

The Rite Word

From the Venerable Master

Independence Day is a special time for all to celebrate the birth of our nation with the signing of the *Declaration of Independence*. The Fourth of July officially became a federal holiday in 1941, though its celebration dates back to the 18th century, immediately following



the American Revolution. Many orations and speeches from this early period adopted a republican calendar in use through 1800, dating their documents 'year of the Revolution', and counting the years since 1776. Representatives of the thirteen colonies assembled, weighing a resolution to declare their independence from Great Britain. On July 2^d the Continental Congress voted in favor of this resolution, two days later adopting the Declaration of Independence, drafted by Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston. From 1776 through today, the fourth of July has been celebrated as the birth of American Independence with parades, just like the ones celebrated by South Valley 187 and many other lodges, along with our Brother Shriners. Every family has a unique way to celebrate, gathering with food and friends, and my personal favorite, with fireworks.

One of the two zodiac signs this month holds the fire sign. This elemental has been venerated through all time and in all of man's religions. Zoroastrianism is the first monotheistic faith, which has the burning of fire as a principle element of its worship to create an eternal fire. The earliest religions were religions of nature and evoked universally by Jefferson in the Declaration of Independence as 'the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God.' The sun is considered to be the universal fire. Quintus

Curtius invoked the sun as Mithras, the sacred and eternal fire. Fire was not the idol of worship itself, but rather the visible symbol of the Supreme Deity. It gives life and light, and is the creator of the energy from where we came, and to where we ascend. The burning flame ascends toward heaven, to its divine origin. Its base symbolically ignites, grows, and ascends towards the celestial fire, or God. This belief is referred to as the 'flame secret' by its adherents.

This is the concept of universal religion and is a principal ideology of all ancient religions. It can be observed from India to Egypt, and is encoded in the astrological mythology of the Greeks and the Hebrews, influencing modern thought and religion. In the Hebrew scriptures we see fire used in prominent and divine ways. Upon Mount Sinai God revealed himself to Moses. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in flames of fire from within a bush. God revealed his name and commanded Moses to lead his people from captivity. Burnt offerings were the principal form of their worship, providing a sweet-smelling aroma to the Lord, with nothing being returned to the worshiper, making it distinct from other faiths and a true sacrifice. God also answered Elijah's prayer for a sign of his presence at the altar he constructed and the fire of the LORD fell, and consumed the burnt sacrifice, and the wood, and the stones, and the dust, and licked up the water that was in the trench.[2] Fire has always been a symbol of Holiness to the Lord, and can be visibly seen by our three lesser lights in our Lodge rooms as symbols of the Great Architect of the Universe. When we delve into the high degrees, and other ancient institutions, we find that fire is used as a process of purification. As fire is identical to light and the symbol of divinity of the Zoroastrtians,

Let us each allow our own flame of Masonry to shine, as our brothers before us, with their knowledge and gifts bestowed upon us all.



An Introduction to the Kabbalah

Welcome to our new series in Kabbalah studies. We hope to explore and explain some of the concepts found in the Kabbalah and come to an understanding of what Kabbalah is and what value it may offer you.

Kabbalah is both a collection of obscure writings and a complex body of philosophy built around those writings. The material comes to us through a cadre of Jewish sages and extends back over a period of 1,000 years.

The word Kabbalah comes from the Hebrew word spelled Qop Bet Lamed Heh, transliterated as Q B L H. It means "receiving". There are maybe two dozen different ways to spell Kabbalah in English. We use "Kabbalah" because it is one of the most popular.

The Rite Word School of Kabbalah

The author will endeavor to provide an article in the Rite Word every month, as we did with a discussion of each of the Scottish Rite degrees. In order to do that we will include material that is already published on Kabbalah. So please, don't accuse me of plagiarism if you read something in this column that you have encountered somewhere else.

This series is intended for members of the Scottish Rite. We are not scholars. Few of us will ever advance beyond the basics when it comes to Kabbalah. But there is nothing wrong with that. Even a short journey may result in finding valuable treasure.

The Philosophy Student

A co-worker once told me the story of his fellow college student taking a final exam in philosophy. There was just one single question on the exam: "Why?" Most of the students began pouring out all of the information they could remember from taking the course, hoping to include the whatever words the professor was looking for, and watching the clock to avoid running out of time. This one particular student answered the exam question with just two words: "Why not?" He got a A.

The point is that philosophy is not like mathematics. There is no single specific and correct answer to any question in philosophy. As demonstrated above, a valid answer does not necessarily take hundreds of words to express. For many of us, this is a new and different way of thinking. Mysticism, which includes Kabbalah studies, could be described as philosophy on steroids.

My Starting Point

Years ago, I attended a lecture at Temple Emanu-El, a large Reform Jewish congregation in San Jose. The guest speaker was Daniel Matt, Professor of Jewish Studies at the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley California, and a well-known scholar of Kabbalah. At the time, Dr. Matt was working on a translation of the Zohar, the principal text of Kabbalah, into English.

