





ngeli is an engaging 8 A<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> year old young lady, who has been attending the Scottish Rite Speech and Language Clinic once per week to treat her articulation and language skills. Angeli was originally evaluated by her school and received therapy to target her articulation skills. She then moved to a school which did not offer speech and language services, so the only treatment she now receives is here in this

clinic. Angeli's mother was referred to the San Jose Scottish Rite by a family member who works at the Scottish Rite in Stockton. Angeli and her family travel each week from San Mateo to San Jose for her therapy appointment. Their dedication and hard work have played a huge role in Angeli's speech and language success.

Angeli has been coming to therapy once per week along with her twin sister Alexa. She and her sister have been seen for a group session, as many of their treatment goals have been the same. It is not uncommon for twins to require help with developmental skills such as fine and gross motor as well as speech and language skills. We usually contribute this to the fact that twins are often born prematurely, which also increases the likelihood of need for therapeutic services. Angeli and Alexa were not born prematurely, however like many other children they had the need for speech and language therару.

When Angeli first began treatment at this clinic, her parent's main concern was the production of her speech sounds. Her treatment began with goals targeting sounds such as /s, sh, ch, th, v, r and j/. Angeli also had difficulty with /r/ blends found in words like "prize" and "breakfast" and /s/ blends, like "spot" and "skunk." The last sounds that Angeli mastered were vocalic /r/ sounds such as "airplane, fire and alligator." Angeli is currently working on language and grammar based treatment goals. She sometimes has difficulty with the rules of grammar and word order when constructing her sentences and

questions in conversation. Her treatment has targeted the verbs is/are, was/were, has/have, plurals, past tense verbs and pronouns.

Angeli has recently had the opportunity to experience some individual treatment sessions with our San Jose State University graduate student extern, Jenna Mendonca. While she enjoys working with her sister, Angeli states that she has enjoyed working by herself with Jenna too.

Angeli's mother Cynthia stated, "I've seen a tremendous improvement in her pronunciation and articulation. She is improving so much every day. She is more confident and willing to say words that she had a difficult time with. She used to get frustrated and upset, but now I can't get her to stop talking!" J She also said, "My experience at the clinic has always been very positive. Everyone is always there to help you out and give lots of great feedback on your child's progress." Angeli's mother Cynthia graciously stated, "I would like to thank Angela for all her help, support and dedication in everything she has taught and done with my child. I am so happy that my child has improved so much! Without Angela's help and guidance I'm not sure where my child would be at this point. I see the change in my child's speech. Thank you."

From the Wise Master

#### June 14th is Flag Day

Rather than write a story about the flag itself though, I thought I'd write a little about the pledge of allegiance. Most everyone knows some or all of the history of our flag but the

history of the pledge if somewhat more obscure.

The Pledge of Allegiance was originally composed by Francis Bellamy in 1892 Bellamy was a Baptist minister and Christian socialist, and he was also cousin to the noted utopian novelist Edward Bellamy.

Bellamy's pledge was first published in The Youth's Companion on 8 September 1892 to coincide with the 400th anniversary of Christopher Columbus's discovery of America.

#### It read:

"I pledge allegiance to my Flag and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Phrasing was chosen to ensure that reciting the pledge would not exceed 15 seconds.

Originally, it was supposed to be accompanied by the Bellamy salute in which the children were supposed to extend their hands toward the flag palm down and slowly rotate them until their palms were up at the end of the pledge.

Franklin Roosevelt changed the salute to the now familiar hand-over-heart on 22 December 1942 because the Bellamy salute was deemed to be too similar to the Nazi salute.

Notice also that the original pledge contained the phrase "my flag" rather than "the flag of the United States of America." This was because the pledge, as envisioned by Bellamy, was supposed to be international in nature. He felt that any child should be able to use it to pledge allegiance to the flag of his or her own country. Also, any reference to God was deliberately omitted even though the author was a minister! The pledge very nearly did contain the words "equality" and "fraternity" though. One can only wonder what induced Bellamy to leave those out.

The pledge has been changed three times in its history.

In 1923 the words "my country" were changed to "United States" and "of America" was added on 22, June 1942 for the benefit of immigrants.

The phrase "under God" was incorporated into the Pledge of Allegiance on 14, June 1954, by a Joint Resolution of Con-

#### From the Venerable Master



#### **Brethren and Ladies:**

Some 150 years ago Brother Peter Lassen led 12 covered wagons from Missouri to California, forgoing the treacherous, and now infamous, Lassen Trail. After months of hardship, he successfully delivered new settlers to Benton City, the state's northernmost community. Among them was Reverend Saschel Woods, who carried one of the first Masonic Charters into California. The Missouri Charter was part of a new chapter in Freemasonry. But the long journey, inspired by the promise of California, tied Lassen and Woods to the Masonic fraternity in another way: it echoed the travel experiences of the first Freemasons.

According to Masonic lore, the original Freemasons were master stonemasons in the middle ages, who roamed the European countryside for work that demanded their skilled labor – cathedrals, castles, abbeys, and other massive building and structures. Skilled stonemasons had earned a special privilege: they were free to travel anywhere in search of work. These master masons became known as "Free" masons.

Their work, by nature, sent them into distant lands and under the scrutiny of strangers. So, the first freemasons devised ways to prove quickly and definitively that they possessed the unique skills of a stonemason: they created secret modes of recognition, known only by fellow Master Masons.

Those modes of recognition evolved as the fraternity opened its doors to speculative Masons, giving rise to the rituals Masons practice today. However, the modes recognition that prove that a man is part of a Brotherhood with common knowledge and experiences have not changed with the passing of time and today still prove that a man can be trusted, even as a newcomer in a strange land.


