart and lungs, and then up to the tops of your shoulders and then down through your arms. Feel the warmth and space that the pure light brings. Believe that it is dissolving any negativity and restoring positivity, harmony and health. After the light has gone down through your fingers, bring your attention back up to your neck and feel the pure light going up your neck, into your face, through your brain, up your chin, mouth, nose, eyes, forehead, all the way up to the crown of your head.

Once you have visualized and/or felt the pure light filling you up, then take a moment to just think about nothing. Just feel your body filled up with light and clear your thoughts. When you are done with this phase, start to pull your attention back to your body. Start to notice any sounds in the environment again, for a breath or two. Start to notice any scents with your nose for a couple of breaths, then any tastes on your tongue for the same duration. Then notice your body weight pressing down on the seat for a couple of breaths. Finally open your eyes, and don't focus on anything in particular. Just feel the sensations in your body and make a commitment to yourself to try and carry this feeling with you throughout the day. Then stretch your arms a bit and remind yourself what you are doing next in your day. With this the meditation is complete.

I hope that this has been helpful for you and I encourage you to try this meditation. Sometimes people fear mediation and feel it's too difficult, but rest assured nobody when they start are perfect, and their mind wanders. Even experienced meditations have their mind wander. They key is not to get angry, just bring your focus back in, and relax. Somedays will be better than others, and it's ok.

Chuck will also chair our Military Recognition Night, which has become an annual and very enjoyable event. Bro. Richard Fisher is again chairing our Scholarship Committee, as we will honor another graduating senior on their way to college. Later this month, we will again honor the Masters of our lodges as they complete their term sitting in the East of their particular lodge. We exist only because our Craft Lodges are strong and we wish to honor the men who have held our lodges together. We will continue some traditional events like our Maundy Thursday Celebration, Sweethearts Night, as well as 25 year and 50 year membership celebrations. We again attend the Highland Games in Pleasanton. What an exciting day! But besides our traditional events, we are looking for many new ideas as well.

Our Foundation is still very strong, but we can always use a new contribution here or there to continue our work (and I will speak more about that in a few moments). Our clinic continues to do amazing things with our kids and I am very proud of what is being accomplished by our Clinicians. For the past couple of years we have also made sizable contributions to the Grand Master's project, Raising a Reader, Masons 4 Mitts, recognition of our DeMolay leadership at their Annual Conclave, and we continued our Scholarship program. We were also pleased to be able to make a fifth installment contribution to the Supreme Council's House of the Temple, refurbishment project (to date, we have been able to donate \$125,000 of the \$150,000 we pledged to the project).

I said just a few lines earlier that we can always use a few more contributions to aid us doing the good works we wish to accomplish. Although we currently handle about 65 kids a year in our language clinic, we still unfortunately have about 100 kids on the waiting list. The list is so long, that realistically, many of them will never get the treatment they deserve. We would like to do more, but we need more funds to make it happen. To that end, we are starting a "Building Fund Campaign" to raise dollars for our Foundation. Our current building was built in 1984, and at that time, a very successful Building Campaign was established and goals were met by the thousands of dollars raised through the generosity of our members (Many of you were a part of that successful campaign). This year's campaign is essentially the same as the original campaign that was established some 30 plus years ago. There are 6 different levels of giving to choose from (please see details of those levels of giving in another section of the Rite Word). So why do we call it a building campaign? Today we, only use about 60 percent of our building. We want to complete the renovation of our downstairs auditorium which will allow us to rent our building much more than today for smaller and medium size events. We are also looking to convert our old print shop and photo shop to a professional conference room with all of the technological audio visual capabilities desired by businesses of today. Here again, the rental business has a huge potential which will allow us to raise more funds for our Foundation. We also want to create more social area for our members. In the basement, we want to create an area where we as members can play pool, cards, darts, etc., an area to just relax and enjoy each other's company.

So, no matter what your financial capabilities are, I ask only, "Each to his own Ability". Every dollar will be cherished, and every dollar will go a long way in helping more of our kids. This coming month, every member will receive a letter explaining the campaign as well as a pledge envelope for your convenience. You will be asked to:

- First, choose a level of giving that is comfortable for you and your family.
- Second, you will be asked to make a pledge of a dollar amount within that level of giving.
- Third, you will have the choice to make either a one-time donation or choose to make recurring contributions over the next 1, 2 or 3 years (you can divide the payments up for ease of your own budgets).

I want to also thank III Bud Ramsey for assisting me in the role as Assistant to the PR. His support is invaluable.