The final product, with contributions from two other scholars, "The Zohar, Pritzker Edition, The Complete Set" was published in 2018 and consists of over seven thousand printed pages. And you thought Leo Tolstoy's "War and Peace" was a long read!

Where did Kabbalah come from?

What we know today as the "Sefer ha-Zohar" or "Book of Radiance", was written by Moses de León, a Spanish Jewish mystic in the late 1200s. De León claimed to be not the author but merely a copyist, getting his material from the second century Rabbi Shim'on bar Yohai.

Right here, we understand why many people say the Kabbalah was invented in the Middle Ages. Because the original manuscript dates to that time. Yet the material supposedly comes from the 100s, a decade after Jesus of Nazareth but in the same geographical area.

Moses de León seems to have composed the Zohar over a long period of time and released portions of his work to his fellow Kabbalists. The Zohar was never intended for public consumption, not in pieces nor as a single document.

De León wrote in his unique style of Aramaic, the common language of Palestine and Judea at the time of Shim'on bar Yohai. Yet by De León's time, Aramaic had been out of daily use for nearly a millennia.

Aramaic was the language in which Jesus of Nazareth taught. It is related to Hebrew but there is enough difference to classify Aramaic as a separate language. The alternative would be to say Hebrew was a dialect of Aramaic. Despite falling out of use, the study of Aramaic never ended. To this

very day, sages and scholars continue to learn and use it to read newly discovered manuscripts from the ancient Middle East.

First prerequisite

I propose that there are three prerequisites to meet before one is ready undertake even a casual study of Kabblah.

You must understand that we are dealing with Jewish people, culture, and history. Those are unfamiliar topics to most of us. You can learn a lot from good reference books such as "Jewish Literacy" by Joseph Telushkin.

But there is nothing better than cultivating a friendship with a Brother Mason who is an active, informed member of the Jewish faith. That is how the writer of this article embarked on his study.

Second prerequisite

We need a basic understanding of the Hebrew Bible, which Jewish people call the Tenach [pronounced: ten-AHK] but most of us know as the Old Testament. It's called the Hebrew Bible because that is the language in which most of the text was originally written.

The Tenach or Hebrew Bible is considered as having three major sections:

- Torah, or Pentateuch, or first five books of the Bible, attributed to Moses
- Prophets, books such as Joshua, Judges, Samuel, Kings, Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Ezekiel
- Holy Writings, books such as Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Job, Ruth, Esther, and Daniel

To the Kabbalists, the Torah is considered the starting point. However, many of the mystical parts relate to the Prophets and Holy Writings. Fortunately, most of the current books on Kabbalah cite the references to the Hebrew Bible. And we can read the Bible in English.

Having a Bible, printed or online, at your fingertips, is essential in your Kabbalah study. When you encounter a reference to a Bible passage, you must take the time to look up that passage and make the effort to understand the material in its original context. For that reason, I strongly suggest you use what they call a "Study Bible", one full of footnotes, references, essays, and maps.

Which version? One that you can easily understand.

Third prerequisite

You must be comfortable thinking "out-of-the-box" when it comes to Mankind and its relationship with the Divine. In this writer's experience, most of the men who become Masons and join Scottish Rite are open to considering new ideas. And when you encounter an idea that challenges your current beliefs, you are comfortable thinking about it without feeling pressured to immediately accept or reject the strange new idea.

Your Final Warning

Many readers are familiar with a story that comes from the Babylonian Talmud, Hagigah 14b. It refers four Rabbis who walked into "pardes", the divine orchard or paradise:

Four men entered into pardes: Ben Azzai, Ben Zoma, Aher, and Akivah.

Ben Azzai looked and immediately died.

Ben Zoma looked and went insane.

Aher cut the plants [became a heretic and left Judaism].

Akivah emerged in a state of peace.

So there you have it, one chance in four of finding peace and enlightenment by approaching the Divine, as we do by studying Kabbalah.

Next time, we will look into developments after the time of Moses de León, which shape the Kabbalah as we exprience it today.

Parker started speech and language services at the San Jose Scottish Rite Childhood Speech and Language Clinic as he had a mild expressive



language delay. His parents noted that he was not combining words and sought speech and language services. They were referred to our clinic from their older son's preschool teacher who had an excellent experience with our clinic when her children were in our speech and language program. At 2 years, 6 months of age Parker was not consistently combining words in short phrases or sentences. Typically, children begin combining words into short phrases around two years of age or when they have approximately 50 words in their expressive vocabulary. Given targeted therapy at our clinic to help Parker expand his utterances, he began combining words very rapidly and made significant progress in a very short period of time. His mother commented that his language started "booming since working with Ms. Rachel. He's extending the length of his phrases and becoming clearer when speaking. People who interact with him regularly are definitely noticing a big improvement." Parker has made such excellent progress that he has now finished his therapy at our clinic!

His parents are very grateful for our program, "We feel so fortunate to be receiving such excellent services at no cost. As parents, we always want the best for our children, especially when it comes to their development and meeting milestones.
