

From the Venerable Master

thank everyone who helped make our Valentine's Day and Sweetheart Recognition Night a great success. It was L a very special evening.

This month, I am going to reflect on Brother Walter Leslie Wilmshurst's thoughts on the initiatic process. This process is virtually universal regardless of the mystery school one might consider. In his book, The "Masonic Initiation" written in the early 1920s he contends that most masons would be surprised to hear that our ceremonial ritual as performed then and I contend still today does not constitute or confer real initiation at all. In the original sense of the initiation ceremonial it was the process of admitting a man to the solemn mysteries of the human soul and to a practical experience in the divine science. Today, the words initiation and mysteries have become so misused and devalued that they are now used in relation to familiarizing someone with the stock market or the business cycle.



That said, every system of real initiation, whether ancient or contemporary is divided into three clear-cut phases. Before one can pass from the darkness to the light and discover the "Blazing Star or glory" of one's own center (temple) he must accomplish three tasks. First, he must turn away from the attractions of the outer world by detaching his self from the "allurements" of all that is meant by "money and metals". Further he must subdue and purify the bodily and sensual tendencies. This work is accomplished in the Entered Apprentice Degree.

The second phase of the initiation process deals with analysis, discipline and gaining control of your inner world – the mind, your thoughts, your intellectual and psychic faculties. This is the work of the Fellowcraft Degree.

The third and final phase is the "last and greatest trial". This is the breaking and surrender of the individual will, the lessening of the personality and selfishness so that the petty things are subordinated and merged with the Divine Universal Will. Thus only can the illusion of a separate independent existence give way to the conscious realization of unity with the one Life that permeates the universe. To achieve this is to attain mastership which results in complete domination of our lower nature and the development in oneself of a higher order of life and faculties. This is the work of the Master Mason degree.

The Masonic degrees give the earnest mason, the diligent pursuer of real light, a clear path or chart of the process of spiritual self-development. Further, he is directed to a most valuable key which can unlock the "central truth and discover the hidden secrets and mysteries of his own being".

I hope this provides some food for thought. The serious nature of our degrees deserves our full respect and honor. The next time you are involved in a degree take the time before, during and after the ceremonies for silent reflection on what the degree means to you and the candidate.

Mark your calendars for the Maundy Thursday celebration on April 5. I look forward to seeing you at our stated meetings and dinners. Still looking ahead plan to attend the Spring Reunion starting on April 10 with the conferral of the 4th Degree. My article each month this year will be about Masonic Education related to Scottish Rite. We define Scottish Rite as the further light in Masonry which we have joined to learn, explore, share and serve. There is so much to learn about Masonry and trying to find a

explore, share and serve. There is so much to learn about Masonry and trying to find a starting point can be frustrating. There are couple great programs designed to guide a Scottish Rite Mason towards their journey in Masonic Education.

The Scottish Rite Master Craftsman (SRMC) program is an exciting self-study by-mail correspondence course designed and administered by staff at the House of the Temple in

Washington, D.C. Part I, consists of six lessons, utilizing The Scottish Rite Ritual Monitor and Guide by Arturo de Hoyos, 33', Grand Cross, and A Bridge to Light by Rex Hutchens, 33', Grand Cross, as its textbooks.

Besides the Master Craftsman program there is a College of Consistory of the Southern Jurisdiction. The College of Consistory is a free self-study program for Scottish Rite Masons of all Orients. The curriculum is facilitated by the Guthrie College and made available to all enrolled members.

Any Valley can organize a campus of the College of the Consistory, provided it has 5-6 enrolled members to lead its group. Meetings of the College of the Consistory are called Festive Boards. Papers chosen by the Board of Adepts, or the leadership of any Valley campus, are presented. Fine dining, festive toasts and the fraternal songs accent the evening's blend of education and fraternalism. In some ways this is very similar to our Lodge of Instruction (LoI). Also this is a great way to connect and share our brothers' delightful labors in research and study of Masonry through the Master Craftsman or the College of Consistory, with the rest of the brethren while enjoying a blend of education and fraternalism.

I would like to encourage brethren to learn and participate to the Master Craftsman program or to the College of Consistory.

The Royal Secret, if lived with perfect comprehension and understanding, elevates mankind to sublime heights and levels of realization. The Great Symbol of the Degree is the Symbolic Camp.

Some of the most profound truths of the ancient mysteries are spoken as axioms. You are called upon to summon your greatest capacities and to attempt to pierce the veil of the symbolic language in which they are presented. To be truly a Master of the Royal Secret, individual realization is required on the part of each and every initiate.

Five final vows, marking the candidate as a Soldier of Light, Liberty, Freedom of Religion the People, and of Scottish Rite Masonry. In this degree, the candidate is put in possession of the Sacred Word of the Scottish Rite.

Upon being given the Royal Secret and put in possession of the Holy Doctrine, it becomes necessary that each 32nd Degree Mason take responsibility for this knowledge and devote their (our) lives to being fit examples of our Rite.

From the Clinic!




mma is a beautiful 5 year old who started services at our clinic secondary to articulation and expressive language difficulties. Emma's parents reported that before treatment began, "We could not understand a lot of what she was saying. She was having difficulty pronouncing certain letters. She would, at times, get frustrated and give

realized she was falling behind her peers and was having speech problems." At first Emma's treatment focused on producing final consonants, s-blends, pronouns and prepositions. Emma continues to need help with articulation, categorizing, describing, story retelling and sentence structure. Emma comes two times per week and continues to make progress with her speech and language skills during her therapy sessions. She is a hard worker who is able to smile and continue giving her best effort even when tasks are hard for her. Emma is becoming more aware of her articulation and is now producing more of her target sounds in conversational speech!



Her mother reported that, "The clinic has been extremely helpful in our daughter's speech and language development that we would like to refer any other person in need of help to attend the clinic. Her speech/language has improved greatly since she has been attending the clinic. We can now understand her a lot more. Speech therapy has helped her to be more outgoing and to do well in school. We can now understand a lot more of what she says. The Scottish Rite {Childhood Language Disorders Clinic} has given us a chance to have someone specialized help her speech and language. This therapy and help is something that we cannot financially afford otherwise. Our experience at the clinic is that the staff is very pleasant, nice, and is flexible with our schedule. We are grateful to have found the clinic. Since our daughter started kindergarten she has been able to concentrate on learning instead of worrying if peers and teachers can understand her. Thank you Scottish Rite {Childhood Language Disorders Clinic}!


